The peachtree borer, one of the most destructive enemies of peach and apricot trees, feeds primarily in the trunk near the groundline and during its feeding activity the tree may be firdled resulting in its death. Infested trees will have large masses of gum around the base of the trunk mixed with a brownish frass. The gum and frass exudes from the wounds that are caused by peachtree

The yellowish-white peachtree borer larvae varies in size up to one and one-fourth inches in length. There is only one generation of peachtree borers each year. However adult emergence and egg laying activity extends from the middle of May to early October.

Control of peachtree borers can be obtained by placing paradichlorobenzene (PDB) crystals around the base of the tree. These crystals should be applied during he period of October 20 to November 15 or before soil temperatures drop below 55 degrees Farenhidt. The crystals should be applied when the soil is dry. Weeds should be removed from around the base of the tree and the soil leveled one foot from the tree trunk. Place the PDB crystals in a narrow groove encircling the tree about 2 inches from the tree trunk. Care should be taken to keep any of the
