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

Combined Federal Campaign kicks off Thursday

Reese sets wing goal at \$95,000

As we wind down on fiscal year 1994, we can look back on a very successful year for the 64th Flying Training Wing -- mission, safety and the development of our people are all success stories. I'll have more to say about that in the next few weeks, but today I want to challenge you to rise to the occassion for one more important event.

The Combined Federal Campaign is a great opportunity for us to show we

care and make a difference in the lives of people -- many of whom cannot help themselves. We talk a lot about "quality" in the Air Force, and it means a lot of different things. But quality starts within each of us -- a desire to make things better than they are. This is our chance to do that.

The 1994 Combined Federal Campaign kicks off, Thursday.

During the six-week fund drive, the wing looks to exceed its goal of \$95,000. Last year, wing contributions helped more than 115,000 people in Lubbock alone.

Just to name a few: a total of 29,270 persons received food and assistance from the Salvation Army; 257 victims were helped by the Rape Crisis Center;

550 children were served by Big Brothers or Big Sisters; and 11,464 scouts (boys & girls) were aided.

Other local health and service organizations receiving support from Reese's CFC contributions include: Reese Youth Activities, Red Cross, Boys' and Girls' Clubs of Lubbock, Catholic Family Services, Lubbock Children's Health Clinic and Women's Protective Services.


Donors can designate that their contributions go to any of 35 local and 1,000 national and international agencies.

Contributions go for everything from taking care of children of working parents who don't earn enough to pay for day care, to research in cancer and heart disease. I want everyone to know that when they make a contribution, their gift will go to whatever agency they designate. Because of volunteer help and donations of material and equipment, 95 cents out of every dollar raised goes directly to aid community organizations.

Contributions by wing members allow the CFC to make a significant impact on the quality of life we share in the Reese and Lubbock community.

Like most things we undertake as a team, it doesn't take a Herculean effort by any one individual. It takes all of us doing our part. The 64th FTW "leads the league" in almost every area. CFC should be the same. Let's do it!

People first!

DoD places priority on people over hardware

WASHINGTON — It started as an Air Force chorus: "Put people first." In late August Department of Defense officials took up the refrain, adding, DoD is choosing people over weapons systems.

Deputy Secretary of Defense John Deutch said in a Pentagon press briefing that unless Congress appropriates more money, which Deutch said he doubted would happen, DoD will have to reduce some out-year modernization programs to fund readiness, military pay and quality-of-life pro-

"In sum, this message is: Money is tight and we

are choosing people over systems," Deutch said.

The announcement came less than a week after the civilian media reported on an internal working memorandum that Deutch sent to all the military services telling them to prepare to delay or cancel several major weapons programs, including the Air Force's F-22 stealth fighter, the Army's Comanche helicopter, the Marine's V-22 Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft and the Navy's new attack submarine.

Although Deutch did not confirm the list of systems, he stressed that the systems were only "candidates" for cancellations, terminations or postponements.

"Nothing has been decided," he said, and nothing will be decided until after "an extensive" consultation period with the services and the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Responding to a question about why the Air

Force may have to delay the F-22 program for up to four years, Deutch said it was "in part" because of the reduced threat the United States faces now that the Cold War has ended.

Air Force is planning to buy 422 of the jets, at a cost of more than \$70 billion, as a replacement for the F-15 Eagle air superiority fighter starting in 2004.

Deutch admitted to the press that by choosing readiness and people over weapon systems, DOD could be creating future readiness problems. However, he stressed that within a fixed budget situation, "you have to make these choices."

"As I said before, for the time being, given the national security needs that we see, and which are in front of us every day in the newspapers, we are choosing people, we are choosing quality of life of the troops in contrast to provisions for the future."

Smoking during pregnancy endangers child Risk especially high during first four months

According to the American Cancer Society there are two major reasons why you should not smoke

while you are pregnant. Based on research, smoking retards the growth of your baby in your womb and increases the incidences of infant mortality.

Studies have suggested that babies of smoking women on the average weigh six-ounces less than babies of nonsmoking women.

This is caused because nicotine restricts the blood vessels and breathing movements. In adition, carbon monoxide reduces the oxygen level in the baby's blood. The child's vitamin metabolism is also disturbed.

Although the weight loss is quickly regained after birth, a follow-up study showed that seven-year old children of mothers who smoked during pregnancy were shorter in stature, tended to have a lower reading ability, and several rated lower in "social adjustment" than children of mothers who did not smoke during pregnancy.

Statistics also show a positive correlation between smoking during pregnancy and the rate of spontaneous abortion and stillbirths. It seems that women who smoke a pack or more of cigarettes a day during pregnancy experience about a 50 percent greater chance of infant mortality. However, research correspondingly shows that the risks of infant death are decreased if the mother stops smoking before her fourth month of gestation.

Pregnancy and motherhood are great responsibilities and challenges. You owe it to you and your family to care for your own health as conscientiously as you do for theirs.

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Blueprint: the Objective Air Force


Reference books detail Air Force mission, history

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Air Force commanders now have a quick reference that represents the corporate philosophy on organizational alignment—the structure for America's Air Force.

The landmark document, "Blueprint for the Objective Air Force," culminates a top-to-bottom review of the Air Force. The three-volume set, classified by Air Force officials, defines the simple, streamlined structure that is the result of the most significant organizational changes made since the Air Force became a separate service in 1947.

The Blueprint, approved by Gen. Merrill A. McPeak, Air Force chief of staff, was built for commanders at all organizational levels. "The Blueprint is a necessary tool for decision makers," said General McPeak. "How the Air Force is organized to fight influences all else," he said.

The Blueprint integrates force structure, manpower and weapon systems into one, easy-to-understand reference source. It is the simplest way the Air "We know that it isn't airplanes that win wars. It isn't hardware that prevails in combat. What wins is people!"

Force can be organized to achieve the mission. "What we want in the Air Force is an organization capable of high performance in very tough circumstances. The Blueprint tells you what the organization ought to look like and also tells you what the organization should not look like," he said.

The Blueprint should be used by commanders, senior enlisted advisors and first sergeants. "People need to be aware of how their unit fits into the overall big-picture Air Force," General McPeak said.

The Blueprint depicts the entire Air

Force organizational structure from Headquarters Air Force and Field Operating Agencies down through Major Commands, Numbered Air Forces, wing and base-level units, including tenants. Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard units are also listed.

"Everyone is in there somewhere. If they aren't, they better check to make sure their organization is still in business," General McPeak said.

The books contain more than organizational charts and data tables — approved unit patches or emblems for heritage-bearing squadrons are in-

cluded.

"Air Force heritage is a significant part of who we are," General McPeak said. "We know that it isn't airplanes that win wars. It isn't hardware that prevails in combat. What wins is people!"

Associating the legacy and heritage of the Air Force with the Blueprint is a way of connecting the human values to the management structure of the organization.


"The patch is how we recognize a unit; it represents unit pride and esprit de corps. Including patches in the Blueprint links our organizing scheme to our heritage," he said.

Updates to the Blueprint will be made twice a year. Each succeeding version will be used as a planning tool for the next Future Year Defense Plan exercise.

"Future senior managers and leaders will go back to this Blueprint, like a map, to constantly check their position," he said.

The document, which is already getting a "thumbs up" from users, will be distributed to major Headquarters USAF organizations, MAJCOMs, centers, NAFs, wings and independent groups. Organizational unit emblems will be available on CD ROM.

AF reduces improper statements on military performance reports

Air Force Military Personnel Center, Randolph AFB, Texas, report a marked decrease in the number of implied or veiled promotion recommendations in enlisted and officer performance re-

The officials add that there is still some confusion as to what is and isn't

Promotion recommendations are prohibited in all EPRs and OPRs, regardless of rank.

The decrease, say personnel officials, is primarily the result of local military personnel flight efforts.

Personnel officials offered other examples of what is and isn't permitted:

"The top 1 percent of my senior NCOs" is not acceptable when the ratee is a master sergeant; however, "Top 1 percent of my master sergeants"

Also, ratees should not be compared with the top percentile of their peers throughout the Air Force.

For example, descriptions of annual award winners as "top 1 percent of all airmen, NCOs, etc." are prohibited. The specific award should be highlighted: "Selected as Reese Senior NCO of the Year for 1994."

Comments, except in Section IV of

the EPR, referring to the ratee's promotion potential are not appropriate. Section IV, "Promotion Recommendation," is designed specifically for that pur-

If a ratee is filling a position which normally requires a higher grade than which the ratee has, the focus, personnel officials explain, should be on the responsibility of the job, what the ratee did, and the impact of the ratee's performance on the unit or organization.

Raters with questions about specific statements can clear them through their unit orderly room or call the military personnel flight's evaluation office, 3339 for officer reports or 3789 for enlisted



AFSOC to participate in exercise

Quarry Heights, Panama (AFNS) — U.S. Special Forces units from the United States and Panama, and military forces from Colombia, Venezuela and Ecuador are participating in a Joint Chiefs of Staff exercise — Cabanas 94 - II — in the United States and Panama. WW II ace dies

KELLY AFB, Texas - Hubert A. "Hub" Zemke, 80, a World War II flying ace who commanded the 56th Fighter Group, which scored the most aerial victories of any Army Air Force unit in the European theater, died Aug. 30 in

The retired Air Force colonel is best remembered as a tactician whose innovations contributed to the success of his fighter group, dubbed "Zemke's Wolfpack." He was an ace with 17 aerial victories and eight ground victories. World War II historians refer to Zemke as the "fightingest" fighter commander because he led his group into battle so often.

We need volunteers who can tutor about an hour per week. Tutoring hours will be Monday through Thursday between 4 and 6 p.m.



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

How to putt

by Lt. Col. Bob Samay

All good putters have a consistent putting stroke. The putter is always accelerating through the ball at impact regardless of the distance from the hole. "

Steps for getting the ball within two feet of the hole consistently.

- ☐ Go to the practice green before you start your round of golf.
- ☐ Pick a hole to putt to that is 10 paces
- ☐ Using a putting stroke with a constant pace that is always accelerating through the ball, start hitting putts to the hole.
- ☐ After a few putts from that distance, you should be able to determine how far to take the putter back to hit the ball consistently two feet past the hole.
- ☐ After mastering the 10-pace distance, try 15 and 20 paces. The distance you take the putter back should be proportional to the 10-pace putt.

Remember to practice those uphill and downhill puts; not all of your putts will be level.

- Once you begin your round of golf, count your paces from the ball to the hole while on
- Now apply what you have learned from the practice green to hit the ball two feet past the hole.

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
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
