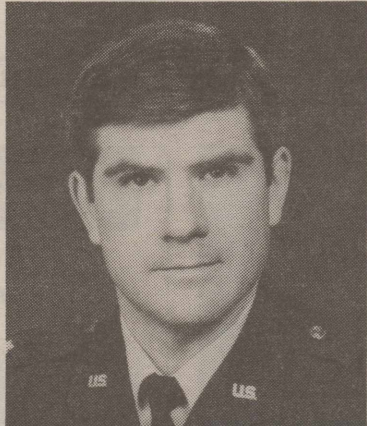
A 10-year absence from the purely training environment has brought me back to a different AETC than I was in during my first assignment as a T-37 instructor pilot.

The command has taken great strides during the past several years to create an environment, with better equipment and training methods, designed to graduate a "product" that has more of the talents and knowledge necessary to go right to work at their final destination. Nowhere have these changes been more apparent than in flying training programs and, specifically, here at Reese.

UPT is the first step in the new training approach that no longer delivers just a pilot with basic skills to the using command, but one who is nearly mission-ready in his or her operational aircraft. The specialized UPT approach gives us a great opportunity to influence not only the specific flying skills involved in follow-on training and operational units, but perhaps more importantly, the mental preparation necessary for young officers to make the transition to mission-ready pilots. Those of us with experience outside of AETC owe our students the benefit of that experience as they prepare for their operational assignments. This combination of flying and mental training will provide the best quality product to follow-on training units.

Involved in the new training approach is an Air Force effort to incorporate quality principles in everything we do. While many people still get nervous whenever the "Q" word is used, I believe the quality approach has given us the best chance ever to improve the way we do business from within the organization. Allowing good ideas to surface from the lowest levels of the organization, sharing those ideas, and letting people do their jobs without micromanagement just makes sense.

I look forward to working with every organization on this base to continuously improve our operation and provide the best possible new pilots to the Air Force.



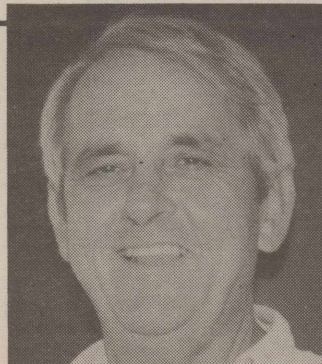

Summer safety

Don't rock the boat

As summer sets in, many of us turn toward area lakes for rest and relaxation. Whether rigged for sailing, skiing, fishing or just cruising, a boat is one of the great summer "freedom machines."

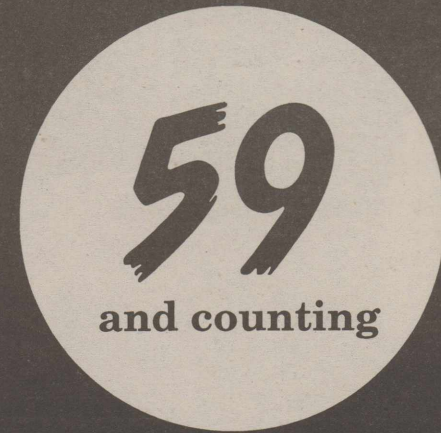
While a boat is often a source of pleasure, it can easily be the cause of a mishap — a fatal mishap. Let's take a minute to look at a few errors that can lead to tragedy:

□ **Failure to wear a life jacket:** Each year, the Coast Guard Auxiliary and personnel from Texas Parks and Wildlife investigate several accidental drownings that could have been avoided had the boat operator or passenger used a life jacket. Wear life jackets whenever you're in a boat. The Texas Water Safety Act states that children 12 and under must wear an approved life jacket whenever they're in a boat. This requirement applies regardless of whether the boat is under power or not.

□ **Failure to use a motor kill switch and lanyard:** Very few people realize this can easily be a lifesaver. The kill switch turns your motor off automatically in the event you are thrown from the boat while under power. This prevents the boat from running over and injuring you. Remember, depending on the propeller's direction of rotation, the boat will make continuous right or left circles. Each circle becomes tighter and tighter, making it difficult for the thrown operator to escape.

□ **Drinking while operating a boat:** Another problem is the "elbow-bending" boater who gets moderately tipsy and later loses control of his boat

when crossing the wakes of other boats or heavy swells when under full power. Boats, like automobiles, require a clear head and situational awareness to operate safely. Water and alcohol don't mix. Incidentally, did you know Texas has a "boating while intoxicated" clause within the Texas Water Safety Act?

Let yourself off the hook

Few if any of us would consider fishing an inherently dangerous activity. The truth is, however, that fishing can result in both minor and serious mishaps.

Perhaps the most common and painful mishap you'll experience is getting hooked while fishing. This can happen from the bank or from a boat. You can get hooked either when you're casting a lure or bait, when a buddy is casting a lure or bait, or while you're unhooking a fish that was caught on a lure with multiple treble hooks.

The remedy is simple — check behind you for bystanders before casting and remember to use a heavier bait/lure when casting into a stiff breeze. Avoid fishing in areas where people are swimming. To avoid hooking yourself when handling a fish, use a landing net whenever practical to boat your fish, and use pliers to remove the hook from the jaw of your catch.

One more word of caution concerning hooks — depending on how deep the hook is imbedded in your body, its removal can result in more damage than the initial puncture. Get medical assistance; a tetanus shot may be required, also.

Safe fishing is no accident.

Allergies And Outdoor Sports



Allergy Sufferers Can Still Enjoy the Great Outdoors!

(NAPS)—The warmer weather is a breath of fresh air for most who enjoy outdoor exercise—except the 40 million Americans who face the beginning of the dreaded “allergy season.” Here are some tips to help, from the experts at the American Lung Association and the makers of Tavist-1 and Tavist-D, the leading 12-hour antihistamine/decongestant:
