Saving energy

Problems with a building's insulation can result in excessive energy consumption and poor comfort conditions (too hot or too cold).

Many times these problems can be traced to inadequate insulation around doors and windows. Caulk and weather-strip doors and windows. It's easy to do yourself using caulking and weather-stripping materials obtained from the self-help center located in Bldg. 552. They carry window and door insulation tape, which will correct most air leakage problems, saving energy and providing more comfortable surroundings. Savings in annual energy costs for an average house (12

windows, two doors) could amount to 10 percent or more.

Look for other air leaks through walls or ceilings. It's through these cracks and holes that the typical house loses 30 to 45 percent of its heat. Some are in obvious places; some are in places most of us would never think to look. When a north wind blows, the cold air finds its way into these openings on the north side of the house and forces heated air out through similar openings on the opposite side of the house. If every gas heated home were properly caulked and weather-stripped, we would save enough natural gas each year to heat about four million homes.

COMSEC: Unit stresses need for security

**"DO NOT DISCUSS CLASSIFIED INFORMATION.
THIS TELEPHONE IS SUBJECT TO MONITORING AT ALL TIMES.
USE OF THIS TELEPHONE CONSTITUTES CONSENT TO MONITORING."**

The information above is printed on the red label attached to the front of every official Department of Defense telephone. DD Form 2056, "Telephone Monitoring Notification Decal," warns people that their telephone is subject to communications security telephone monitoring and recording.

COMSEC telephone monitoring is conducted on official telephone systems to determine the amount of classified information and information of intelligence value being revealed over unprotected telephone systems. Use of official DOD telephones and telephone systems constitutes consent by the user to COMSEC telephone monitoring.


Other telecommunications devices that are also subject to monitoring are: unsecured radio, facsimile machines, data modems, computer systems and networks, and cellular telephones. The base populace must be aware that **all** telecommunications devices are subject to monitoring. Military operations are susceptible to compromise through unauthorized signals intercept when sensitive information is passed over unsecured telecommunications.

Telecommunications devices that transmit your information through commercial radio waves include adversary signals intelligence organizations, terrorist groups, organized crime, drug traffickers and hobbyists.

The Air Force Information Warfare Center is the only Air Force organization authorized to perform communications security monitoring of telecommunications devices used by the Air Force. Personal privacy information inadvertently obtained while monitoring official telecommunications will not be recorded, reported or filed.

Just remember, the use of official DOD telecommunications systems constitutes consent by the user to communications security monitoring. If you must discuss or transmit sensitive or classified information, use a secure mode of transmission.

Fuel efficiency targeted

Changes aim to produce savings

On Oct. 1, the Air Force implemented a program to decentralize aviation fuel funding. This means each base is now provided a fuel budget to be managed at base level instead of at the Air Force level.

The objectives of the program are to provide wing commanders control over aviation fuel expenditures, encourage management efficiencies to reduce fuel consumption, develop more accurate aircraft fuel consumption rates based on actual wing experience and flying profiles, enhance budget preparation accuracy, and increase financial flexibility in managing operations and maintenance dollars and any savings accrued through conservation efforts.

What this means to Team Reese is our aviators are now allotted a specific

amount of money to pay for the fuel we use for training. Anything we save, we keep! However, if we begin to exceed our fuel budget, measures will be taken to correct the trend. The expected benefits include reduced costs through increased fuel efficiency, energy conservation, and more accurate consumption data through increased management attention.

There's a built-in incentive for us to manage our fuel dollars carefully: any savings we generate we can transfer to other wing accounts at the discretion of the wing commander. Funds saved can be applied in numerous areas, all of which result in a better work environment, services and, in general, provide a better quality of life for our people.

In the first three months of the fiscal year, we're 7 percent below budget. our goal is a year-end savings of \$120,000. We're off to a good start!



Tuesday tax session can aid late filers

If you haven't filed a federal tax return for several years, you probably think the Internal Revenue Service is the last place you want to go, right? **WRONG! WRONG! WRONG!**

The IRS indicates many people fail to file tax returns because of personal problems, which may have included a serious illness, a death in the family, family interruptions, divorce or lack of financial records. Depending upon your situation, the IRS may waive some of the penalties that normally apply when a return has not been timely filed.

Gary O. Booth, director of the Dallas IRS office (Lubbock is in the Dallas district) explained, "We want to get people back into the system, not prosecute taxpayers who made a mistake. However, we will continue to investigate flagrant cases involving criminal violations of tax law."

The IRS has implemented a special "nonfiler program" nationwide, which offers free tax return preparation assistance to those who need to file prior year returns. There is no time limit on this program, but the IRS says now is the time to file. IRS employees will be at Reese from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday in Bldg. 230 to assist individuals who wish

to file past due returns.

There are three major reasons you should go in and file past due tax returns, according to the IRS:

□ Not filing a return is costing you more than you may think. If you owe tax, interest and penalties are adding up more quickly than you probably realize.

□ You may lose a refund that is due to you. If you are due a refund for withholding on estimated taxes paid, you must file your return within three years of the original due date, or the refund is forfeited. Statistics indicate that a third of those who filed past due returns discovered they had a refund coming.

□ It's the law.

Interest and penalties do not apply to years in which you are entitled to a refund, just to the years in which tax is due. Even if you do not have the money to pay the tax you may owe, filing now will avoid further penalties. The IRS will work with you to set up an installment payment agreement, if applicable.

IRS officials encourage affected people to gather their tax records and plan to file past due returns Tuesday.

This assistance program is for past due returns only. Assistance for the 1993 return will be offered at a later date by Reese personnel.

Contracting looks at function of QAEs

"Why is the dumpster full?" "Why is my food cold?" "Do we have taxi service on this base?"

Have you ever heard these kinds of questions, complaints or comments? Many important functions at Reese are performed by contractors. Therefore, often people are unsure who to contact about a question or problem.

When it has been determined a service can be performed more economically by a contractor than by government personnel, the commander of that organization's function becomes the contract's functional area chief.

The functional area chief, or "FAC," writes the statement of work and determines how much surveillance is required to ensure quality performance for minimum needs of the government. The FAC also assigns quality assurance evaluators to conduct the surveillance and evaluate performance.

A QAE is a technical expert who is trained in contracting principles and surveillance techniques. The QAE monitors the contractor's performance by using a quality

assurance surveillance plan. He or she also acts as a liaison between the contractor and base customers.

Each service contract over \$25,000 (and sometimes those under \$25,000) per year has about two QAEs, and these persons can answer questions and resolve most issues dealing with their particular contracts. Feedback of any nature can be brought to the QAE by completing an Air Force Form 714, "Customer Complaint Form" or by calling the QAE, who will discuss the issue with the contractor and return to you with a solution.

Some services, previously contracted out, like grounds maintenance and audiovisual services, are currently being performed by military and Air Force civilian employees. These services, therefore, do not require QAEs.

Customer complaint forms can be found in the contractor's work area, the QAE's office or in the 64th Contracting Squadron, Bldg. 800, third floor. The QAE can discuss the issue with you over the telephone, but for documentation purposes, an AF Form 714 is needed.

QAEs (listed at right) are always interested in your comments on how their contractors are performing.

No. 1 Winter Driving Tip: Buckle Up Those Car Seats

(NAPS)—Keeping children safe and healthy is a year-round priority for every parent. Yet, every day, many parents unwittingly put their children at risk by using child car seats incorrectly—or not at all.

To ensure the safety of your young children this winter and throughout the year, keep them buckled into certified child car seats while traveling in the car. Each year, motor vehicle crashes kill about 650 children under the age of 4 and injure almost 50,000 others. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, as many as 455 deaths and 49,000 injuries could be prevented each year if all children under the age of 4 were properly secured in child car seats.

Dr. Mark Widome, professor of pediatrics at The Pennsylvania State University College of Medicine, says, "Winter creates several variables like cold weather, poor visibility and ice that can make even the shortest car trip potentially dangerous. But, at anytime of year, if there is any one thing a parent can do to add to a child's safety during the first few years, it is to put him or her in a child car seat when traveling in a car."

The message is clear: If you have a child under the age of 4, you need a child car seat. "Thanks to Midas Project Safe Baby, good car seats are now very affordable. Local Midas Muffler and Brake Shops are making seats available at wholesale cost," Widome says. "But it's not enough just to buy a child car seat, parents must learn to use seats correctly and to use them consistently."

✓ Dress your baby in clothing with legs. Do not use a sack sleeper or papoose bunting that prevents you from securing the car seat straps snugly between your baby's legs.

✓ Do not wrap your baby in a blanket before putting him or her into the car seat. If using a blanket, lay the blanket out over the car seat, cut holes in it and pull the car seat straps through. Place your baby in the seat on the blanket and fasten the harness. Then wrap the blanket over your baby and the harness.

✓ Always adjust the harness to accommodate seasonal clothing, leaving no slack.

Banked pilots enter re-qual training

Over two years have passed since the Air Force began the banked pilot program. As banked pilots return to Reese for requalification training in the T-38, many now view their non-flying assignments in a different light than when they were first placed in the program.

Although initially disappointed with being placed in the banking system, these pilots, now assigned to Graduate Flight in the 54th Flying Training Squadron, feel the program benefited both themselves and the Air Force.

For some banked pilots, the time away from the cockpit allowed them to begin or complete their master's degree. First Lt. Brian Reemmer, who was a supply officer at Hurlburt Field, Fla., said he got his master's out of the way. He completed a degree in aviation management from Embry Riddle Aeronautical Institute.

"I took night classes and completed it on my own time," he said. Although he was not anxious to return to school, he decided to take advantage of the time in the banked system because "it's so tough to get it done later when you're back on flying status," he said.

But perhaps more immediately valuable to the pilots than continuing their education was the broader knowl-

edge of the Air Force that they gained. Lieutenant Reemmer said, "I got to see what it takes to keep the planes flying. The average pilot coming straight out of training has no clue." First Lt. Butch Brandow agrees. "I know more about the support side (of the Air Force)." He learned how weapon systems are acquired and about the concerns of the non-rated officers who develop them. "It's not what you think about when you fly. It broadens your horizons," he said.

Lieutenant Brandow also redefined his career goals because of what he learned during his banked assignment as an antenna research engineer at Hanscom AFB, Mass. "I

fought to get a job where I could use my degree (electrical engineering). It was a good experience for me. I learned I wanted to be a pilot — not an engineer."

The pilots feel the "banked" experience will help them to be better officers. "The biggest benefit of the bank (for the Air Force) is officer development," said 1st Lt. Tim MacGregor, who worked in public affairs at Williams AFB, Ariz.; Shaw AFB, S.C., and the Pentagon. He said experience gained in working with non-rated officers and in seeing the support side of the Air Force will "benefit the Air Force now and down the road."

"It created more of a broad-

based knowledge," said 1st Lt. Brenda Pippel, who worked as both an adjutant and an executive officer at Beale AFB, Calif. "I saw all kinds of different things," she said. "I worked in two squadrons, one tanker squadron and one U-2 squadron, so I got to see the difference in their missions. On the ground, I saw what goes on in administration and in the orderly room."

In addition to gaining a wider view of the Air Force and receiving more specialized training, banked pilots also discovered being in the bank provided advantages in their personal life. "That time spent in the banked system gave my wife the opportunity to go to school and get her degree in Boston," said Lieutenant Brandow.

His schedule also allowed him to spend more time with his newly married wife. He worked nine to five. He was always there when the car broke down or for any problems that arose. When he needed to leave to take care of the unexpected home problems, there were no flight sorties that prevented him. "That was really nice for the first two years of our marriage," he said.

Of course the time "in the bank" had disadvantages, too, such as the lack of flying time. "When you take a green pilot and then let him sit for two years," said Capt. Marcus

Quint, Grad Flight commander, "that's not the most effective system. It's like having a big investment with little immediate return."

Time out of the cockpit produced frustration for banked pilots. "Two-and-one-half years of watching everyone else do the flying was horrible," said Lieutenant Pippel. "I felt like a bird with clipped wings."

After a banked pilot has served the Air Force in another capacity, usually about two years, he or she is taken out of the banked program and placed into a requalification program at a flying training wing. The requalification training program consists of 45 training days that include 30 flights and 11 simulator rides. "Compared to UPT, requalification is about one third of what they originally completed at undergraduate pilot training," said Captain Quint. "This is a significant number of sorties."

The goal of requalification training, according to Captain Quint, is "to produce for the customer a pilot who is likely to succeed in his or her respective follow-on assignment. Requalification pilots will be better (pilots) than when they got their wings and they'll be more specialized."

Grad flight pilots are happy to be back in the cockpit and many of them view their banked assignment as a valuable, although difficult, learning experience. "It was a good experience," said Lieutenant Reemmer as he sums up the feelings of many returned pilots "I can't think of a better way to do it, with the situation of reduced cockpits."

"Now I'm positive and motivated and I have a new respect for the opportunity to fly," said Lieutenant MacGregor. "At first, I felt the Air Force owed me a cockpit. It does not. The Air Force is gracious enough to let me fly. The Air Force gives me the privilege of flying," he said.

Perhaps the best aspect of the banked pilot program is the follow through on the part of the Air Force as it returns pilots to the cockpit. As Captain Quint said, "It was a promise that was kept."

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas — Six senior officer assignments were announced Jan. 14 by AETC personnel officials.



□ Col. Samuel J. Bole, 71st Flying Training Wing commander, Vance AFB, Okla., will become the director for athletic support at the U.S. Air Force Academy, in Colorado Springs, Colo., by Feb. 28. Replacing Col. Bole is Col. James N. Soligan, 24th Operations Group commander for the 24th Wing, at Howard AFB, Panama.





MEDGP, family support assist woman

Members of the 64th Medical Group exercise care and concern every day as they see patients. However, on Dec. 23, they had an opportunity to demonstrate care and concern in an unusual way.

A woman, a military dependent, was dropped off at the hospital by her daughter at 11:30 a.m. for a walk-in appointment, said Capt. Sharon Bailey, chief of social work services. Five hours later a nurse in primary care, Capt. Allen Henneman, noticed her still sitting in the waiting room.

"Just call the police and they will come and get me," the woman said.

When Captain Bailey spoke to her, the woman described her situation. "They were from Oklahoma and had been in the area three to four days," said Captain Bailey. Later, the squadron's first sergeant, MSgt. Dino Carroll, got in touch with the daughter. The daughter said she didn't want anything to do with her mother, said Captain Bailey. The daughter would not return to the hospital to pick her mother up. "The woman was upset, tearful, and angry. She had a briefcase, a pocketbook and no money," said Captain Bailey.

Captain Bailey checked with civilian agencies to see if they could provide shelter, food or money. "The Salvation Army could take her overnight, but she would have to leave at 8:30 in the morning," said Captain Bailey. "That wouldn't work. We would be off the next day, for our down day, and she would be without anywhere to stay again.

"We decided the best thing to do was get her back to Oklahoma. That's

when it got desperate," said Captain Bailey. She knew it would be difficult to find help late in the afternoon just two days before Christmas, but she did find help when she spoke to Phil Thierry, director of Reese Family Support Center.

"We could help, as long as the individual had an identification card," said Thierry. "In emergency situations, we can use the Holiday Food Fund, a private organization made up of donations from squadrons and military members to assist military members and their families in times of crisis," he said. "We help people throughout year."

Since two signatures were required for the check, Thierry called MSgt. Don Minnis, also with the family support center, and they met Captain Bailey and the woman at a fast food restaurant where the woman had a hot meal. "We were able to give her a check for \$55 for a bus ticket and enough money to buy food if she needed some," said Thierry. When she received the check, she was grateful and thankful, he said.

After cashing the check, Captain Bailey opened her home to the woman so she could get a shower and some warmer clothes. Then Captain Bailey took her to the bus station.

"She was my Christmas present," said Captain Bailey. "It gave more meaning to Christmas. It happened through people, like Captain Henneman. He cared enough to talk to her," she said.

"We should be proud of the agencies on base, the individuals and their dedication," she said. "I think we affected someone. We didn't solve the problem in her family, but she knows there are people who care."

New policy on women

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense Les Aspin announced policy changes Jan. 13 that could open thousands of combat support jobs to military women. Secretary Aspin announced a new standard definition for direct ground combat and the elimination of the Department of Defense's "risk rule."

Direct ground combat is now defined as "engaging an enemy on the ground with individual or crew-served weapons while being exposed to hostile fire and a high probability of direct physical contact with personnel of a hostile force. If a unit meets all three of these tests, it means that women will not be permitted to serve in that unit," Secretary Aspin said.

Until now, women were barred not only from serving in ground combat units, but also from support units that faced the same risk of direct enemy fire. The so-called "risk rule" will be rescinded Oct. 1, Secretary Aspin said. (Air Force News Service)





The U.S. Department of Commerce and the Small Business Administration strongly recommend that prospective franchisees inquire if a company is a member of the IFA. In order to maintain member status, a company must have a satisfactory financial condi-






