

#### PUSH LAYING HEN FOR FIVE MONTHS

Five months per year is enough in which to push hens into extra laying by extending the feeding hours through the use of lights. The North Carolina experiment station has just completed its second three-year test with laying bens and finds that the period between November 1 and April 1 is the period to use lights. For the remainder of the year, the birds should be allowed to feed dur

ing the normal daylight. Beginning with the pullet year, we have subjected bens to 36 consecu tive months of 14 feeding hours per day, securing the extra hours by us ing electric lights," says Dr. B. F Kaupp, head of the poultry depart ment at state college. "This past year warked the completion of the second such test. Our results show conclugively that a ben must have a rest period between each year of expessive to the extra hours. This is needed that she might replenish her depleted stores of vitamines, minerals and vitality. It is not wise to subject a hen to the extra feeding hours for more than five months of the year. and the time between November 1

and April 1 is recommended." Doctor Kaupp and his associates have found that a sudden reduction of the feeding hours will be accompanied by premature molting and that regular lighting will always give poor results in securing extra eggs.

#### Cod Liver Oil May Be Detrimental to Fowls

Prof. Eric Agudhr of Stockholm, Sweden, has issued a report which confirms doubt: as to how far cod fiver oil may be continued in the poul try ration with desirable results. In bis experiments with white mice he found that the continued use of this oll made the animals too fat at the end of the feeding period, that there was a swelling of the bodies, and that various organs and been adversely at fected. Other experiments with larger inimals gave similar results, While cod liver oil may help temporarily. I s possible that it may be positively harmful if used continuously. Appar ently it has had no detrimental effects in experiments in feeding it to poul try on this continent, but before it is made a regular article of dier for poul try, it should be given the most care ful and prolonged investigation.

to Destroy Parasites The best thing to treat hens for lice is sodium thoride. The best way to apply is to dip each ben, but this can be done only on a warm day One ounce of sodium fluoride to each gal ion of lukewarm water. Grasp the hen by the wings in your left hand and immerse her in the water and the feathers with your right hand so that the water will go to the Then hold your band over her nostrils and mouth and duck her head

### GOOD FOR EGGS

Poultry keepers who have used the all much method of feeding chicks and growing pullets may continue the method for laying pullets. The plan has proved satisfactory for fall and Winter egg production at the Ohio experiment station, and is being used by , many successful poultrymen.

The only change in the all mash for egg production, according to D. C. Kennard, station poultryman, is to increase the ment scraps from 5 to 10 per cent and decrease the corn from wheat may be used instead of middlings in the mush. And for best results. Mr. Kennard would also use

mitk in some form. Success with all-mash feeding the taying pullets, especially for winter eggs, is targety determined by the kind of mixture and manner of feed ing it. The mash should be as gran ular as possible rather than finely ground. A sultable type of feeder should provide 20 to 24 feet of eat ing space per 100 pullets. Fresh mash should be fed daily in the evening, the amount being about what will be consumed during the next 24 hours.

Electric lights may be used to ad cantage. A warm, moist mash fed in the evening, especially in cold weath er, may prove beneficial.

Details relative to the all-mash method of feeding layers may be had by writing the Ohio experiment statien at Wooster.

#### Laying Hens Must Have Ration Rich in Protein

from four to seven or more times her own body weight, depending upon the weight of the hen. And it is a wellknown fact that eggs are high in per entage of protein. Logically therefore, it follows that laying bens must be fed a ration which is rich in protein if they are to turn ont this amount of protein-rich product and still maintain the muscle, sinew and blood in their own bodies.

Home-grown grains, such as wheat oats, barley and corn, while they ali contain a certain proportion of protein, all rank as carbohydrate-rich flesh and provide heat and energy, but tacking in sufficient proportion of protein to meet the requirements of heavy egg production. Milifeeds, suck as bran and shorts, contain proportion ately more protein than do whole grains, but they, !!kewise, fail to supply the needed amount. If the ration fed to laying hens contains these feeds protein-rich supplement, the feeder cannot expect high egg production; the hen simply cannot produce eggs. but can only turn the curbohydrateinto surplus body fat.






