The T-38 competition is the first of three short-notice events involving Reese aircraft.

The T-37 team will compete at Sheppard Wednesday and the T-1A team will compete at Vance on May 17 and 18.

Reese's T-37 flight team is expected to be announced by AETC officials today. The two-person team will include one of the 35th FTS flight commanders and an instructor pilot.

# AF lists FY-1996 force reductions

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFMPC) — As a sign the largest portion of the Air Force drawdown is complete, the service is only offering an early retirement program and not the Voluntary Separation Benefit or Special Separation Bonus for fiscal 1996.

To meet its fiscal 1996 force reduction targets, the Air Force

needs 1,000 officers and 1,500 enlisted members to separate.

This is the first year since fiscal 1992 the Air Force did not offer VSI/SSB.


The people eligible for early retirement is more limited than last year when the Air Force needed 1,800 officers and 17,000 enlisted to voluntarily (Continued on page 4)





# Recycling helps Reese, environment

Do you know what recycling is? Why do we need to recycle? What are the benefits of recycling? What do you need to do if you have recyclable goods and who do you need to contact?

Webster's dictionary defines recycling as, "to put or pass through a cycle again; to recover useful materials from garbage or waste; to extract and reuse useful substances recovered from waste; to recondition and adapt to a new use or function."

Recycling saves energy, natural resources and landfill space. If current trends continue, Americans will throw away annually more than 1 million tons of aluminum cans and foil, more than 11 million tons of glass bottles and jars, more than 4.5 million tons of office paper and nearly 10 million tons of newspaper.

Much of this could be recycled, reducing the environmental damage caused by mining, logging and manufacturing raw materials, and decreasing the amount of garbage being sent to landfills.

By recycling, we can save or recover a significant portion of the energy and raw material used in manufacturing new products. For instance, 20 cans can be produced from recycled aluminum with the same amount of energy that it would take to manufacture a single new can from raw materials. In addition to saving energy, recycling can extend the useful life of existing landfills. Where trash is incinerated, removing glass and metals can actually im-



prove the combustion process.

Each building on base has recycling locations for office and industrial recyclables. The Resource Recovery and Recycling Program workers pick up from housing residents every Tuesday, as well as offer drop-off services at the Base Exchange parking lot recycling trailer. RRRP personnel also provide special pick up services for bulk items. If you're having a party, they will also provide containers to put empty cans, glass and plastic bottles in and pick it up for you. This makes clean up a snap.

The RRRP shop is now providing a new service. Every Tuesday, along with recyclables, they will pick up yard waste. Please put any yard waste such as grass, leaves, or small branches in a plastic bag and set it on the curb along with your recycling bags. This waste will be hauled to a large composting facility located southeast of Lubbock, keeping these bulky items out of our landfills.

To request pick-up service of bulk items, or if you would like additional information on recycling, call the RRRP office at 3815.

Eligible officers include all line non-deferred captains, majors and lieutenant colonels, except pilots (llXX), navigators (12XX) and air weapons directors (13BXB, 13BXC and 13BXD); all deferred line majors and lieutenant colonels and all Dental Corps lieutenant colonels and majors except orthodontists (47BX), pediatric dentists (47KX) and oral surgeons (47SX).

Also included are all Nurse Corps lieutenant colonels except nurse anesthetists (46MX); deferred majors and lieutenant colonels in the Biomedical Sciences and Judge Advocate Corps and all chaplain non-deferred captains, majors and lieutenant colonels.

Officers specifically ineligible for this program are those promoted below-the zone, unless they have subsequently been deferred, and officers with an active-duty service commitment that can't be waived. There are other minor exclusions and the Reese MPF has the details.

Eligible enlisted members for early retirement must be a master sergeant or below with a total active federal military service date of Sept. 30, 1978, or earlier. Individuals in a AFSC with a "T" prefix are excluded along with those in excluded AFSCs (listed later)

for early retirement must meet tration by their separation If a person is in an excluded AFSC and they are released or returned to another eligible AFSC before Jan. 1, then they may apply.

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# Terror in Oklahoma

Emergency response forces from nearby Tinker AFB were among the first to provide on-scene assistance.

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Within hours of the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, Air Force members were on scene helping to rescue the victims.

Officials said a powerful car bomb exploded outside the building at approximately 9 a.m. April 19, killing more than 95 people — including several children — and injuring hundreds. They said the death toll is still rising.

An Army soldier and a military family member were killed in the explosion, Department of Defense officials said April

Approximately 56 Army and Marine Corps recruiters work in the building. Two soldiers and four Marines have been soldier, five Marines and six military civilians are unaccounted for, DOD officials said.

An airman assigned to Tinker AFB, Okla., also is unaccounted for, said Air Force officials at the Air Force Military Personnel Center.

A fire and rescue team from Tinker, located about seven miles southeast of Oklahoma City, was the first Air Force unit to arrive at the scene.

Tinker officials were called at 9:55 a.m. and by 10:14 a.m. the team was on site, said Alfredia McGill, a base spokesperson. Two ambulances were dispatched shortly after that.

By mid-morning the followingday, McGill said, more than 300 Tinker medical, fire, rescue, civil engineering and bomb hospitalized, while another dog teams were helping local

authorities.

Tinker has been named DOD's primary support - central staging — facility to dispatch military assistance to the site, said Army Maj. Gen. Robert H. Scales Jr., DOD's director of military support, at an April 20 Pentagon press con-

Hundreds of Air Force and DOD people have mobilized to help in the rescue effort, said military officials, although a by-service breakdown of the participants is not yet available.
