

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# Who needs to chew?

# Those tobacco products can take more than the sparkle off your smile.

Small abrasive particles in tobacco products may severely wear away tooth enamel, according to research published in the March issue of the Journal of the American Dental Association.

Researchers from the Baylor College of Dentistry in Dallas examined samples from 16 brands of cigars, eight brands of snuff and four brands of chewing tobacco and several unprocessed tobacco leaves used as cigar wrappers.

They found that these tobacco products, like many plants, contain tiny silica particles that are known to be abrasive to teeth. The researchers concluded that when tobacco products are mixed with saliva and chewed, an abrasive paste is formed that, over time, can wear down teeth.

The minute size of most particles prevents the chewer from perceiving the product as being too gritty, but the particles are abrasive in spite of their size.

The authors found that people who habitually chew foreign materials, consume a coarse diet or are repeatedly exposed to air that contains high levels of abrasive dust can experience increased tooth enamel and dentin abrasion.

Dental researchers have known that people who use tobacco products

are more likely to suffer from tooth enamel and dentin abrasion than people who do not chew any tobacco products. Until now, researchers did not know what caused this erosion.

The Baylor researchers are among the first to discover that silica is the main cause of this abrasion in people who use tobacco products. The authors found in their research that, on average, insoluble silica comprised 0.5 percent of the weight on an average tobacco sample.

"Tobacco products are known to cause oral soft-tissue lesions, such as leukoplakia and cancer, but they may directly affect the teeth," said William H. Bowles, Ph.D, D.D.S., associate professor in the Department of Biomedical Sciences at Baylor.

Smokeless tobacco also has been linked to an increased risk for oral cancer. Nationwide, 30,000 cases of oral cancer are diagnosed each year and 9,000 deaths are attributed to oral cancer.

The 64th Medical Group Dental Clinic recommends that people avoid using tobacco products and that they see their dentist regularly for an oral cancer examination.





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
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Cinco De Mayo Celebration

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# Aircraft demonstrations add spice to Reese Air Show

In addition to a performance by the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds, the May 13 and 14 Reese Air Show will include several other aerial demonstrations and flybys.

#### **Bud Light Micro Jet**

It's fast, it's tiny, it's amazing. It's the Bud Light Micro Jet; the smallest jet in the world.

When people see the red and white Bud Light BD-5, they find it hard to imagine that something so tiny can actually take to the air with a person inside. But it does, zipping across the flight line at speeds approaching 300 mph. Pilots Leo Loudenslager, Bill "Burner" Beardsley and Jack Ekl put the BD-5 through its paces.

#### WACO Mystery Ship and Wingwalker

During the wing-walking routine, watch in anticipation as Jim Franklin takes off in his UPF-7 WACO with Lee Oman riding on the lower wing. Keep watching as Lee quickly climbs to the upper wing, standing in the wing-walk

rack. Witness the action as Lee rides through all kinds of aerobatic maneuvers including torque rolls, tail slides and spins.

Making this act unique, Lee and Jim do together what no other pilot and wing walker have even attempted, the Axle Hang, where Lee will hang by the Wheel Axle underneath the WACO while Jim performs Loops and Rolls.

#### Pfeifler Airshows 327 HP Edge 540

Pfeifler Airshows performance consists of a series of precise unlimited aerobatic maneuvers flown in exacting sequence in front of the showline.

Highlights this year are combinations of tumbles, slides, loops, rolls, and multiple snaps flown both inside and outside. During the performance the pilot will endure over nine positive Gs and five negative Gs. The Edge monoplane possesses the fastest roll rate of any production aircraft today.

With a power-to-weight ratio approaching one-to-one, the vertical performance is breathtaking.

Also performing in the civilian category are a SU-26 and FE-5/AN-2. These are two outstanding aircraft you

# AF predicts fewer approvals for service waivers

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFMPC)
— For the past five years, the Air Force
Military Personnel Center here granted
numerous waivers to individuals with
active duty service commitments so
they could leave the service early. The
reason was the Air Force was drawing
down one third of its force and the
waivers were needed to meet the
service's force reduction goals.

But with the closing of a large fiscal 1995 force reduction program and recent opening of a small 1996 program, the evidence points to a majority of the drawdown being over. And because of

this, the ADSC waivers, once easy to receive, are now harder to get, according to a personnel official here. ADSCs are agreements between the Air Force and service members where they agree on a number of years on active duty in exchange for such things as training, schooling or accepting an assignment.

"Backin 1988, we had 608,000 people in the Air Force, but by October 1995, the Air Force will have approximately 400,000 people on active duty," said Lt. Col. Chris Livingston, Retirements and Separations Branch chief AFMPC. "Drawdown programs such as early

retirement will probably only be offered sparingly. And, according to Livingston, "They will be very limited and only to a select targeted group of people."


With this trend, the use of waivers to shorten or eliminate active duty service commitments in the future is also limited.

Livingston is the first to admit the major change in handling ADSC waivers will come as a surprise to many people.

"People were conditioned over the past five years that ADSCs really didn't mean anything," he said. "If a person really wanted to leave the service, AFMPC would grant a waiver and they could go. People need to realize, however, the Air Force tightened the use of waivers over the last year and may get even tighter in the future."

"People need to know situations like finding a good job in the Guard, Reserve or civilian sector is not considered a hardship for leaving."

Seventy-five of the \$100 should go towards peri-annual flowers, bushes and shrubs. No more than \$25 should go to annuals such as petunias or geraniums.


