House committee approves 1996 pay hike Bill includes innovative program to upgrade housing

On the same day the House voted to balance the federal budget by 2002, it conducted a "mark-up" that would give military people more money in next year's check and better quality of life.

The 238-193 vote calls for a seven-year road map that will slow government spending by \$1.4 trillion. In a separate May vote, the House National Security Committee's subcommittees on readiness and per-

> In addition, the subcommittees asked for a 5.2 percent increase in the basic allowance for quarters next year, saying it will reduce average out-ofpocket housing cost to 19.5 percent of pay. Moreover, the bill establishes a variable housing allowance to meet the cost of housing in high-cost areas.

"Our all-volunteer military is built first and foremost on people," said House Personnel sonnel approved full funding Subcommittee Chairman Rob-

ert Dornan, R-Calif. "This bill developers, lawmakers said. keeps faith with our military personnel and their families by adding to their pay and ben-


The Defense Department would also get \$1.56 billion to build more housing, barracks and enlisted quarters for military personnel and their families. Under this plan, a Family Housing Improvement Fund would be created, allowing DOD to invest up to 35 percent of the cost of a housing project in partnership with private

"There is a real crisis in military housing, and this bill starts to address it," said Rep. Joel Hefley, R-Colo., chairman of the House Military Installations and Facilities Subcommittee.

At the same time, the House Morale, Welfare and Recreation Panel fully funded the administration's request for MWR functions, including the commissary and exchange system, child care centers and a range of education facilities.

Lawmakers said proceeds from the commissary and exchange — which generate \$17 billion in gross revenues yearly—will continue to fund many MWR programs.

"These are important benefits for our military personnel. They reduce their cost of living and make their lives more enjoyable. By cutting costs, we will be able to provide greater service without increased appropriations," said Rep. John McHugh, R-N.Y., MWR panel chairman.

A true story

Confession of an ex-neglectful mother

I would have never considered myself as a "bad

I cooked, cleaned and spent time with my children. At the time I had five children in my care. Their ages ranged from 3 to 9 years old.

One day while I was cooking dinner, the children asked if they could go outside to play. I said they could go and gave them the rules — "no pool, watch out for the 3- year-old and stay close to the apartment."

Thirty minutes later my husband came home from work asking me where the children were. I told him they were outside. He said he hadn't seen them and went out looking for them.

When he found four of them standing at the edge of the pool he looked around for the 3-year old. He finally spotted his head bobbing up and down in the pool. My husband dove into the pool and saved the child's life.

If it had been only minutes later we would have been preparing for a child's funeral. I would have lived eternally sorrowful for allowing my 3-yearold out of my sight.

I realized that I had put my children in jeopardy. The other four children watched the 3-yearold almost drown because they did not know what to do. Emotionally they would have been scarred

This situation was neglectful on my part because I let the 3- year-old go out with four young children which placed the 3-year-old in a harmful situation.

Remember: Children under the age of 6 should not be left with another child under the age of 12.

Don't make the same mistake I did; not all situations end up happily ever after.

Reese student pilot saves T-37 on first solo flight

Imagine you're a student pilot flying your first solo flight. Everything goes well until you try to land and realize the landing gear won't come down.

Second Lt. John Bosone, SUPT Class 96-02 was recently awarded an Air Education and Training Command "Atta Boy Award" for successfully handling that very situation.

"During my third approach, the gear wouldn't come down," said the lieutenant about the emergency. "I broke out of the pattern and noticed I only had 400 pounds of hydraulic pressure compared to the normal 1,250 to 1,550 lbs."

Lieutenant Bosone said his initial reaction was wondering, "What did I do?"

The lieutenant said he then remembered what Capt Scott Cason, USMC,B-Flight commander, had told the students during morning stand-up sessions. "The captain told us to maintain control of the aircraft

first, because it isn't going to just fall out of the sky."

Lieutenant Bosone began to follow emergency procedures and declared an emergency to the runway supervisory unit to inform them of the situa-

"Lieutenant Bosone remained calm and kept his composure," said Captain Cason, who assisted the lieutenant through the emergency landing from his post in the RSU. "He followed the checklist to the letter and brought the plane in with minimal assistance from the RSU," said Captain Cason.

The successful landing was also aided by Lt. Scott Bailey, USN, who was piloting a T-37 chase ship. Lieutenant Bailey flew into formation position to check Lieutenant Bosone's aircraft and to assist him with the checklist.

By following the checklist, Lieutenant Bosone pulled negative "Gs" to help him knock the gear handle down. "After the handle was down, the landing gear didn't come down,"

explained Lieutenant Bosone.
"The nose and right gear finally came down, but the left
gear didn't. Then I used the
emergency extension system
to force the left landing gear
down."

After getting the gear down, Lieutenant Bosone made a "no flap landing" to safely bring the aircraft down -- the text-book landing for an aircraft with hydraulic problems.

The lieutenant was quick to credit the stand-up sessions with his instructors and the emergency procedures faced in the T-37 simulators as keys in his successful landing.

The experience has given Lieutenant Bosone more con-

fidence and made him more aware. "I'm a lot more conscious when looking over everything in preflight."

Even though this wasn't a typical solo flight and the debriefings lasted for three hours — Lieutenant Bosone's classmates still threw him into the solo dunk tank.

He didn't mind at all.



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Local Area Networks

Communications helps Reese build its own information super highway

The wing is now on the verge of realizing its own information superhighway now that most functional areas at Reese recently had local area networks installed.

The next step is to connect the LANs with fiber optic cable. Currently the base has four buildings equipped with five optics. Reese hopes to expand that number to about 30 buildings by the end of this year.

The installation of the LAN system started about 18 months ago, with the first basewide LAN planning meetings. The meetings included representatives from most of the units on base and Reese's Systems Telecommunications Engineering Manager Mark Moore.

The LAN "seed" was sown then. It grew with subsequent meetings, and under the development of the LAN's chief architect, SSgt. Robert Battles, a concept for implementation was developed. Functional base representatives were provided a "template" communications requirements document and asked to provide which computers they wanted connected to their LAN. Armed with this, Sergeant Battles assembled a base requirements plan.

Upon approval of the concept, the 272nd Engineering Installation Squadron, LaPorte Air National Guard Station, Texas, was selected to provide engineering and installation of our LANs. The unit performed two engineering site surveys to develop a list of materials and a program support agreement, which detailed what equipment was to be installed in the various locations

around Reese.
The team began insta


The team began installation in January, and with the as-

sistance of several base agencies installed LANs in 26 functional areas. The original plan called for 534 LAN connections, but as the team began installation, Reese requirements expanded to 622 connections. The team used over 110,000 feet of the best unshielded twisted pair copper cable to connect all the LAN drops to the 26 building hubs.

With engineers on site for the duration and Sergeant Battles'help, they were able to accommodate many changes and deliver a state-of-the art LAN system.

We now have 26 LANs. In the future, fiber optic cable will expand the system capabilities. Even without it, many people have already begun using the LANs and are beginning to appreciate what they can do to increase mission effectiveness.

Besides file sharing, print sharing and other common benefits, the applications are

limited only by one's imagina-

Some of the other time-saving things people can do (especially when connected with fiber optic cable) include using electronic mail, Defense Data Network/Internet access, shared modems, electronic forms, electronic imaging

(graphics/photos), automated flight schedules, computer facsimiles, video (pilot training, AF News), multi-user CD-ROMs and many, many other applications that will allow all to better support the wing mission.

The LANs are yet another result of "Team Reese" in action."

Panel tabs DOD programs healthy, but cites 48 areas for improvement

WASHINGTON—Military sexual harassment and discrimination prevention programs are "fundamentally healthy," but a Pentagon task force found 48 areas where the services must get tougher.

Findings of the Department of Defense Task Force on Discrimination and Sexual Harassment were announced at a recent Pentagon press briefing.

After nearly a yearlong study, the task force found that, overall, the military services handle most complaints effectively.

However, it also cited instances where "things went wrong" — where complaints were not taken seriously, not handled quickly enough, were improperly investigated or where reprisals occurred.

Secretary of the Air Force Sheila E. Widnall and Edwin Dorn, under secretary of defense for personnel and readiness, who co-chaired the task force, released the report, which will act as a policy guideline for the services.

Some of the areas cited were new for the DOD program, but Dorn said most were basic policies already in place in some of the services, "in many instances for years."

Secretary Widnall said she believed the study was the "most intensive review of the military's equal opportunity and treatment system" ever.

"It's fair to say that many of our recommendations have already been adopted," the secretary said.

The study stemmed from the March 1994 directive by Defense Secretary William J. Perry and former Deputy Secretary of Defense John M. Deutch calling for a complete review of DOD's discrimination complaint process, including recommended improvements.

Agreed to by the task force were the fundamental goals needed for a successful EOT program for the services: unit effectiveness and individual opportunity and fairness.

"We identified five principles upon which a successful military EOT program must be based to fulfill these goals," Secretary Widnall said.

The key principle, and paramount to the program's success, is commander support. "They should be responsible and accountable," for EOT programs, she said.

Other principles are: distinct programs for each service, a clear policy, effective training and prompt, thorough and fair handling of complaints.

An updated DOD directive, incorporating the task force recommendations, is expected to be released soon.

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



AF officials define content of officer selection records

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)—Every officer has an officer selection record, or OSR, at the Air Force Military Personnel Center here.

Air Force selection boards review these records, so it's important for people to know what is in them and how to review their OSR, say personnel officials.

Record clerks at AFMPC screen the records for missing documents several months before a board, but it's ultimately each officer's responsibility to ensure his or her record is current and correct, say officials.

Board members score the contents of the OSR using the whole-person-concept (performance, professional competence, leadership, job responsibility, breadth and depth of experience, specific achievements and professional and military education).

The OSR is organized with performance, effectiveness and training reports filed in chronological order, with the most recent report on top, on the left side of the record. For periods of time not covered by a performance, effectiveness or training report, an Air Force Form 77 fills that space. The form

can stand alone in a selection record for one of three reasons: to document an administrative error such as a missing report, to document a break in service, or as the result of an approved appeals action removing a prior report.

For promotion boards, the top left document will be the Promotion Recommendation Form, or PRF.

On the right side of the OSR are citations for decorations. For officers who were selected to attend a professional military education course in residence but could not because of operational commitments, there also will be an operational deferment letter on the right side of the OSR. Any Article 15 or court-martial information will be the top document.

When an officer is meeting a promotion board, there will also be one or more loose documents in the OSR, including an officer selection brief. This computer-generated document lists such information as the person's duty history, date of rank, PME, academic education, joint experience, and flying history.

This brief is specifically gen-

erated for promotion boards and sent to eligible officers about 90 days before their board meets. It's important to review this pre-selection brief for accuracy, officials said. If an officer finds an error or doesn't receive a pre-selection brief, the person should contact the servicing military personnel flight.

If a document is missing from an OSR, AFMPC will send a letter requesting the document from the local MPF. A copy of this request will be kept in the OSR until the document is received and filed.

Officers can review their selection records by writing to: HQ AFMPC/DPMABR4, 550 C Street West, Suite 5, Randolph AFB TX 78150-4707. Requesters should include their name, address, and Social Security number.

People can also request a copy of their record as it met a specific board by including the name and date of the board. Officers can also visit the records review room at AFMPC to review their OSR. They can also confirm that a specific document is in their record by calling the officer records section at DSN 487-5404.

Latest drawdown numbers released

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) — The latest numbers of people who have applied for early retirement under the fiscal 1996 Voluntary Early Retirement Program were released by the Air Force Military Personnel Center here.

As of May 23,the center received 655 applications from enlisted members, and 355 applications from officers. Following is a breakdown of applications by rank:

Enlisted — Senior airman 1; staff sergeant 72; technical sergeant 282; master sergeant 300; total 655.

Officers — Captain 49; major 235; lieutenant colonel 71; total 355.

The goals are 1,200 enlisted and 1,000 officer volunteers.

Commission submits report

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Commission on Roles and Missions — a congressionally mandated panel that for a year has been studying ways to streamline the armed forces — has submitted its report to Congress and the Department of Defense.

Air Force leadership embraced the roles and missions review at its outset as a "timely and potentially useful review of practices" that were agreed to and developed through a period of time.

Maj. Gen. Charles D. Link, the special assistant to the Air Force secretary and chief of staff for roles and missions, has said, "Some of the practices are now overcome by political and technological change."

DOD now "will conduct an extensive analysis and review of the commission's recommendations ... and has 90 days to submit comments on the report to Congress," read a DOD statement issued May 24. "Therefore, there will be no official comment on the report prior to the congressional response."

Court-martial sentence announced

DAVIS-MONTHAN AFB, Ariz. (AFNS) — Air Force Col. William E. Pellerin was sentenced to forfeit \$1,500 per month for five months and to receive a written reprimand May 22 after being found guilty of two allegations of dereliction of duty associated with his performance of duty as commander of the 92nd Operations Group at Fairchild AFB, Wash., last year.

Pellerin had pleaded guilty to the two offenses in a military judge alone proceeding on May 19. His plea was part of a pretrial agreement in which he offered to plead guilty to the two offenses in exchange for a third offense being dismissed and limitations on the amount of punishment which could be imposed.

By law, the agreed-upon punishment limitations were not disclosed to the judge until after he announced his own adjudicated sentence. However, the pretrial agreement's sentence limitation will not affect the judge's announced sentence, because the judge's sentence did not exceed the agreed limits.

The first dereliction of duty of which Pellerin was found guilty involved failure to obtain required higher headquarters approvals for aerial maneuvers and failing to ensure that maximum bank angles were not exceeded in airshow-related flights. The second dereliction involved failure to make adequate inquiry into a pilot's qualifications to perform flying duties after becoming aware of issues concerning the pilot's airmanship and air discipline.

The pilot and crew died in a B-52 crash in 1994 while practicing for an airshow at Fairchild.

The offense that was dismissed was an allegation that the accused had been derelict in his duties by failing to remove the pilot from flying duties.


