

General Boles assumes command of AETC



General Boles

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AETCNS) — Gen. Billy J. Boles became the second commander of the Air Education and Training Command Tuesday when he assumed command from Gen. Henry Viccellio Jr.

General Viccellio had commanded AETC since its standup in July 1993. He goes to Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, where he'll become com-

mander of the Air Force Materiel Command.

Officiating at the ceremony was Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman.

General Boles, who had been vice commander of AETC since April 1995, was promoted to general prior to the change of command ceremony. Assuming the vice commander position was Lt. Gen. Clark Griffith, previously the com-

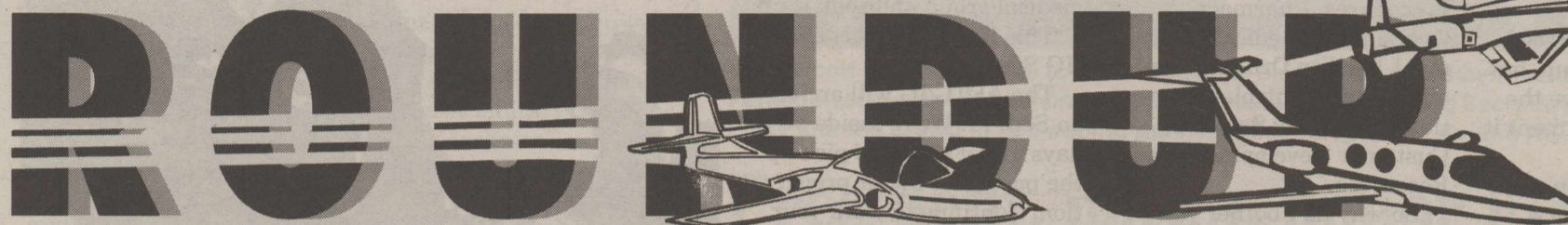
mander of AETC's 2nd Air Force at Keesler AFB, Miss.

"Today's ceremony is a significant milestone in the history of the United States Air Force and Air Education and Training Command," said General Fogleman during the ceremony.

"It signifies the orderly transfer of authority — the passing of the reigns of command from one great leader to

another. AETC performs a vital mission for our Air Force. It recruits, trains and educates the quality people who make our service great, and who willingly respond to crisis around the globe with decisive air and space power. So this command must have the very best in leadership," said General Fogleman.

AETC's annual short-notice competition tests the day-to-day professional and leadership skills of AETC flight com-

manders and maintenance teams.

New AETC commander Gen. Billy Boles and 19th AF commander Maj. Gen. Nicholas Kehoe praised the competitors for the closeness of the competition and Laughlin for "a great job organizing and executing" the final stage of the Top Flight competition.

AETC units with unique missions competed among themselves.

The units then deployed to Laughlin for the arrival competition.

Each flight was assigned an arrival time and the flight was videotaped over the arrival point against an official clock. A T-38 team from Sheppard AFB, Texas and a T-1A team from Vance AFB, Okla., won the arrival competition.

The aircrews flew a predetermined flight profile and examiners accompanying the flights graded mission briefings, instruction, maneuvers and error analysis.

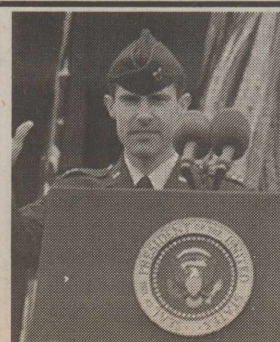
Civilian maintenance teams selected their teams after being notified of the competition date.

Maintenance teams were judged on preflight inspection, launch, recovery, refuel and forms documentation.

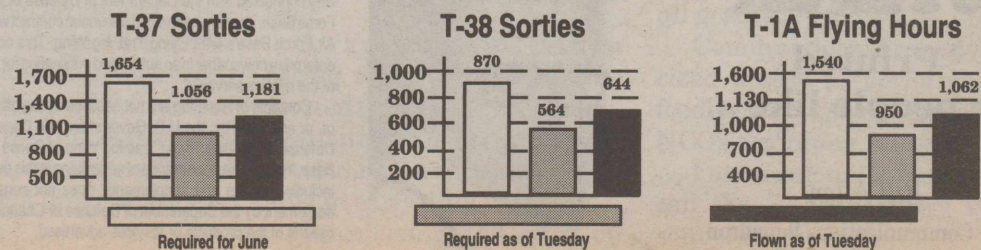

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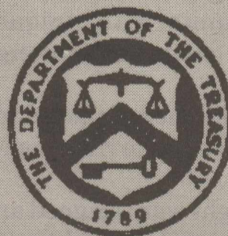

by the chief (General Fogleman) and the secretary (Sheila Widnall) with eager anticipation," said General Boles. "AETC, as the first command, literally shapes the Air Force of the future. "We will probably commission the chief of staff who will lead the Air Force during the year 2020 - 2030 time frame," General Boles added. That is certainly an awesome opportunity and challenge. But I also know we have the best people in the Air Force in the command, and they can meet any challenge."

As the AETC commander, General Boles is responsible for recruiting and accessing Air Force people and providing them military, technical and flying training.

Prior to becoming the AETC vice commander in April, General Boles served as the deputy chief of staff for personnel, Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington D.C.

General Boles began his Air Force career in 1962, receiving his commission through the Reserve Officer Training Corps.

2nd AF gets new commander

President, nation honor F-16 pilot

Officials cite professionalism of rescue forces

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Four days after his dramatic rescue, Capt. Scott O'Grady said the reaction to his return from Bosnia still amazes him and that his rescuers deserve the fanfare.

At a rainy Pentagon welcome ceremony June 12, hosted by Defense Secretary William Perry and accompanied by President Clinton, Captain O'Grady said, "I just can't believe this response. It's just overwhelming."

The approximately 500 people who attended the ceremony welcomed the captain with applause and cheers as he got out of the presidential limousine flanked by President Clinton, Secretary Perry and Gen. John M. Shalikashvili, chair-

man of the Joints Chiefs of staff.

Captain O'Grady's F-16 was shot down by a surface-to-air missile south of the Bosnian city of Banja Luka June 2. He evaded capture by Bosnian Serb forces for six days before his rescue June 8 by a Marine Corps search and rescue team with multinational support.

President Clinton, who hosted Captain O'Grady, his family and some of his friends at a White House luncheon before the ceremony, praised the rescue effort and its participants.

Secretary Perry said the ceremony celebrated "true grit, great training, superior technology and outstanding leadership."

Leaders of the rescue operation were hoping for a night rescue to take advantage of the military's night-vision technology. But when Captain O'Grady's signal was received — just hours before dawn — the decision had to be made to either wait another 18 hours until nightfall or attempt a daylight extraction.

"They chose to go," Secretary Perry said. "It was a gutsy decision that turned out to be the right decision."

Two hours and five minutes after receiving the captain's signal — "This is Badger 5-2" — the rescue team was on the ground. And in just a little over two minutes, they had the downed pilot aboard a helicopter and headed for safety.

AF begins implementing EES changes

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) — Implementing changes to the Enlisted Evaluation System is under way, according to Air Force Military Personnel Center officials here.

Some changes begin immediately while others require additional time to phase in.

Beginning now, raters for technical sergeants and below must document the initial and midterm performance feedback session date in Section V, or performance feedback certification block, of Air Force Form 910. If either of the dates are omitted, raters must give a reason for not providing one or both dates.

Feedback is now mandatory for all senior NCOs beginning immediately. Performance feedback notices to both the rater and ratee will be generated beginning in November; however, military personnel flights have guidance on how to implement senior NCO feedback. Initial feedback for senior NCOs must be completed by July 31, personnel officials said.

Air Force Form 911 used for rating senior NCOs is being revised to add a feedback certification block in Section V. The revised forms should be available in early July.

Other changes effective im-

mediately include:

- Raters must review personnel information files before writing EPRs.

- Those people in the enlisted performance report rating chain for technical sergeants and below are authorized access to performance feedback worksheets.

- EPR rating expectations (guidelines) are rescinded for all grades.

Commanders are authorized access to performance feedback worksheets for senior NCOs beginning Aug. 1.

New technical sergeant list out June 28

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) — The Air Force plans to release a listing of the service's newest technical sergeants June 28, contrary to what is being announced by some media outlets, Air Force Military Personnel Center officials said.

VA to accept private physicians' statements

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Veterans Affairs announced it has published in the Federal Register regulations that will allow VA to rate veterans' compensation and pension claims based on a private physician's statement.

In the past, original claims for compensation and pension benefits, claims for additional service-connected disabilities, and claims for higher-level aid and attendance required an examination by a VA physician. VA already accepts statements of private physicians in deciding claims for increases in compensation.

Provided VA accepts it, a private physician's statement can now be used to rate a claim without further VA examination if it meets VA medical standards. These include describing clinical manifestations and substantiating the diagnosis with findings from diagnostic techniques generally accepted by medical authorities, such as appropriate pathological studies, X-rays and laboratory tests, VA said.

In cases where private physician exams are accepted, VA said it estimates the average claim processing time could be reduced by as much as 35 days.

Veterans will be responsible for paying for exams performed by private physicians for VA purposes. VA exams are given at no cost to veterans seeking disability compensation.

Housing survey is out

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) — All active-duty Air Force and Air National Guard members who draw the basic allowance for quarters are receiving the 1995 Variable Housing Allowance Survey now through Aug. 17.

The survey is being sent to all members in the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii, who live off-base and receive BAQ. Members assigned overseas but who have families residing in the target areas are also receiving surveys.

Information gathered from this survey will be used to determine the VHA rates for fiscal 1996.

The VHA program helps members find suitable and affordable off-base housing by supplementing BAQ, say survey officials.

"Accurate survey information is essential in setting fair VHA rates and maintaining the integrity of the program," said Charlie Hamilton, chief of the surveys branch at the Air Force Military Personnel Center here.

This VHA survey asks questions about costs associated with home ownership or rental and should take approximately 25 minutes to complete. Since the data may be subject to verification by a government audit agency, records and receipts should be used for substantiating actual costs whenever possible.

Surveys should be completed and returned as soon as possible, said Hamilton.

Expeditionary medal dates set

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) — The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff has announced the termination date for the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal for Operations Restore Hope and Uphold Democracy as March 31, 1995.

This means the inclusion dates for Operation Restore Hope are Dec. 5, 1992, to March 31, and for Operation Uphold Democracy are Sept. 16, 1994, to March 31, according to the Air Force Military Personnel Center here.



Lawyer of the year

Capt. James Bemis, 64th FTW deputy Staff Judge Advocate, has been selected as the 1995 recipient of the Thomas and Marian Krauska Award. The award is presented annually by the State Bar of Texas to the outstanding military lawyer assigned in Texas. Captain Bemis, who has been at Reese since July 1993, was cited for his contribution to Reese's successful defense of a multi-million dollar environmental lawsuit, military justice initiatives and extensive community service.

Reese Top Dollar team tackles AETC challenge

It has been nearly five years since the Iraqi armies stormed into Kuwait City and Operation Desert Shield/Storm began.

While CNN broadcast dramatic videos of orderly armor formations slicing into the desert and pinpoint aerial bombings, there were countless personnel experiencing for the first time what a deployment was all about.

With any large scale operation there will be some initial slowness determining the best solution to the problems which arise. As experience accumulated, organizations overcame the initial shock of deployment and became increasingly efficient by developing solutions to the problems which confronted them. The trick is to retain that knowledge for future deployments so organizations can hit the ground running.

The ability of comptroller teams to do that has been tested all this week at the Air Education and Training Command Top Dollar competition at Camp Bullis, Texas. The competition ends today.

Representing Reese on the team are TSgt. Merrie Wright, team chief, SSgt. Darrell Williams, SSgt. Rodney Wilson,

SrA. Ronnie Wilson and SrA. Roosevelt Sanchez, 64th FTW Comptroller Flight. Also participating are 1st Lt. Neil McCafferty and SSgt. Glenna Thompson, 64th Contracting Squadron.

The Top Dollar competition helps comptroller and contracting personnel prepare for deployments by reinforcing the lessons learned from Desert Shield/Storm. The Top Dollar competition is a competitive mobility competition which includes personnel from each of the disciplines within the comptroller, contracting and finance and accounting office.

Subject area experts from military pay, travel pay, paying and collecting, financial analysis, materiel, accounts payable and contingency contracting are covered by the seven-person Top Dollar team.

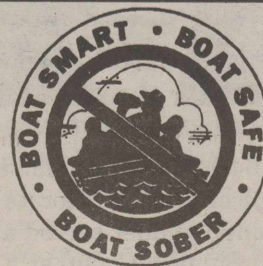
Top Dollar originated after the conclusion of Operation Desert Storm and was initially limited to bases in Europe. Its usefulness as a training tool was soon recognized and the competition was expanded Air Force wide.

The teams are designed to deploy as a unit and act as the core of a financial services and contracting office in the field. Each team is responsible for building a mobility pallet which contains every item needed for the operation of a finance and contracting office

in the field, from paper clips and regulations to computer systems.

Having the correct equipment alone does not guarantee success. Teams must demonstrate an expert proficiency at determining solutions to complicated contingency situations. In addition to technical knowledge, participants are tested on their military knowledge in such areas as chemical warfare, buddy care, weapons proficiency and physical prowess.

This year's team began training early for the competition. The teams training was split between job proficiency training and athletic conditioning. Job proficiency training focuses on preparing team members to handle wartime scenarios. The athletic training conditions the team members for the grueling physical challenges of the competition which culminate in an obstacle course.



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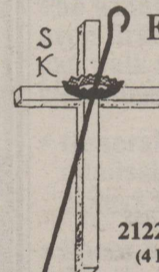
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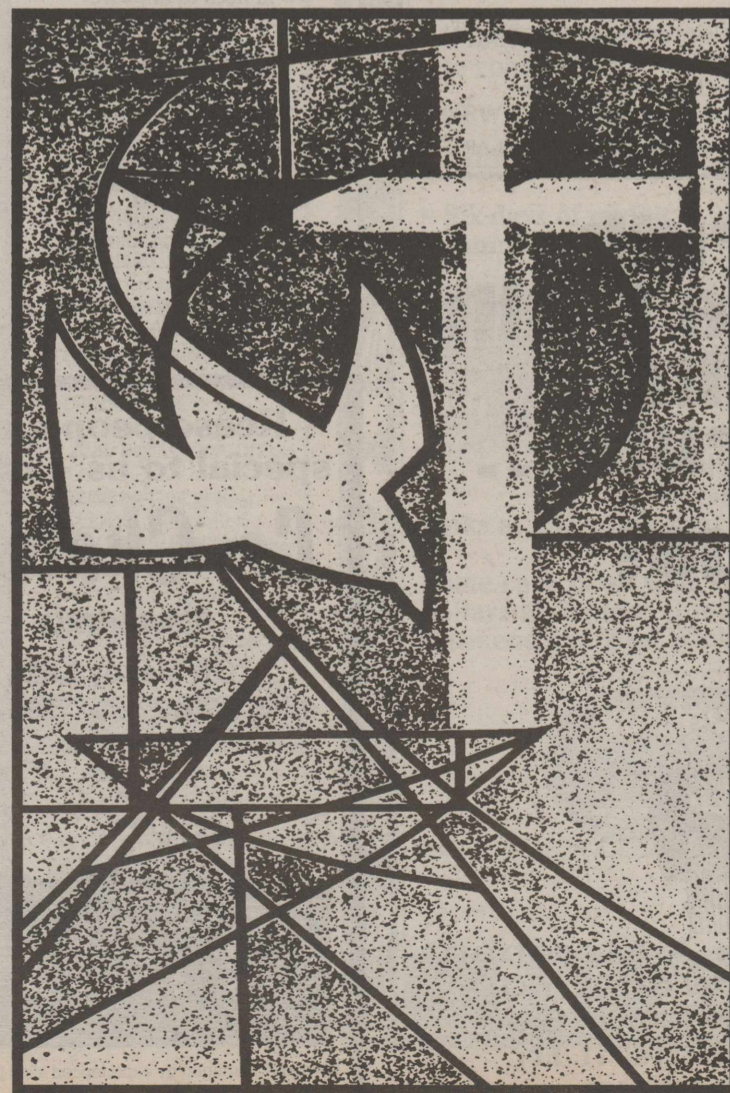
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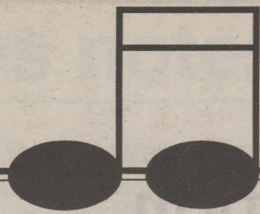
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Arts Alliance Sets Annual Concert Series

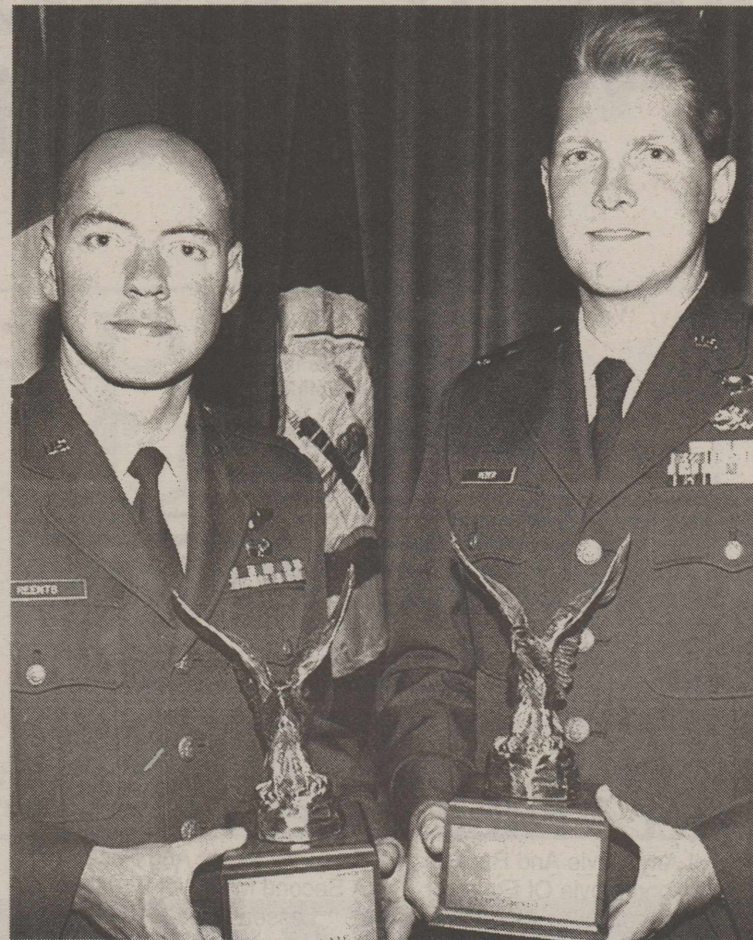
