





These words were spoken by Peter in answer to the question and ed by a convicted people in verse 35, "Men and brotheren, what shall we do?" Notice that the question included their first duties toward God. When Paul and Silas were asked the pointed question by as unsaved man, "What must I do to be saved?" They answered, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 15 25, 31). If a sinner should ask us how to be saved, we should tell him to believe on Christ for Salvation. If a sinner should ask us what his first duties were toward God, we should tell him first to repent, then be baptized for the remission of sins.

The taxt contains two commands. The first command is repent and is in the plural. The second command is be baptized and is in the singular. The first command, REPENT, brings Salvation. John spoke of the fruits of repentance (Matt 3:8). What are the fruits of repentance? Peter, the author of our text, in Acts 3:19, gives some of the fruits of repentance, "Repent ye therefore, and be converted that your sins may be blotted out, when the time of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord." This verse tells us that the first results of repentance are conversion or a changed life and the blotting out of our sins. We are told except we repent we shall periah (Luke 13:3), and he that believeth not shall be dammed (Mark 16:16), but there is no such language concerning baptism to be found in the Bible. 16:16), but there is no such language concerning baptism to be

The second command tells us to be baptized FOR the remission of sins. The word for tells us why we should be baptized: Because our sins have been remitted. After a leper had been cleaned Jeens told him to offer FOR his cleansing a gift according to the law of Misses (Mark 1:40-44). We bury people not in order to kill them, but because they are dead. We baptize a man, not because he is dead in trespasses and sins (Eph. 2:1), but because he is dead to sin and has become a new creature in Christ Jesus (Rom. 6:11; Eph. 2:5).

The word FOR in our text is translated from the Greek word 'eis'. This little word is found about 1700 times in the N, T, and is translated 48 different ways. To be sure of what it means in ear text, compare it with the way it is used in other places in connection with baptism. For example:

I indeed baptise you with water UNTO (eis) repentance" Matt.

Motice John baptised UNTO (eis) or FOR (eis) repentance Did he baptise in order that the people might repent or because they had repented?
