**Notice of Road Bond Election to be Held in Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas.**

The State of Texas,  
County of Haskell,  
To All Persons Concerned:  
Notice is hereby given that a Road Bond Election will be held within Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, on the Second Saturday in June, A. D. 1929, the same being the 8th day of June, A. D. 1929, to determine whether or not the Bonds of said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of \$125,000.00 and to determine whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon the property of Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity, as fully set out in the following order, to-wit:

**ORDER OF COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF HASKELL COUNTY, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING AN ORDERING ROAD ELECTION IN ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER SEVEN OF HASKELL COUNTY, TEXAS.**

Be it remembered that on this the 3rd day of May, A. D. 1929, there was begun and holden within and for the City and County of Haskell, State of Texas, at the Court House thereof, a Special Session of the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Haskell County, Texas, with the Hon. Joe A. Jones, County Judge, present and presiding and G. B. Tanner, Comr. Prec. No. 1, R. B. Guess, Comr. Prec. No. 2, J. F. Simmons, Comr. Prec. No. 3 and L. C. Philips, Comr. Prec. No. 4, all being present, at which time there came on to be considered the petition of W. P. Caudle and more than fifty other qualified resident property taxpayers voters of Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, praying for the Honorable Commissioners' Court to order an election to be held for the purpose of determining whether or not the bonds of said territory, known and designated as "Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas," shall be issued in the sum of \$125,000.00, bearing interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty years from date thereof, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating, man-made, graveled or paved roads, and turnpikes, or in said thereof, and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon the property of said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for redemption thereof at maturity.

And it appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpayers voters of said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, said Road District having been heretofore established by order of the Commissioners' Court of Haskell County, Texas, on the 9th day of April, A. D. 1929, and of record in the Commissioners' Court Minutes in Book No. 5 at Page 144, within the following metes and bounds, to-wit:

Beginning at a point in the West boundary line of Haskell County, Texas, where said West line intersects the North boundary line of

Thence North with the W. B. line of Haskell County and the E. B. line of Stonewall County to the place of beginning;  
It is therefore directed, considered and ordered by the Commissioners' Court that an election be held in said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, on the Second Saturday in June, A. D. 1929, the same being the 8th day of June, A. D. 1929, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the Bonds of said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of \$125,000.00 with interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum and being serial Bonds the first twenty of which shall be in the sum of \$1,000.00 each, and the last nine of which shall be in the sum of \$5,000.00 each, numbered from 1 to 29 both inclusive, and maturing as follows: Bond No. 1 to mature on April 1st, A. D. 1931, and one bond to mature on April 1st each year thereafter until the entire 29 bonds have matured, none to exceed 30 years from their date and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon the property of Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a newspaper of general circulation published in said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, if a newspaper be published therein, for three successive weeks prior to the date of said election, and if no newspaper is published therein, then such published notice shall be given in some newspaper published in the county, if there be one, and in addition thereto, for three weeks prior to the date of said election, notice shall be posted by the County Clerk at three public places within said District and one at the Court House Door of said County.

Said Election shall be held at the following voting boxes within said District: Bunker Hill Voting Box No. 20 and Sagerton Voting Box No. 17. Alfred Rinn is hereby appointed presiding officer to hold said elec-

tion in voting box No. 20 and F. Pilley is hereby appointed presiding officer to hold said election in voting box No. 17.

And it is further provided that at said Election the qualified voters of Election Precinct No. 18, known as the Joe Bailey Box, residing within the boundaries of said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, shall vote at the Bunker Hill Voting Box No. 20, and the qualified voters of Election Precinct No. 19, known as the Tanner Paint Voting Box, residing within the boundaries of said Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, shall vote at Sagerton Voting Box No. 17.

The manner of holding such election and canvassing and making returns thereof, shall be governed by the General Laws of this State, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF," and those who desire to oppose the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

And it is further ordered that a copy of this order, signed by the County Judge and attested by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as a proper notice of said Election, and the County Judge is directed to cause said notice to be published in the Haskell Free Press, which is a newspaper of general circulation published in said County, there being no newspaper published in Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, for three successive weeks next preceding the date of said Election, and he shall cause to be posted a true copy of this order as a notice thereof at three public places in Road District Number Seven of Haskell County, Texas, and one such notice to be posted at the Court House door in the County of Haskell, for a period of three weeks prior to the date of said Election.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon the question being called for the following members of the Court voted AYE: G. B. Tanner, R. B. Guess, J. F. Simmons and L. C. Philips; and the following voted NO: None.

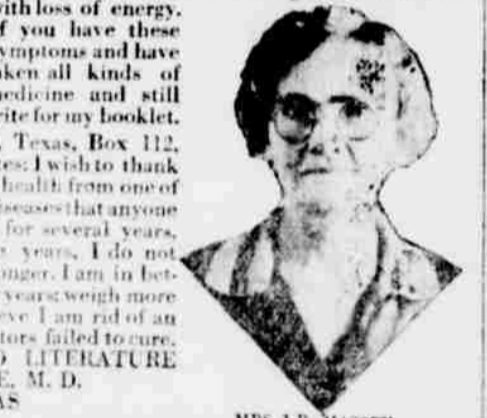
