

SEEK ELDORADO LONG FORGOTTEN

Old-Timer to Use Plane in Search for Riches.

Edmonton, Alta.—A trail of blood and gold that stretches back through the last 24 years is the lure which will take a 400-horse-power Fokker plane on a quest into the Far North, 1,400 miles past Edmonton. Its goal, according to an interview appearing in the Edmonton Journal, will be a forgotten Eldorado.

The pilot is Capt. H. A. Oaks of the Northern Aeriais Mineral Exploration company, and with him in the plane, which will carry close to seven tons of equipment, will be Charlie McLeod, forty-one, old-time prospector and northerner, the only man living to whom is known the location of the "find."

In the mind of McLeod that site of promised wealth lingers as a place of awful tragedy. It was just past the turn of the present century that he and his two brothers, Bill and Frank, following the clews of Indians, found in a hidder canyon signs of untold richness of gold. Three years later Charlie McLeod returned to find the bones of his brothers on the site of their old camp.

Today, however, the old-timer is confident of the success of his new venture. His trip, he mentions, is backed by Jack Hammell, president of the Northern Aerials Mineral Exploration company, the same Hammell who was concerned in the transfer of the Flin Flon mining territory in northern Manitoba to the Harry Payne Whitney interests of New York.

Mcl.eod tells of how he had left his brothers on the site of their claim, while he had to go into the Mackenzie river country, many hundred miles to the east. News of their find was carried to the Yukon, whence a stampede started into the mountains.

Bill and Frank were unable to fight off the newcomers and were overcome beside their fires, riddled with bullets. Their murderer, known to McLeod, is since dead. Lack of funds and the inaccessibility of the claim has prevented previous exploration of the property. The assistance of the exploration company has now removed both these obstacles.

Spend \$5,000 Yearly to Check Own Honesty

Austin, Texas.—Building and toan associations of Texas are donating \$5,000 a year to a state fund used for checking up on their professional honests.

The state's appropriation of \$5.000 annually was found inadequate to pay for the examination and supervision of the associations, which voluntarity supplanted the appropriation with a donation to R. R. Cousins Jr., chair man of the state insurance commission. Cousins is empowered to administer the fund without "strings and to use it as if it were a state appropriation.

She has made certain changes in her room at the suggestion of the club agent, including the rearrangement of her clothes closet. Freshly painted woodwork and furniture, a revarnished floor, and new covers for her bed and other pieces of furniture were also a part of the improvement she effected. In the closet, which she wanted to make orderly and attractive, she put a lengthwise pole made of an old broomstick, and provided as many clothes hangers as she needed, to economize space and keep her garments fresh and unwrinkled.

Orange Sherbet Always

Refreshing in Summer Ices and sherbets made of fresh fruit Julee are always refreshing in hot weather. If egg white is benien into the mixture after it has been partly frozen the mixture is more fully and creamy in texture and to many people less bitingly cold than a plain ice. These fresh fruit desserts have the merit of contributing to the day's supply of vitamines. This recipe for orange sherhet is from the bureau of home economics:

Sil cups brance is cup succir is teaspoon salt is cup lemon juice I egg white

Strain the fruit juices, add sugar and salt, and stir until the sugar is dissolved. Freeze with a mixture of 1 part of salt to 4 to 6 parts of ice. Turn the crank slowly until the mixture is partly frozen. then quickly add the beaten white of egg, and continue to turn the crank until the ice is firm. Remove the dasher, press the contents solidly into the can, cover with waxed paper and replace the top on the can, Pack with more ice and salt and allow to stand an hour or more to ripen before

Curried Chicken With Coconut Ouite Unusual

Curries of all kinds have penetrated to the western world from India, and this unusual way of preparing chick en is no exception. The recipe has been tested by the bureau of home economics and found excellent:

to 4 pounds
1 quart water,
4 cup sliend onlons the up, milt

Disjoint the fowl and simmer in the water to which I teaspoonful of salt has been rebled. When the fowl is tender, drain it, and measure the liquid. For each cup of liquid, blend 2 tablespoonfuls of flour with 2 table spoonfuls of fat removed from the top of the broth. Brown the onlon in a small amount of the chicken fat, add the broth and the blended flour and fat, and cook until thickened. Then add the entry and the remaining to teaspoonful of salt. Remove the skir from the back and legs of the fowl and add the meat to the sauce. Allow the ment to bent through but take care that it does not become broken while stirring. Serve the chicken with flaky boiled rice.



Could there be any roast meat more savory and appetizing for high days and holidays than a choice baked ham, crusted with browned sugar, studded with cloves, and redolent of the spicy pan gravy with which it has been basted? Success in cooking such a ham to a turn is assured if you use a meat thermometer, the bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture tells us, Whether a ham is to be boiled or baked, it cooks more rapidly and shrinks less when the find is left on it. Make a tiny slit with a sharp knife or a steel skewer and insert the meat thermometer through the rind into the center of the thickest part of the ham, place it on a rack in a large kettle, cover with het water, and cook at the simmering point until the meat thermometer registers 160 degrees Fahrenheit. Place it on a rack in an open pan and bake in a slow oven (200 degrees Fahrenheit) until the thermometer in the meat registers 160 degrees Fahrenheit. The temperature at the center of the ham continues to rise for about 45 minutes after it is removed from the oven and it will reach 170 degrees to 174 degrees Fahrenheit. Take off the rind, score the fat, cont with the brown augar mixture, and return to the oven. Whether boiled or baked, the time required for the ham to reach 160 degrees Fahrenhelt will

be about 25 minutes to the pound. In addition to greater uniformity of results at different times of cooking and more exactness in results, the thermometer helps to prevent overcooking, so often the cause of lost flavor, poor appearance, and unnecessary shrinkage,

Wash the apricots and soak them over night in 2 cupfuls of cold wa-Cook the apricots until soft Thermometer Assures Suc- in the water in which they were seaked and press them through a fine sieve or collander. Put the 14 cupful of cold water over the gelatin and after it stands for 5 minutes add the boiling water. Stir until the gelatin has dissolved, then add the sugar, sait, and apricot pulp. Chill and fold in the cream which has been whipped, Line a serving dish with lady fingers or slices of sponge cake, and pile the apricot mixture lightly in the center. Place the dish in the cold for an hour or more before serving.

Cottage Cheese

One gallon of skim milk will make about one and one half pounds of cottage cheese. If the milk is sweet it should be placed in a pan and left in a clean, warm place at a temperature of about 75 degrees F, until it clabbers, when it should have a clean, sour flavor. Ordinarily this takes about 30 hours. 


