The origin of the mariner's com pass is obscure. By some students the instrument was said to have been introduced into Europe from the East. Others say it was a western invention. It was certainly known to Enropean navigators as early as the Twelfib century Guyot de Provins, whose sattricul "bible" is supposed to have been completed in 1205, described "a contrivance" of sailors which never de

"They have an ugly brown stone which attracts iron," he wrote, They mark the exact quarter to which the needle points, which they have rubbed on this stone, and afterward stuck into a straw. They merely put it in the water, in which the straw causes it to swim; then the point turns directly to ward the (North) star, with such certainty that it will never fail."

Guyot wrote about the compass writers reveal that the English in the Twelfth century had already mounted the needle on a pivot and water. - New York Times.

EGG PRODUCTION **DURING SUMMER**

Poultry Men Acree That It Depends on Best Care.

Facing poultry men during the summer is the problem of preventing a rapid drop in egg production with the coming of warm weather, when eggs bring good prices, Standard egg production in New Jersey for June is 18 eggs per bird, for July it is 16 eggs, and for August, 13 eggs. Whether or not a flock makes standard production during these three menths depends entirely moon the care it is given by the poultry man, announces the poulry department of the New Jersey agricultural experiment station.

According to the station, successful poultry men agree that good summer egg production depends on attention to little details of management and not on one outstanding factor. Culling the flock, for example, is not the most important factor in obtaining standard production, but just one of the many fac-tors. In fact, cuiling should be last in the effort to hold produc-

The laying house should receive attention first, as a means of hold ing egg production. All windows should be opened to provide good vetaflation and to keep the house

cause of the flock falling off in production. Careful Inspection of the blints and soop should be made once be painted with any coal tar prodand old crank once oil from the tractor or automobile can be used

Important to heavy production, is obtained in the summer by feeding only 8 or 10 pounds of grain to each 100 birds; keeping mash always before the birds; and keeping the layers confined to the house where they will always be near the mush hoppers.

Other factors found to be important in feeding are; a daily supply of fresh green feed such as dandelions, lawn clippings and weeds from the garden; and a constant upply of fresh, clean cool water. When production falls below 50 per cent, it is time to start culling, latives. if the foregoing factors mentioned have been carefully followed.

During the summer a satisfactory method consists in providing one feed a day of equal parts of corn meal, bran and ground oats. During the winter the same grains are satisfactory, but steamed clover or alfalfa hay should be added.

Pedigreeing Chicks

For pedigreeing chicks the eggs of each female may be kept separated by partitioning the egg tray, but the more usual method is to use wire baskets or net bags. Mosquito netting is hardly substantial enough for making pedigreeing bags. Bags of heavier curtain material made with well bound seams will prove more satisfactory. Seasonable Dishes DIP thin slices of sponge or pound cake into orange juice cupful of sugar with one and one-half cupfuls of strawberry juice and one-fourth cupful of lemon Juice, add slowly to the first mix ture, beating constantly. Fill the glasses full and gornish with thin lices of strawberries.

Dainty Pudding .- Boil one cup ful of water and one cupful of fruit juice, strawberry, raspberry, pine apple or orange, add three table spoonfuls of cornstarch diluted with enough water to pour. Cook over hot water for ten minutes, stirring constantly the first five minutes Add one-half tenspoonful of sait. beaten whites of three eggs and turn into a mold; chill, serve with sweetened cream or a thin boiled custard, using the yolks of the

Frozen Orange Triffe,-Make with one-half cupful of water unof two well-washed oranges, onefourth of a cupful of luice and two tablespoonfuls of lemon Inice, Cover and leave in a warm place for two hours. Whip two cupfuls of cream; when firm fold in the first mixture Remove the pulp from two oranges, reserving the Juice. Turn the juice into a melon mold, put in a layer of the cream mixture, then cover with the orange pulp; repeat until the mold is full, cover with buttered paper, buttered side up, put on the cover and pack in ice and sati. equal parts. Let stand three hours. unmold and serve.


