of "some stewards" alluded to by Bro. James Campbell in the ADVo-CATE of March 20th, who were not willing to promise our pastor more than we could collect for his support. Now, suppose that we as a board of stewards, are aware of the fact that six hundred dollars is necessary as a salary in order to support our pastor, and we assess the church accordingly, (knowing at to collect more than about five The quarterly conference tells us: you have assessed six hundred dollars for your pastor, and seventyfive or one hundred dollars (as the case may be) for your presiding elder; you say they need it for their support and you must pay it. Then the stewards hear a long and urgent lecture, which the membership at large do not hear, and the pastor refuses to preach to them on the subject of supporting the Gospel, lest they should say, "he is preaching for money." Now is it best for the pastor to remain silent on this subject and tell the stewards, "you must attend to this mat-ter?" The result is that about three-fourths of the church members are not informed as to their duty as church members, and consequently the calls made upon them by the stewards for the support of the Gospel meet the oft repeated declaration, "I have nothing I can give the pastor." Why? Because they are not willing. Why not willing? Because they have not been properly instructed by the pastor as to their duty regarding this very important matter. I would be glad for some brother to introduce some available remedy for this present evil. I have sometimes thought it would be a good idea to prune the church as you would a fruit tree when it becomes sickly on account of there being so many affected, withered, dead, and half-dead branches on it; by so doing we preserve the tree, and then the stewards would not have so much trouble in bringing up their quarterage according to the number of members. 





European exchanges notice at considerable length the incidents connected with the completion of the great St. Gothard Tunnel. In 1876 the Cottan Alps were penetrated by the Mont Cenis Tunnel. This was considered the crowning achievement in engineering of the century. That tunnel was seven and three fifths miles in length, and was fifteen years in building. The St. Gothard, which penetrates a mountain higher than Mt. Washington (some 7000 feet), is nine miles and a quarter in length, but has been less than eight years in progress. The successful invention of steam and atmospheric borers has thus greatly expedited the work. The tunnels are nine or ten yards in width and seven in height, with double rails. Any one can see how difficult and delicate the engineering taust have been, and what a triumph of skill its successful termination gives. The work commenced on opposite sides of the mountain, almost ten miles apart. The slightest variation in direction would have brought the workmen wide asunder in the bowels of the mountain; but so nice was the calculation, that when the prescribed distances were reached, their great chiscis stuck directly through the last interposing shell of the rock, and the air ru-hed from Switzerland to Italy—a ble-sed cool wind of which the workmen had been so long deprived, working in the terrible heat of the center of the mountain, and kept alive by imported air from without. The cost of the work is estimated at \$10,000. The famous St. Gothard road passed over the mountain. It was completed, after twelve years of labor, in 1832. 
