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





GATESVILLE, Coryell Co., August 4. -Iredell is a neat village on the Bosque river, Bosque county. The Texas Central and Waco Tap railways have reached it. Their ears have been saluted with the snort of the iron-horse ; but he will not tarry there, but is rapidly making his way to Eastland City. This place has a population of about 500, and its present advantages can make a center of trade above an ordinary depot. It has a good surrounding of land, timber and water. The crops in the Bosque valley are as good as we have seen this season. The crops, also, in the prairie valleys in that vicinity are as fine. We know of no better opening for immigrants than in that part of the county. There is a beautiful prairie valley country lying south-west, near by, situated between a mountain range and the Leon river, being in width, I suppose, about forty miles, which, I was told, can be bought for reasonable figures. The people there are a church-going people, at least they attended the district conference in large numbers, and were both attentive and respectful. On Saturday the audience was so large that we moved the seats out of the church to the bank of the Bosque river, under some elm trees. The scene was grand and picturesque. 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
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
