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

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
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

We copy the above from the Galvesion Daily Journal. It suggests a problem of some interest to tax.payers. Those familiar with police reports in a city will agree that it is a very moderate estimate to assume that two-thirds, or fifty, of these cases of disorderly conduct, assaulting and abusing and fighting, were committed under the influence of liquor. We may thus charge seventyfour out of all the arrests which were made in the city of Galveston during the month of September to the account of liquor. Now, the problem we want answered is this: If whisky has been the occasion of three-fifths of the arrests and consequent expenses in the police courts during the month of September what proportion of that expense ought the liquor sellers pay? Suppose in all the towns and cities of the State a calculation like that above be made, and it appears, as it most certainly will, that three-fifths of the arrests for brawls and murder have originated in whisky, then very possibly the tax payere of Texas will be aroused respecting the enormous burden the whisky traffic imposes upon them.
