RELIGIOUS SUMMARY.

Chinese symbols show them to have been Monotheists 5000 years ago.

There are 7000 colored, and 1500 white Baptists in the District of Columbia.

A pan-Lutheran council at Old Wintertberg has been suggested.

The Episcopal General Convention, lately in session in New York, cost \$30,000.

The Prussian Bible society last year circulated 97,764 Bibles and 10,733 New Testaments.

Chancellor Preston, of New York, is expected to succeed Bishop Corrigan in the diocese of Newark.

A wag suggests as an appropriate offering for many churches the working "Have mercy on our miserable sinners."

A lady of New Albany, Indiana, has left nearly \$300,000 to the Presbyterian Board of Missions.

Daniel P. Stones estate a few days ago set to Drury College, Missouri, a check for \$45,000.

Netherlands has 25,000 pupils in the State schools, 100,000 in Catholic and 125,000 in Protestant schools.

The Hindus are copying the example of the missionaries and are circulating tracts devoted to the praise of the exploits of their Gods.

The Free Christian church in Italy numbers 1800 communicants. Last year is represented as the most prosperous in its past history.

The corner stone of St. John's College, near Shanghai, has been laid by Bishop Schlegel, of the Episcopal mission.

It is announced as a fact that three large provinces of China are without a single Protestant missionary. A few years ago there was not a missionary in three provinces of that land.

The earth is coming under the dominion of Christian nations. Great Britain has ruled over nine million square miles of the earth's surface, and the United States has three millions.

The diocese of Nassau, in the West Indies, has undertaken the temperance work on the same plan as that of the Church of England Temperance Society.

Moody and Sankey, on route to San Francisco, stopped at Salt Lake City and held a meeting. They had crowded congregations.

There were 429,675 Sunday-school scholars reported in the schools of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, last year, with a membership of \$30, 126, and 3,547 traveling and 5,833 local preachers.

There was to have been a reception of the bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church (North) in the Academy of Music, Brooklyn, tickets, \$2. A pretty round price to pay for seeing a bishop.

The Waldensian Church has one hundred laborers in Italy, all natives of that land. They preach in forty-seven villages and towns, and number 2411 communicants.

Samuel Watkins, a wealthy citizen of Nashville, Tennessee, who died recently, bequeathed to that city \$128,000 for the establishment of a polytechnic institution.

The receipts reported by the American Missionary Association the past year were \$450,000. Its regular expenses amounted to \$188,172.

The Archbishop of San Domingo has given to the University of Pisa, Italy, a reliquary containing some fragments of bones supposed to be a portion of the mortal remains of Christopher Columbus.

The natives of Gilbert islands show their faith by their works. As proof that they have embraced Christianity in earnest they have burned their weapons of war, abolished the liquor traffic and passed strong Sunday laws.

In the Forty-fourth street Jewish synagogue in New York city the families are allowed to sit together. This is a recent innovation on the customs of their fathers. The music of an organ is also heard in this synagogue.

The Unitarians are sending some of their strongest men to the thriving villages of New Hampshire. They find it wise to copy the example of the evangelized churches. To the Methodist lay along the honor of inaugurating the itinerant system that other churches are trying to adopt.

Several of the Southern church papers have re-asked General Hampton for his implied challenge to John Sherman. The Southern people have more to fear from the folly of their friends than the hands of their foes.

The late Protestant Episcopal convention took action to evaluate the order of Bessarabia. It will be their duty to take care of our Lord's poor and sick, the education of the young, and other work of like character.

A Presbyterian elder discourses as follows on the policy of employing church funds to pay church debts: "Now, brethren, let it get up a supper and eat ourselves rich. Buy your food. Then give it to the church. Then go and buy P. back again. Then eat it up. And then your debt is paid."

The Basutos, with whom the people of Cape Colony are at war, are said to be one of the wealthiest and most civilized native tribes in that part of the world. They are a farming people, live in houses, go decently clothed, and have good roads. Many of them are Christians, being the fruits of the labors of the French and other missionaries. It has not been decided whether there are more heathen on the English than on the Basuto side of the war.

Spurgeon has no instrumental music in his great congregation of 6000 persons; but when they lift up their voices in song, there is a power and majesty in the melody that moves the hearts of all who hear.

A lady listened to a charity sermon but declined to give anything to the poor. A rogue picked her pocket before she got out of the church. On discovering her loss, she said: "God did not find the way to my pocket, but the devil did!"

A Presbyterian divine says: Some people in church spend the invocation or opening prayer before the singing in arranging their dresses; the second, or the one before the sermon, in which Seventeen of the languages of the South Sea Islands have been reduced to written form in order that the Bible might be translated. Three other books were translated. All of them are doing toward the civilization of mankind?

Recently one hundred Christian Chinese, who had left Hong Kong to escape persecution, sought the Sandwich Islands that they might worship God in peace. One-fifth of the inhabitants of the Sandwich Islands are Chinese.

Sir Richard Temple, late governor of Bombay, said: Christian missions in India are producing excellent political effects and the example of the British missionaries is doing more good than the British administration.

The ministers of Rochester have resolved to lobby nobody for a less fee than five dollars. The Norwich Herald asks if they would make a liberal reduction to a club of six or upwards.

The Cumberland Presbyterians, having been denied admission to the Presbyterian council, in Philadelphia, are inclined to pay no more attention to the alliance and send no delegates to the council at Belfast, Ireland.

Opium kills three million Chinese every year. England forced the opium trade on the Chinese, and now what is England going to do about that tremendous account for the dead who have been slain by opium?

The missionary committee of the Methodist church, North, appropriated this year for missions in Mexico \$250,000, with an additional contingent appropriation of \$14,614 to the same field. An appropriation of \$30,000 was made to the Japanese missions.

A Chinaman employed as washerman by the Protestant Episcopal mission at Kuching, China, shows the sincerity of his faith by going every Sunday to the tea-houses, temples and places of public resort and distributing tracts, which he purchased with his own money. He does this at the sacrifice of the friendship of his people and at the risk of his life.

The beneficial effects of Mr. McAllister's methods for the promotion of evangelized work in Paris, France, are manifested in some of the most respectable portions of the city. He has now twenty-three stations with soap kitchens and savings banks, lectures and sermons by his own hands. Let the people of the interest felt by Christian people in their material and moral welfare and thus be able to lift them in the moral and religious scale of life.

A South Sea Islander, in the closing prayer at church, used the following language: "O God, we are about to go to our respective homes. Let not the words we have heard here like fine clothes we wear, soon to be taken off and folded away in a box until another Sabbath comes around. AN experiment recently tried on an English steamer shows that petroleum oil, when used in generating steam, the boilers have since been heated by this material instead of coal, a system which effects an enormous saving of expense and labor, the heating apparatus being as thoroughly under control as a gas-jet, and requiring but one man to regulate it. It consists of two tubes but an inch in diameter, terminating at the same point in a small oblong box.
