





During the absence of the locust from the face of the earth he is under the earth in the shape of a worm, living on the sap of the young rootlets. In following these they penetrate very deep into the ground, sometimes going as far down as ten or twelve feet. The season for their appearance and disapearance differs somewhat with the latitude, though not so materially as one would suppo-e. They appear a little earlier in the South than the North; but the last half of May can be set down as the period during which they emerge from the ground in many parts of the country, which they generally leave by the 4th of July. As is the case with a great many other insects, the males make their appearance several days before the females, and also disappear sooner."


