Concerning Grain. Philadelphia Press, Oct. 12: The London Miller, in its issue of September 26, just at hand, says: "Any with-holding of wheat this campaiga in America will not be without special risk to the owners." Although the Miller writes for those who uniformly want lower prices, the above judgment is about in accord with that of the best

observers on this side the Atlantic. It s apparent that American farmers have been inclined to hold both their wheat and Indian corn, and that this tendency has aided the operators for higher prices. The leading facts of the existing situation do not tell in favor of a continuance of this policy. Having regard to the surplus on hand at the close of the last crop year, it is estimated that the United States will be able to export to June 30, 1882, 150,000,000 bushels of wheat. Russia promises, on the most trustworthy information, to export 100,000,000 bushels. These two items will about supply the required wants. Beyond this, the surplus-growing regions of Austro-Hungary, Danube, Egypt, British India, Chili and Australia are yet to be heard from. it should be noted that throughout the West during the autumn an improved pasturage is the rule, and this leads to econnmy in the consumption of corn. For the last four weeks the exports of corn were 3,501,000 bushels. On October 1, the visible supply of corn was nearly 28,000,000 bushels. At last month's rate of export, eight months would be required to clear off the present visible supply. It is equally plain that farmers who have corn to sell should also hestitate before giving fur-


