



Came to Texas in 1836; joined the army in 1831, and remained with it until it was disdanded in 1835, and remained with it until it was disdanded in 1835, at which time he was senior surgeon of the brigade. He was married in Cherokee county. East Texas, February 13, 1836; and joined the church in April following. The subject of joining was solemily and prayerfully considered some days before the step was taken, and he never afterward regretted it or fait ted in his allegiance. He was deeply attached to the doctrines and customs of the Methodist Church. In 1871 he removed to Bastropoonity, in 1872 to Webberville. He was an earnest seeker after truths, a close student of the bible, a devoted servant of his Master, and it can be truly said that, to nim, "duty was the sublimest word in the language." Dr. Fowler was faithful in attending to the duty of family worship until his mind wandered so that he could no ionger lead in prayer; his last audible petition to God was, that he would "help us to be holy in heart and life, and keep us unspotted from the world."




