

Slave Marriages. A curious case relating to the marriage status of former slaves has just been decided by the Supreme Court of Alabama. The controversy was between two women, each of whom claimed to be the wiclow of Gus Washington, and entitled to dower in his estate. One named E lie had been married to him in 1817, when both were slaves of the same master. The ceremony was performed by a colored minister with the consent of the master. The two lived together as husband and wife till the fall of 1866. At that time the husband being then of course a freedman, took out a license and married another woman, with whom he lived until his death.
