A Telegrapic Triumph.

A felegrapic Triumph.

A heavy force is employed in the construction of the underground telegraphic connection between Marseilles and Paris. A cast iron pipe contains the cable. It is laid nearly six feet beneath the surface of the earth. At intervals of 550 yards the cable passes through a chamber of cast-fron, which is so constructed that it can be readily inspected whenever there is any necessity for that work.
