It may minister to the spirit of dissipation, and lead to ebuili ions of ill-temper; but we do not see that this diversion is adapted to injure the moral nature. It is an out door exercise; it admits of participation by both sexes; parents and their chi-dren can take part in it, and it has no bad as ociations. Unlike some other amusements, it is not a stimulant to the lower nature, nor is it much affected by persons of vicious inclinations.

Our judgment is that it has a great advantage over builiarts in that there are not, and never will be, public croquet saloons with bar-rooms and betting accompaniments.

We think that many a home would be happier, many a tired woman healthier, many children more easily managed, if harmless diversons were encouraged. The church prohibits dancing, card-playing, and theater going for the very best and absolutely unanswerable reasons. To prohibit all amusement and attempt to exclude Christians and the children of Christian parents from all relaxation, is contrary to reason, nature, and the Scriptures. Whether it will injure the Christian's influence turns on how he plays, and where, and whether too much or not.

Ministers should not let their good or their indifferent actions be evil spoken of. To be seen playing croquet while the pastoral work is neglected is a gross inconsistency, and a personal offense to every neglected member.
