Belgium is the only country in Europe absolutely without a censorship.

A clause in the Belgian Constitution of 1830 declares not only that the censor-ship is abolished, but that it can "never be re-established." Books and plays which could not pass the censorship in France may be brought out in Bel-gium; and a comedy by M. Delair, now about to be produced in Brussels, has been condemned and rejected by the theatrical censorship of Paris.

The total number of French officers in active service is at present nearly 14,000, including 400 generals. No province is more numerously represented than Alsace-Lorraine, no less than 2000 officers being natives of that now German province, including 26 generals of divisions and 59 of brig-ades, the best known among whom are Schneegans, Sumpt, Schramm and Wolff. Besides these, there are about 100 naval officers from Alsace-Lorraine in the French service, including Admirals Conrad, Krantz and Pigeard,


