

Ford Plane Proves Features of Atlantic City Exhibition



Crowds visit tri-motor transport daily at American Fair in Municipal Auditorium.

GLISTENING like silver under a flood of brilliant light, the giant Ford tri-motor all-metal transport plane, one of the features of the American Fair, is attracting thousands daily to the Municipal Auditorium on the Boardwalk at Atlantic City. The plane is a permanent exhibit at the Fair. More than 500,000 persons viewed the plane when it was exhibited on the Boardwalk earlier in the summer, during a series of conventions held at the popular New Jersey resort. A runway flanks the port side of the plane, permitting visitors to gain an excellent view of the interior. The plane is of the standard transport type, now in use on most of the leading passenger air transport lines in the United States, and in Central and South America.

FARMERS TO INSPECT VARIETIES OF CROPS ON FIRST FIELD DAY

Farmers from over Haskell County are to meet with County Agent Williams in a Field Day on the Homer Tompkins farm on the Haskell and Rule road Wednesday Sept. 24th to study the different varieties of cotton as grown under drought conditions.

Seven varieties of cotton are now grown on this farm and one can see for himself the difference in the manner of yield, resistance to wind and rain, resistance to dry weather, etc. The cotton was planted on successive days in plots of six acres each to determine the cotton best suited for Haskell county. The leading varieties as planted in the county are used: Half and Half, Kasch, Qualla, Wacoma, Lankart, Sunshine, Greer Long Staple and Russell Big Bell.

The meeting will be held Wednesday afternoon beginning at one thirty o'clock. In addition to the varieties of cotton to be inspected, some good Hegari will be visited nearby, showing how good seed contrasted with average seed will increase the yield. Mr. Williams states that the group will also visit another farm where visitors will be shown the difference in planting feed in every row and with the third row left out.

This tour or field day will be worth your time to come and inspect crops under growing conditions, and not as hearsay. Every farmer should come and see for himself.

CONSTRUCTION WORK BEING CARRIED FORWARD BY W. T. U. COMPANY

Current construction work being carried forward by the West Texas Utilities Company includes the extension of lines to new customers, the rebuilding and improving of city distribution systems, and the installation of street lighting equipment, according to an announcement from the general offices of the company.

Important new lines under construction are: a 6600 volt line from Ovalo to Bradshaw, a distance of approximately eight miles, to form the third phase of the system connecting the two towns; the running of a three phase 11 kv line to the W. D. Swan oil lease in Jones county to supply service to the C. C. Julian Oil Royalty Company for its drilling operations; the extension of a three phase primary line to the new Santa Fe Railroad Terminal north of San Angelo to serve the hops with power for electrical equipment, and the extension of a primary line to a new residential district in McCamey.

In Abilene, 20 street lighting standards will be erected on Sayles Boulevard, from South Ninth Street to South Fourteenth Street. Lighting equipment will also be installed

on the Colorado River Bridge at Ballinger.

Distribution systems will be improved in Asperment and Anson. A new line will be built to serve the new Asperment High School, and an extension will be run to the city pump station and water wells at Anson.

75 new grounds are being installed on the 17 mile transmission line between Vernon and the town of Harrold.

Anticipating an early recovery from the current depression, the company is extending and improving present equipment in order to be ready for the increased activity which always follows sub-normal conditions in West Texas.

Edwards added, amid cheers, "We as West Texans don't want anybody to give us anything. But just a chance to push ourselves over the hill is what we want—then watch our smoke."

Not Enough

"Forming these corporations is not enough," said Carlton Couch, Haskell banker. "Means for drouth areas will fall into three classifications. They are:

First, the better class, well secured, which these credit co-operatives can handle without trouble. Second, loans to tenant farmers secured by their crops, and that is what our committee is going to Washington to procure, if possible. There's the fellow we must think of: the one who has gone as far as he can with his bank, who cannot give approved security, but who must have aid. And third Red Cross intercession for people not able to help themselves and needing immediate assistance."

E. S. Transue responded for the Red Cross. He is a southwestern division official from St. Louis, and is opening headquarters offices in Wichita Falls.

Transue said: "I am glad to know the Texas delegation to Washington will be able to tell the government that your people are doing something to work out their own situation. Then they will get some help."

Transue held an afternoon session with county chapter chairmen inquiring into their immediate needs.

The meeting stood at ease while the bankers moved over to the city hall to discuss details of organizing the local corporations, and while the resolutions committee was getting up its report. On that committee were O. P. Thrane, Snyder, chairman; D. A. Bandeen, Will P. Jones, R. C. Couch, and A. J. Swenson.

S. J. R. No. 19 Proposing a Constitutional Amend- ment to be Voted on Novem- ber 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

The Legislature shall meet every two years as such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

Section 2. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of each session and after that not exceeding \$5.00 per day for the remainder of the session.

In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1930.
