We knew from the first that something was wrong. As unscrupulous as have been the attacks of the News upon this paper...

We regret this. It is pleasant to win a victory, of course. It is to the editorial mind like cold water to the thirsty soul...

We regret it for another reason. We have always had a certain sympathy for Col. Bob. It has seemed to us that the hard work that he does for the News deserves more glory than he gets...

But with all our sympathy for Col. Bob, we must condemn one thing that he has done. We steadfastly believe in editorial dignity. When your antagonist has sent in a blow straight from the shoulder...

Col. Bob has distinguished himself in one direction at least. He has brought the News out in a new role. The News is now a moral newspaper.

The editorial storm we refer to occurred in the State Press column, which is prepared by one of the editors, appears on the editorial page and is interspersed with editorial comment.

Taylor was an able man; plausible and forcible, he made a fine propagandist for twenty years in Europe. He was as hypocritical as a Jesuit, very courageous, was shot four times in Carthage jail, and would have been killed by a fifth shot. The Sunday that Dr. A. B. Leonard, of Ohio, and the writer were in Salt Lake City, in 1871, John Taylor sat with the Apostles and Brigham Young in great state, and Orson Pratt preached a tremendous sermon. It is hard to believe that Taylor did not know that the whole thing was a sham. If he did, he was a holy-headed knave; if he did not, he was a phenomenal fool. His last days were embittered by the attempt of the government to dislodge him from his seraglio.
