## J. L. Southern Elected President of Fair Assn.

Application for a new charter for the organization will be made to the Secretary of State in the next few days.

The exact date for the fall exposition has not been set, but will be held some time in October, and will be announced as soon as a number of details can be satisfactorily arranged.

## STATE TAX RATE FOR 1932 TO BE 5 CENTS LOWER

The state automatic tax board announced last week it had set the state tax rate at 60 cents for \$100 valuation for 1932. This is a decrease of five cents under the rate collected in 1931 valuations.

The tax rate for school purposes was set at the constitutional maximum of 35 cents, for Confederate pensions at seven cents and for general revenue purposes at 27 cents. The tax rate last year was 74 cents.

A decrease of \$261,000,000 in property valuations was estimated by the tax board. Valuations on which the tax was levied last year totaled \$4,181,000,000, while for this year the estimated valuation totaled \$3,920,247,186. The school tax and the tax for Confederate pensions figured on this valuation while the general revenue tax was figured on valuations of \$3,572,815,376 because of the tax remissions granted various counties by the state.

The total of the exemptions was listed at \$247,631,300.

## SCHOOL FUND IS FIXED AT \$16.00 FOR EACH STUDENT

The state board of education last week set the per capita apportionment for scholastics in the free public school system at \$16 for the 1932-33 school year.

The apportionment last year was \$17.50 per student. Nat Washer, chairman of the board of education, said the apportionment of \$16 was based on the anticipated revenues as figured by the state comptroller. Washer said that all school officials had been served with notice several months ago that the apportionment for next year probably would be reduced by \$1.50 and had been advised to make their contracts with the anticipated decrease in mind.

A report issued by the state comptroller estimated the outstanding obligations of the school fund at the end of the present fiscal year, Aug. 31st, at \$5,519,637.

Figured on the basis of 1,566,000 scholastics entitled to the apportionment, reduction of the per capita from \$17.50 to \$16 would decrease the demand on the school fund by \$23,340,000 it is estimated. L. W. Rogers, assistant state superintendent of public instruction, said that \$4.50 of the \$17.50 apportionment for the current year remained unpaid. He said this was due to be paid before August 31st, and the amount unpaid by that date would be carried over into the next fiscal year and taken care of before payments were started on the 1932-33 apportionment.

## LIBRARY NEWS NOTES

## Stamford Woman Is Killed in Car Wreck

### WILLIAM DENSON IS BURIED HERE WEDNESDAY

William Gold Denson, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Denson who live southwest of Haskell, died in the Stamford sanitarium Tuesday and funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Rule Wednesday afternoon at 3:30, conducted by Rev. J. Perry King, pastor. Interment was in Willow Cemetery in this city.

William was born December 3, 1913, and had lived in Haskell county all his life. He was one of the outstanding young men of his community and his sudden death came as a distinct shock to the entire community. He was stricken with an attack of acute appendicitis and rushed to the sanitarium, where little hope for his recovery was given by the attending physicians.

## Old Fingerprint System Discarded

One of the first identification experts in the United States to adopt the well-known Battley system of fingerprints, which has revolutionized scientific detective work throughout the world, showed the details of this uncanny art before a motion picture camera when Lieutenant Edward Coppo (one of the prominent identification authorities of America) appears in "The Beast of the City," showing at the Texas Theatre August 8th and 9th.

In this new story, a drama of city life and the work of the police, the officer fingerprints and classifies actors appearing as prisoners in a police laboratory sequence. This is one of several phases of modern scientific detection reproduced for the first time on the screen.

"Pure" English Defined

as of Elizabethan Era

The oft-quoted saying that the purest English is spoken in Dublin, particularly at Trinity college, is of unknown origin, says the Philadelphia Magazine. Inverness, Scotland, and Belfast, Ireland, are often listed with Dublin as places where supposedly pure and correct English is spoken by the inhabitants. The saying probably means little more than that the common speech in these places contains an unusually large number of Elizabethan words now regarded as "archaic" or "classical" in England and the United States. Speech in small countries or isolated communities seldom changes as rapidly as it does in the more populous centers. Both Dublin and Belfast were settled by colonists from England and the speech of their descendants did not undergo the same development that the language of the parent country did. The English language of the periods of Elizabeth and King James was, as it were, kept in cold storage in Ireland and many words and phrases were retained in everyday speech which became obsolete in England. Thus it happens that the language of Belfast and Dublin more nearly approaches the language in use during England's golden era of literature.

Long Welsh Name

Does it not seem curious that any place should be named "Llanfair-pullwg-yglogerch-wydrandrobwill-ant-y-silionogoch"? but to a Welshman this is one of the most poetical names on his map. To the stranger who goes there and sees the place it is also a locality of charm and beauty. But the name itself is poetry. Llan is "church," Fair is "of Mary," pullwg-yglogerch is "the pool of white hazels," ygerch is "rather near," while chwyran drobwll is "the swift whirlpool" and Tysilio gogo goch is "of Tysilio of the red cave." Is it not, therefore, suggestive of romance and beauty enough to visit the village of the church of St. Mary by the pool of white hazels, near the swift whirlpool of St. Tysilio's church of the red cave?

Ornithologist Honored

The Audubon society was named for John James Audubon, a famous American ornithologist and painter of bird pictures. He was born on the island of Santo Domingo, in the part now known as Haiti, on April 26, 1785. He was taken to France to be educated and emigrated to America when he was eighteen years of age. Nearly his whole life was passed in the United States. He lived in Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Louisiana and New York. He died on January 27, 1851, in New York city.

Harmless Shark

The basking sharks sometimes attain a length of 80 feet or more, but they have very small teeth and their diet consists necessarily of small fishes that travel in shoals and other small soft sea creatures which they take into their huge mouths while lying lazily on the surface of the ocean. 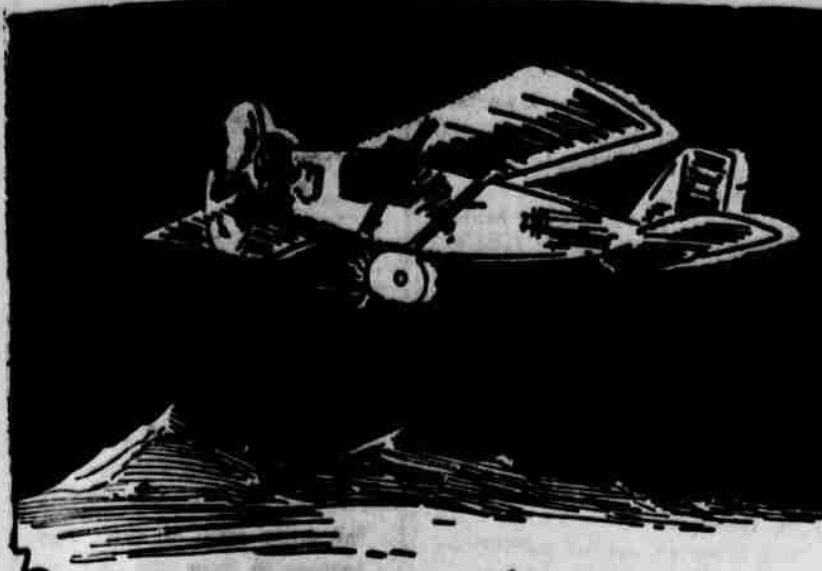

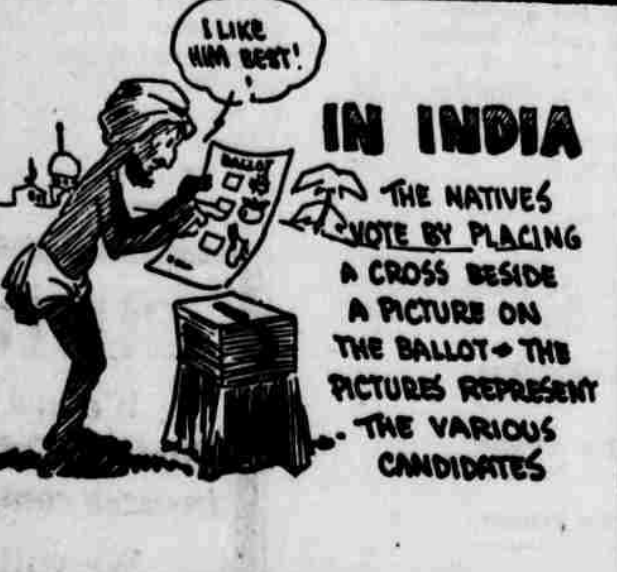

# THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT

● The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,334 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,032,825, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz., the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

● The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will surely ensue.

**H. J. R. No. 21**  
Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:  
Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. That Section 16 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified.

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

**H. J. R. No. 12**

**Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 8, 1932**

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 35, Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 35. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote at the General Election in 1932.

**H. J. R. No. 22**  
Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

**H. J. R. No. 23**  
Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any political subdivision of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise incurring credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors

who own taxable property in the State, county, political subdivision, district, city, town or village at such election is held, and who have duly registered the same for election shall be qualified to vote and electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.
