Convicted of slaying 17-year-old Ear! Hamilton, witness against him in a liquor case, Will Pritts, 37, was sentenced to 99 years imprisonment in District Court at Eastland Wed-

The jury, which had been reported standing 11 to 1 for the death penalty, was out 43 hours, having received the case late Monday.

At a meeting of the Lion's Club father, D. W. Hamilton, near cause the indictment did not read 'with malice aforethough." After the sentence was reversed the case against Fritt's in the youth's death was transferred to Eastland. The case in the father's death is pending

at Roby. Mrs. Hamilton was the star witness for the State. She testified that on the night of the slaying Fritts came to her home and asked to talk to her son. She said that both her husband and son went out on a porch to talk to Fritts.

A few minutes later, the witness testified, she heard a shot and found her son lying on the floor near a back door.

The defense offered several witnesses who said Fritts had behaved peculiarly at various times, Defense was represented by the law firm of Murchison & Davis of this city. District Attorney Grissom of this city assisted in the






