



#### RAISE GARDENS, SAYS FORD

Orders have gone forth from Henry Ford that every married man in the great Ford factories next year shall raise a garden. It will do no good to plead that they have no land or no skill in farming. Those necessities will be provided by Mr. Ford who will donate the land and furnish agricultural experts to oversee the planting and harvesting. This may be an infringement of the personal rights of Ford employes to do as they see fit on their own time, but it is an idea with a sound trackground of common sense. Factory employment from its very nature is bound to be seasonal and subject to fluctuations and could well be supplemented by the raising of a good part of the family living from the soil. Many a worker who has been without work for six months or more would be better able to watch the approach of a hard winter without dread if his cellar were full of potatoes and the shelves were stocked with canned fruit and vegetables. It is a good idea.

#### DRIFTING AND ACTING

Although he personally advertised himself as the advance agent of prosperity in his speech accepting the Republican nomination at Palo Also, even Mr. Hoover by this time must be pretty thoroughly disillusboxed on both his own and his party's prosperity myth.

Mr. Hoover has not only failed to make good on his promise, but he has let the country drift through the most severe crisis in its history without displaying a semblance of the constructive leadership which the country was led to believe he possessed. He has appealed for confollowe and optimism, but at the same time, through his indecision and exasion, he has done nothing to inspire confidence. At times when the American public looks to him for courageous and decisive leadership, it has been a habit for him to appoint a commission instead.

With the approach of the third winter of suffering due to wide spread unemployment, President Hoover has appointed another committee. He has summoned to his aid the able Walter S. Gifford and a capable array of business executives. For what purpose? To seek to remove the cause of the economic depression? No, to direct the activities of relief agencies. Of course it is necessary to provide relief for those in distress, but in this emergency they should look beyond the streme co-ordination of relief agencies. Is President Hoover prepared to chest only with the effects of the depression while ignoring the cause?

The 6,000,000 or more unemployed want jobs, not handouts. In contrast with Mr. Hoover's conception of the duties of his of fire is the vigorous action of Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York Covernor Rousevelt does not rest his unemployment relief progreen on the appointment of a committee. His is a clear cut, boldly conexisted plan involving a fifty per cent increase in the state income tax. and the expenditure of a \$20,000,000 fund to be used to relieve destitufree and unemployment, with a committee of three, selected by the Courner himself, to manage the job.

The Roosevelt plan rests on a direct assumption of responsibility the recognition that where local agencies are inadequate, the state must step in. He shows no hesitancy in shouldering his load.

It is not unlikely that Mr. Hoover and Governor Roosevelt will be appearing candidates for the presidency in 1932, and the manner in which they are facing their respective tasks is enlightening. One continues to appoint committees, while the other proceeds directly with his program will plan.


