





BUILDING A GREATER TEXAS

Business leaders of Texas have set in motion machinery for the upbuilding of lease industries. The plans call for a statewide organization, with local units in the leading centers. There will be a co-operative advertising campaign, designed, we are told, not to tell the world about Texas-but to tell Texans about their own State-and to teach Texans about things Texas, about the industries we have; about what it means to patronize these indust ics

"Forcign cows have long horns," and "Distant pastures are always the greenest," are two age-old phrases which apply describe inherent traits of human psychology. Thy are the "X" that mark where the body fell, falls, or will fall. So long as we allow ourselves to believe that a product made in Timbuctoo is better than one made in Waxahachie our State will continue to be pre-eminently agricultural, rather than profitably industrial.

Texas people must come to have "Texas pride," comparable to New England pride. A Boston business man once told us that New Englanders think products manufactured in the New England States are better than products of a competitive nature made anywhere else in the world. To this he attributed the success of the New England States in the manufacturing field.

Texas must become industrially minded. Instead of looking for captains of industry to come riding out of the East with bulging bags of gold to build factories and develop our resources, we must do this ourselves. The history of all great industries and great industrial centers shows that they were developed by home boys. If we have latent acres of diamonds, we ourselves should know better where they are and how to mine them than any "furrener."

Texans have done many fine jobs of building new industries and new businesses. Take the life insurance business, for example. Texas insurance companies are now writing a majority of the life insurance bought by Texas people, and are expanding into other States. And this life insurance moneyis put to work right here in our own State, building our State and making it a better place in which to live.

The can paign, when it gets under way, will utilize the facilities we have in Texas and tell Texans what it means to build up our own industries and institutions. The benefits should become quickly apparent.-The Southwestern Ambassador.

THE WHY OF TRADE-AT-HOME

In common with most of the citizens of Haskell the Haskell Free Press believes most sincerely in the advantages of "trading at him?"

It is a doctrine that is often misunslerstood, in that some people would go so far as to demand a blind adherence to the theory without regard to the facts of the situation. The sessence of such a course of conduct, if it is to be a community success, requires the intelligent cooperation of Haskell me chants as well as Haskell buyers.

It is the paramount duty of local merchants, or sellers, to be alert in their business to present to their customers attractive goods fairly priced in line with modern competition and to keep up with the best modern merchandising practices elsewhere. This does not necessitate, or expect, the Criborate displays of metropolitan stores, but it does mean meeting the prime essntials of trading that make buying profitable to the buyer as well as the seller.

The obligation which rests upon local citizens, as buyers, demands that, before purchasing merchandise or service out of town, they give Haskell business houses the opportunity of handling the business. No buyer should, through sheer laxiness, or a careless idea of economy, thoughtlessly send money from Haskell. The foolishness of such conduct can be easily demonstrated to any reader who has the slightest doubt of its correctness, or of its value to a civic community.

Fortunately, we have had a generous observance of he "trade-athome" idea. Haskell boasts many progressive business houses, where service to the buyer is a much the keynote as profit to the seller. Of course this policy exists because, in the long run, business men know that it is an adjunct to profit-making. Our local buyers, as a rule, do patronize local businesses, and , we are convinced, in the majority of instances, with pleasure and profit.

GOVERNMENT BY BUREAUS AND COMMISSIONS

For the past ten years or more we have been listening to the promises of politicians, that if righted by the people and sent to Austin, every effort would be made to shall a some of the many Bureaus and Commissions, thereby cutting off some of the needless expense of operating our state government. This lin of talk has had a strong appeal to the voters because it is no r generally recognized that the growing expense of our government is largely attributed to the policy of establishing a new bureau or a few new commissions every time the legislature meets. Despite the fact that an unusual number of such proposals have been dumped into the legislative hopper during the first thirty days of this session, it now appears from press reports that there is a strong sentiment in this legislature against creating any new bureaus or commissions. It is to be hoped that this policy will prevail.

THE NATIONAL COMEDY

An interesting and almost comic situation in Congress is commented on by Wm L. Daley, Washington representative of the National Editorial Association, in a recent news letter. It concerns control of the new Coregress elected last fall which seems within reach of either of the two parties that wants it.

Strangely enough, according to Mr. Daley, neither party appears to want control and its accompanying responsibilities. If the Republicans organize the new Senate and House, a coalition of Democrats and Insurgent Republicans can thwart their legislative plans, as has been demonstrated in certain recent instances. If the Democrats gain control, a Republican President could easily defeat any legislation not to his liking through the veto power.

So, whatever happens, it is very likely that the next Congress will be a rather futile body, incapable of any great accomplishments upon which to appeal to the country in the elections of 1932. And neither party seems desirous of taking the responsibility of leadership when

prospects of making political capital seem so remote.

Seldom, if ever, in the history of the country have national politics been in a more chaotic condition, and leaders of the various groups are all at sea with respect to the outcome. Therefore we may see, unusual and even frantic efforts at buck-passing at Washington during the next sew months. And buck-passing is an indoor sport at which politicians

Their antics in this line between now and the next presidential election will assume the aspect of a national comedy.


BEGIN CHARITY AT HOME

In spite of the present unfavorable economic situation, there is still heard in some quarters continued agitation for the cancellation of the war debts owed to the United States by various foreign nations. There is no justification for such cancellation at this time, when our own people are inforing under heavy taxation and other burdens that cannot be escaped.

Compromises with the nations which owe this country have reduced the principal of these debts to less than one-half of their original amount and to that extent these obligations have been cancelled already. In making these compromises Uncle Sam has been most generous both in determining the sums to be paid and in permitting payments to be made over a long period—62 years.

The money which these debts represent was borrowed by the United States government from its own pople and loaned to the Allies. It

must be paid from the Federal treasury whether foreign nations pay or not. This means that any further cancellation of war debts will increase the burden of domestic taxpayers accordingly.

Economy in government administration is just now the outstanding need. Congress and other legislative bodies are giving away a lot of money as it is, but when it goes to aid our own people it is not entirely unjustified.
