

The men usually wore heavy cowhide boots, well greased with mutton tallow to keep out the wet, as rubbers were then unknown. The children wore calfskin and the young women of the family morocco or kid, sometimes red or blue-and tled with silk tassels. The cordwainer set up his bench in a corner of the kitchen, and while he hammered away or stitched industriously at his work regaled his customers with the news he had gathered in his travels. #### A CLARION CALL

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, is not a radical or an alarmist, and is not given to wild statements. Hence his warning of a 'tebellion of the army of the unemployed which will apset our present political system unless industry and goverrament comperate with labor in the current depression" calls for serfour consultration. Stressing the seriousness of the unemployment satuation, President Green, in a recent address before the 46th annual convention of the Massachusetts Federation of Labor asked. "Are we going to make it necessary for workers to raid stores because their children are starying? Can the financiers and wealthy feel secure in their homes when millions are hungry?"

Describertion of work so that every man shall have his share, even if it were necessary to reduce the work week to three days, maintenance of the present wage scale, and the expenditure of government monies for public works were cited by Green as means of solving the unemplayment problem

The publence of the jobless cannot endure indefinitely, even though she partience of the unemployed under the distressing conditions of the past year and a half has been surprising. Idle men cannot be expected to starte peneriully when the secrety to which they belong denies them a chance to earn their food and shelter.

Mr. Green asks President Hoover to consider the gravity of the situation, and to call a national conference on unemployment. The American Legion asked the same thing months ago. Numerous and prominent men have urged action of this kind.

Whether such a conference would be effective in solving unemployment is open to question, but the nation would at least have the consolation of knowing that something was being attempted, and that we are not to continue to sink deeper and deeper without a hand being raised at Washington. Why stand we here idle when millions are suffering? An outstanding leader of the Woodrow Wilson type is needed at the helm in this emergency.

#### LOTTERY BROADCASTING

This is assespaper shop talk but it might be of general interest anyway It's all about a discussion that is taking space in the newspaper trade publications relative to the lottery laws.

It is well known to postmasters, newspaper men and most advertisthat the postal laws are exceedingly strict in forbidding publication news or advertisements pertaining to raffles, games of chance, guessing contexts or any other scheme that Uncle Sam has always regarded as falling under the general heading of lotteries. Such schemes are declared by the post office department as "inimical to the public interest." No newspaper is permitted to go through the mails if it contains either news or advertisements pertaining to any of the above.

Recently the attorney general of lows has issued orders to all county atterness that merchants in any town, for instance, dare not give away And it is just too had for any newspaper that should attempt to boost such a gift giving enterprise through its columns.

Dut does Uncle Sam take similar steps to put a quietus to kottery advertisance via the radio? Versic, he does not? Any radio listeners in known that it can be turied are being advertised over the air in increasing quantity. Not only that but fake mediums, numberologists. Fortune tellers claim oracits and grafters are working over time, through broadcasting stations on programs "sponsored" by this or that concern. No repulable newspaper would be permitted to carry fake advertisements of the sort even if it should desire to do so.



#### Blasting Lowers Producing Costs

#### Specialist Tells How to Remove Stumps and Boulders on Farm.

Lowering the cost of crop pro-duction by blusting stumps and boulders out of tilled fields to reduce the time required for plowing, cultivating, and harvesting, is a safe and disexpensive practice when certain rules are followed, says Virgil-a Octobel, extension specialist in agricultural engineering at the Ohio State university.

If dynamits is handled with the

ordinary recommended precautions, blasting is as safe as other farm

tasks, he believes. Crimp all caps with cap crimpers rather than with a pair of pliers, Overholt recommends. Pilers are likely to crush the cap, thus cutthe fuse and ofclines, as a result, the charge; is either delayed or does not go off at all. The use of cap crimpers is the blaster's best form of life insurance and ald in preventing accidents

Most accidents in blasting operations are due to investigating why charges have failed to go off. It is best not to investigate a delayed charge until a day later. Fuses, he feels, should be at least a foot and a half long; this length allows the operator about a minute and a half to leave the stump or boulder. Where a blasting machine or battery is used, it is safest to use wires at least 200 feet long.

Always face the charge so that pieces of stone or wood may be dodged if necessary, and never smoke while handling dynamite, he advises. Fuse caps should be kept out of reach of children.

Bursting Boulders. In bursting bounders, he suggests that the mud capping method be sticks of dynamite on the stone and putting about six inches of wet, sticky mud over them. Stump blasting is usually done by placing the charge directly under the stump, or, where there is a tapcharge in the center of the root. However, if the wood is hard, the charge may be placed close to one side of the root. The charge may be tapped with safety after a few inches of earth have been placed next to the dynamite and mud placed in the hole.

#### Don't Neglect Rhubarb During Whole Season

Do not fail to take good care of your rhubarb plants all season as well as in the spring when you are making use of the tender stems for sauces and ples. After the first few cuttings of rhubarb stems, many gardeners neglect this crop

until the following spring.

Harvest of the rhubarb crop should be completed in from six to eight weeks' time. After this period has passed, allow the leaves to remain.

Stir the earth around the plants at least once a week in order that the weeds may be controlled, and that the leaves may store plenty of plant food in the roots without weed competition. By so doing, the plants are aided in producing a large crop of tender stems the next year. Keep the seed stalks broken off all summer. If these are allowed to develop, the plant food will go to seed production rather than into the roots where it is de-

#### Discover Two Sources

of Potato Blackleg The popular theory, held by po-tate growers for many years, that diseased seed constituted the only source of infection of blackleg, has been exploded by Dr. J. G. Leach, plant pathologist at University Farm, St. Paul, Minn., with the discovery of two Important new sources of infestation. These new sources are first, bacteria present in the soil itself, and second, bacteria carried into the seed pieces by maggots.

Doctor Leach's experiments have shown conclusively that the blackleg bacteria may live over winter in the soil. However, he says, when planting is done under favorable conditions and in light, well-drained soil, a layer of wound cork is formed on the seed pieces which immunizes them to the blackles

#### Legislation to Improve

Quality of Dairy Milk Ontario has recently introduced legislation to improve the quality of milk offered for sale in that

of milk offered for sale in that province.

"All milk received at a milk and eream distributing plant which is said or distributed in liquid form for human consumption shall be purchased on a uniform standard of 3.4 per cent butterfat. For milk testing from 3.4 to 4.5 per cent fat, the purchaser shall add 4 cents per 100 pounds of milk for each one-tenth of 1 per cent fat sheve the standard, and for milk testing below 3.4 per cent fat the purchaser shall deduct 4 cents per 100 pounds of milk for each one-tenth of 1 per cent below the standard."

### Elevate Silage

Bilage cutter tests by Prof. F. W. Duffee at the University of Wiscondin show that the cutter elevates the cut corn by throwing rather than by blowing. It was found that elevating fans with a low air pressure were the most efficient and require the least power to operate. Tests of shortened fan wings showed an increased mechanical efficiency, making possible a saving of from 5 to 15 per cent to the amount of power required.
