





Cattle Feeding Test Completed The results of recently com-

pleted cattle feeding experiments at the Big Spring Field Station should be of interest to cattle feeders in West Texas. This experiment was a study of the influence of mineral supplements in grain sorghum rations for fattening steer calves.

Six lots of steers, with 6 steers to the lot, were used in the experiments and were fed similar rations for 182 days. Lot one received no mineral supplement and was the check or control group and the other five groups received varying amounts of mineral supplements, bone meal and limestone flour.

The best performing group was the one that received 200 grams of bone meal per head per day as a supplement to their ration of ground threshed milo, cottonseed meal, sumac sorgo silage and salt. This was the same ration that was fed to all lots. This lot had the highest daily gain, the lowest feed cost per hundred pounds gain and the best net return per head when they were sold

J. M. Jones, Animal Husbandman with the Texas Experiment Stations, says that feeding test at Big Spring over a period of years indicate that the feeding of 200 grams of bone meal per head per day is a good practice for the feeders to follow. In addition to cattle making better gains and having a better finish, the feeding of bone meal tends to hold down the urinary calculi trouble.

Crowding Hens Unprofitable

The poultryman who sells the extra pullets rather than overcrowds the laying house will be money ahead. Too many hens in the laying house can cause plenty of trouble during the winter season, because ventilation systems may be ineffective when the house is overcrowded, says Bill Moore, Poultryman of A & M College. The result of crowding is too much moisture in the air damp litter and wet walls and generally unhealthy conditions. The birds are more likely to be troubled with diseases and thus reduction in the eggs pro-

Three to four square feet of floor space should be allowed for each bird in a well equipped house. Six inches of feeder space should be allowed each hen. There should be at least one nest for every five hens in the house. Plenty of good clean drinking water should be pro-vided for hens. When the weather is cold, it is a good idea to warm the water just a little. 100 hens will drink about 5 gallons of water a day.

If these good poultry management practices are observed. the producer will get eggs from his hens when the price is the highest.

Hog Care

Hog producers should be on the lookout for swine flu. The weather during this season of the year — warm days and cold nights - is favorable for flu development. Hogs should be protected from the elements. A well-bedded shed that is clean and has plenty of ventilation is the best shelter for hogs. Better check to see that they use the shelter you provide, because they will probably prefer to stay outside.

The disease, according to Dr. Banks, A&M College Veterinarian, is seldom fatal but the loss of flesh is important. In addition to the losses suffered on fat hogs, gilts that are being kept for brood sows may be affected. Small, weak litters often result when the gilts have been

Hawaiian Sweet Potatoes

1 lb. sweet potatoes*
(3 medium)
4 slices canned
5 cup Fet Milk
2 tablespoons brown
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 slices canned




