Crowding Hens Unprofitable
The poultryman who sells the
extra pullets rather than over-
extra pullets rather than over-
crowds the laying house will be
money ahead. Too many hens
in the laying house can cause
plenty of trouble during the win-
ter season, because ventilation
systems may be ineffective when
he house is overcrowded, says
Bill Moore, Poultryman of A \&
I College. The result of crow
ng is too much moisture in
ir c damp litter and wet walls
nd generally unhealthy condi-
tions. The birds are more likely
to be troubled with diseases and
thes reduction in the eggs pro
o be troubled with diseases and
thus reduction in the eggs pro-
duced.
Three to four square feet of
floor space should be allowed
for each bird in a well equip-
ped house. Six inches of feeder
space should be allowed each
hen. There should be at least
one nest for every five hens in
the house. Plenty of good clean
drinking water should be pro
vided for hens. When the weath-
er is cold, it is a good idea to
warm the water just a ilitle. 100

hens will drink about 5 gallons
of water a day.
