This section's long-cherished dream of an all-weather road connection with adjoining counties is rapidly becoming a reality, with rapid pro-gress being made daily on pouring the concrete surfacing on Mighway 30 north and south through the

Haskell residents have had the opportunity this week of gaining irst-hand knowledge of the work of highway building, since one of the machinery moved to the north side of the square and work started on the north end of the road Wednesday morning. A large crew of men is at work on this end, and between 1200 and 1300 feet of surfacing is being laid each day.

The entire stretch between Haskell and Stamford will be completed within the next ten days, as only a gap of between one and a half and two miles remains to be laid between the two towns. When this stretch is completed, all machinery and equipment at work on the south part of the road will be moved north of Haskell for the completion of the entire road to the Knox county line.

Those in charge of the project expect to have the entire highway north and south through the county completed by the end of August or possibly sooner, with the road open



LET'S HAVE A REAL "COUNTY FAIR"

With the best prospects in a decade, at this time of the year, for an excellent yield of every agricultural product grown in West Texas, it seems that this fall would be an admirable time to exhibit the county's products, and for this reason plans should be made now for staging the Haskell County Fair again this year.

Todate no steps for holding this year's Fair have been made, the officers and directors of the Association doubtless holding to the opinson that under present economic conditions this year's Fair could not be staged without a deficit in operating expenses, which would place a Lurden upon business men and others who promote the exposition.

We likewise feel that any attempt to underwrite an elaborate prograin of entertainment calling for several thousand dollars in prizes would be unwise and unwarranted.

However, we do believe that a Fair can be held this year without enstaining a deficit-a Fair that will reflect credit upon Haskell and this section. The affair could be made a "County Fair" in reality, with no attempt to pattern after the larger Fairs of the State in the way of farmishing an elaborate and expensive program of entertainment. Make the occasion a time of reunion and mingling together of our citizens, where they may exhibit their products and handiwork, discuss their problems and join in wholesome association together, without asking them to support a high-priced array of attractions in an effort to furnish thrills to draw huge crowds.

We believe that despite preset conditions, and with bumper crops amost a certainty, Haskell county citizens would whole-heartedly support an old-fashioned County Fair this fall.

OUR CITY WATER SYSTEM

In a classification talk before the Lions Club last Thursday, Mayor Emory Menefee gave some interesting information regarding our city enter system. We believe this information will be of interest to our maders, and we give here a few of the facts brought out in the Mayor's

The system as it stands today is valued at about \$150,000 with an indebtedness of \$34,500 against the plant. Five wells supply the city with an abundance of water. Nine miles of water mains supply about customers at the present time. 62 fire hydrants located in conwenient places over town have been installed for fire protection, Gross receipts from water sold amounts to between \$11,000 and \$12,000

The uninimum charge to the customer is \$1.50 per month, and this entitles the user to 3000 gallons. All over 3000 gallons used each month is charged at the rate of 15c per thousand gallons.

Mayor Menefee also gave a comparison of the above rate with eight other nearly towns in this section, and in each instance either their minimum rate or the charge for additional water used above the minimum was higher than this city's rate. The average for the 8 towns was Minimum charge \$1.86 1.2. Additional water used over minimum 29c

Another saving pointed out by Mayor Menefee was the substantial e insurance rate caused by having a modern water system and fire fighting equipment. This saving alone materially rechares the cost of water to the consumer who is a property owner.

We believe the above information will be of interest to the public as the average citizen gives the water system but little thought, nor approciates the advantages and conveniences, the system brings to

A safety council bulletin declares that an automobile without good brakes is more dangerous than a war-time projectile. Because, once the projectile reaches its destination it is a thing of the past. It is neither hit or missed and it is well known that the percentage of hits is relatively

The automobile, on the other hand, continues on its perilous way until it reaches the scrap heap. When new it is a marvel of convenience and safety but unless it is kept in good condition, especially with respect to its brakes, it often becomes a deadly menace



Use Wheat for Cereal Advises H. D. Agent of Wichita County

The following article appeared in the Wichita Falls Record-News by Ethel Louise Webb, home demonstration agent, which might be of interest to Pree Press readers.

Serve wheat to your family is advice well worth taking. Wheat is indeed inexpensive and has the additional advantage of being a food that satisfies the appetite and an excellent source of many of the elements so necessary for good nutrition. The housewife's use of the whole wheat grain has heretofore been almost entirely limited to flour and a cooked breakfast cereal.

Former President Coolidge recent ly entertained a member of the federal farm board for breakfast, at which wheat and rye porridge was the cereal. His recipe for this seldom-used dish, was, two parts of wheat and one of rye, put in a double boiler and cooked until the kernels burst. The former president's enthusiasm for wheat ridge has aroused a new interest in this revised version of an ancient dish. It is a well known fact that Caesar's conquering legions did their fighting with boiled wheat as their principal ration. Wheat porridge is just as good without the rye, in the estimation of the majority.

Wheat as Breakfast Cereal

Whole wheat may be substituted for rice or macaroni, and served with meats and gravy. Whole wheat may be added to soups as a substitute for rice or macaroni.

Use any good rice pudding recipe, substitute amount of wheat for rice and make a delicious dessert.

Whole wheat may be used as you do cooked rice, as in suffed peppers. The flavor is similar to that of nuts and if properly cooked the grain retains its shape. These are all good practical recipes and certainly every pantry in Wichita county should have their supply of whole wheateither stored for use or already canned and ready for human consump-

Canned Wheat

water. Next morning drain and 50. wash the wheat again to remove some of the dark brown color. Cover with boiling water and cook five minutes, stirring constantly. thirds full, add one teaspoonful salt. Cover with water in which wheat was boiled. Seal and process for 40 minutes at 15 lbs. pressure.

Whole Wheat, Fish and Tomatoes by those present.

One-half pound canned fish, one chopped celery, one teaspoonful salt, Mrs. T. C. Russell. one eighth teaspoonful pepper, two cups cooked whole wheat.

Drain the fish, reserving the liquid and flake the fish into small pieces. Cook tomatoes, celery and fish liquid until the mixture is fairly thick Add seasoning, wheat and fish, and cook a few minutes longer and stir to blend well. Serve on

Whole Wheat Porridge With Dates

Soak wheat overnight. In the morning drain and add three cups of water and one teaspoonful of salt to each cup of soaked wheat. Boil gently for 3 1-2 hours or until tender and no uncooked starchy flavor is noticeable. If necessary add more boiling water during the cooking to keep from getting too dry. Serve for breakfast while warm with chopped dates and cream. This whole wheat may be placed in ice box and kept for several days.


