



THE HUEY LONG PROPOSAL

The following timely editorial appeared in the Wichita Times last The what regarding the cutton situation. .

The support which is being given the Huey Long plan to plant no cotton at all next year illustrates the temper of these times. Preposterous as the proposal seems it is finding many earnest advocates. One current donniss such schemes by calling them revolutionary; in times The these drastic measures are apt to find favor where conservative, patiental outer could not get a hearing.

The spiration of the constitutionality of a law embodying the plan is difficult to answer. If military forces may be legally employed to prewent the pumping of an oil well, we would hesitate to say that they earlid not be used to prevent the planting of a field of cotton. There is and difference in principle, even though oil production is shut down in the mann of conservation. That word could not be invoked, save in a theometical way on the cotton plan, but words do not necessarily count for much, in the crisis that the cotton industry faces. It may be difficult to beach the Long plan down.

We can assume that the plan can be adopted; that is, that the menessary legislation could be enacted and forced. We can assume, for ther, that it would tend to do for the price of cotton all that the Santa would like to see done. We can make these assumptions and still find ourselves very far from accepting the wisdom of the plan.

Those who have accepted it are overlooking three factors that it will not do to overlook. One of these is the foreign cotton crop Another is that the plan would leave the South with no cash crop. The third is the violence which would be done to American traditions and

"Adoption of the plan would bring about a tremendous increase in screage in Russia, Egypt, India and South America. That cotton could be kept out of American mills; it could not be kept out of European

and Japanese mills. "What would be planted on the fields now used for cotton? Feed most foodstuffs, someone answers. The cotton farmer could at least raise corn for his animals and raise much of the food his family requires. But there would be no cash crop. That would affect not only the farmer, but the merchant and the banker-and the tax collector-in the hardreds of communities dependent on cotton. It would be worth greach to the South to have a year's object lesson in the importance of "living at home,"but the South's economic structure is based on an anental cotton crop that puts cash into circulation.

The third major objection is the most important one. We will be setting into extremely dangerous ground when we concede to any constifurted authority the right to say what shall not be done with our fields. We would be sacrificing a principle and not even 30-cent cotton could examplessate, in the years to come, for that sacrifice. We would pay too beg a price for the suversion of principles that the plan would involve.

Some good may come of the proposal, at that. It may bring home to the South the imperative need of reducing acreage in a sensible way 25-rhaps that benefit will justify the fantastic folly of the proposa






