"The end of hard times next summer and defeat of President Hoover next November were predicted to-day for the United Press by Madame Fraya, French seer.

"She foretold a year ago the slump of sterling, death of Joffre, war in Manchuria, overthrow of Alfonso and rise to power of Pierre Laval. "By midsummer, Madame Fraya

predicted, "America will be smiling again and happy days will be back on Wall street."

"The U. S. will remain in an economic slump until summer but be fore the end of the year America will again be leading the world toward riches and prosperity," she

The great catastrophies of 1932 will not be caused by wars but by waters, Madame Fraya said. She predicted catastrophies at sea floods and tidal waves but no wars

or revolutions. "She saw the disappearance of Briand from the political horizon by



## LAST LAME DUCK SESSION?

The final session of the Seventy-second Congress, which will convene in December, may go down in history as the last "lame duck" session.

Lame ducks, as everyone knows, are members of Congress who continue in office for the short session after their successors have been elected.

Their doom is sounded by the Norris Amendment to the Constitution which was adopted by Congress last March, and has a cond been ratified by 17 of the 36 States. With the legislatures of 29 other states meeting in January, and only 19 more ratifications needed, it is confidently predicted that the Twentieth Amendment will be in effect long before another Congressional elec-

If the lame duck amendment goes through, it will mean that when a new Congressman is elected in November he will not have to wait until thirteen months later to take his seat, but will start his Congressional career on January 3 of the year following his election. As it is now, the defeated candidate continues to represent the district which has turned him down, and his successor has no chance to function until the following December, unless a special session of Congress is called before that

The damage which a lame duck Congress can do is great. It is absurd to let legislation be effected by those who no longer represent the sentiment of the district. Under the Norris amendment the legislation will be more responsive to the demands of the people.

In addition to abolishing the lame-duck session the Norris amendment advances the date of the President's inauguration from March 4 to January 20. Shortening the time between the election and inauguration of a President is of great importance. As it is now, if a new President is chosen, the country suffers four months of business stagnation and general uncertainty as to the new Presidential policies and the new tariff rates.

## DODGING HIGH POSTAGE

Another illustration of the fact that raising prices does not always increase revenues is seen in the recent increase of letter postage from two to three cents. In fact, this has been seen in numerous postal rate increases in recent years.

The new rate has caused a marked decrease in first class mail, and postal authorities, who estimated that Federal revenues would be increased to the extent of \$160,000,000 a year by higher postal rates, now advocate a return to the two cent rate.

For example, a firm which formerly sent out thousands of bill seach month under two cent postage now sends postal card statements for one cent. Also, it has arranged for customers to pay their bills by deposits in convenient banks, instead of mailing checks, with this result:

Formerly the government received two cents as postage on the mailed bill and another two cents on the envelope containing the customer's check. If the new scheme had worked out it would have received three cents postage on the mailed bill, another three cents on th envelope with the remitted check and two cents on the check itself, or a total of eight cents. But under the new arrangement devised by the patron it now receives only one cent. Many bills formerly mailed are now delivered by employes of various firms at less than postage cost.

In another case, a bank which formerly returned customer's cancelled checks by mail which would cost from three to 15 cents for each batch returned at the present rate, now holds these cancelled checks and has patrons call at the bank for them.

Former increases in newspaper postal rates caused many large publishers to adopt truck delivery over wide areas, at a saving to them and a consequent loss to the government.

It will thus be seen that even a government monopoly loses when it tries to impose higher rates than the traffic will bear.

## THOUGHTLESS CRUELTY

A news dispatch tells of Teresa Corona, of New York, 14 years old and six feet tall, who ran away from school and home to get away from the ridicule of her fellow pupils. Thoughtlessly her associates have made her the victim of a heartless tragedy.

It was hard enough to bear the self-consciousness and embarrassment which the child's abnormal size made inescapable, but those who made her burden greater by their derision were unspeakably cruel.

Many instances like this occur, where some physical defect or peculiarity of a sensitive person is used as a pretext to torture them with unkind remarks, which cut to the quick. We read some time ago of a young girl who finally committeed suicide because she had been

driven to desperation by ridicule of her family name,

which had a suggestive meaning to evil-minded persons. Children will seize upon such opportunities to harass their associates, sometimes in a spirit of fun, but often with vicious intent. While most parents would disapprove of such conduct, many do not take the trouble to explain to their children how really cruel it is, or to apto their better natures to induce them to refrain

It is a modified principle of the ncome tax law which Mr. Weinert and others of the joint legislative tax survey have studied for a year. but would retain the ad valorem collection of taxes upon the property as the mechanic of determining and collecting the taxes upon the earnings of property. "Less than I per cent of the intangible wealth of Texas is now taxed," Mr. Weinert said

Rep. Weinert long has been known as an authority on taxation. He has served in three administrations as state tax commissioner; has been a member of the house and the senate, and secretary of state. He has declined membership on the Texas railroad commission at the appointment of past governors.
