### LETTER FROM CHINA.

Thinking that, in view of the situation here, our friends might be anxious regarding our safety, I write briefly to say that, at present, there is no particular danger in this part of the Empire. The air is full of the wildest rumors, the excitement is intense, especially among the natives, and all of the conditions are highly favorable to the rowdy class, who would be glad to begin trouble for purposes of plunder. During the past two weeks the Chinese have been highly excited, and have been moving in all directions. They believe that the Boxrs are coming, and to their minds that means a repetition of the Tai Ping re beilion of forty years ago.

However, our two Viceroys and Governors have given strong assurances to the Consuls that they will exert their power and authority to maintain the peace and to prevent the spread of these troubles to the south. At pres ent, the disturbed districts are confined mainly to the two Provinces of Shan Tung and Chih Li. And now that we have news of the way being open for the Japanese Government to send over a force equal to the emergency, it is most probable that such an agree ment among the Powers will be of great service in strengthening the determination of the Chinese officials in central China to maintain order. The Japanese forces will be quite sufficient keep whatever forces the usurpers




