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HAVE FAITH IN GOD.

This exhortation given originally to the apostles may be as appropriately given to preachers now as to any other class of men; without faith in God they are a helpless, useless class. If they undertake their work in their own strength they are the most presumptuous men on earth. No other class of men has undertaken to do such a mighty work as saving men from sin, and bringing them into harmony with God. What a sad spectacle it would be for the ministry to put themselves in a condition where they could justly be pronounced the most presumptuous of men! But such they are if they really expect to accomplish their work by their own intellectual or moral power. But if they go forth to their work not presumptuously, but in the power of a well-grounded faith in God, their work will commend itself to others, and they will appear not as inflated egotists, but as servants of God, relying on his power to accomplish what they know they never can accomplish alone. It is admitted there are mysteries connected with the doctrine of special providence we cannot understand, but if we refuse to believe it on that ground, we are logically forced to refuse to believe in our own existence, for we cannot understand how spirit and matter are united in ourselves nor the processes of our own thoughts.



Tomas Estrada Palma is 65 years of age. His father was a wealthy planter in the easternmost Province of Cuba, and the son was well educated in Cuba and in Spain, and became a lawyer, with a view not so much to the practice of his profession as to the better management of the affairs of a large estate. His patriotic sympathies led him to active service in the ten years struggle for independence which began in 186 and ended in 1878, and early in that period he became a General in the insurgent army. Toward the end of the war, he became the President of the Provisional Government, a position which at least indicated the confidence in which he was held by the Cuban people. He was made a prisoner, taken to Spain, at the risk of his life refused to swear allegiance, witnessed, in consequence, the confiscation of his estates, and some time after the final termination of the strucket of the struc
