THE DESTRUCTION OF BIRDS.

As the merry springtime approacaes there are not lacking champions of the song and other useful birds that are distinctly a blessing to all people of these United States.

Hoys and men are not, by any man ner of means, responsible for the de struction of all the beautiful birds tha are killed. Women are the worst ene mies the birds have, as the following statistics from the Ladies' Home Jour nal prove. That paper estimates tha eighty out of every hundred women in the United States, on an average, use the plumage of birds as ornaments. It is especially fashionable for women to wear birds and bird wings on hats, bonnets, and other headgear. The birds have to be killed to supply this demand. This makes the wholesale slaughter of birds a very profitable in-

The plumage of more than three million birds were received in New York City during one year. One shipment alone carried the wings of four hun-dred thousand birds to a single dealer. 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

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


