Political Interest Grows As Primary Approaches

Cotton Co-op Meeting Here Friday

Speaker Will Discuss Co-Operative Organization in Marketing of Cotton.

For the purpose of making it possible for all the people in this county to secure detailed information on the plan and program of the Federal Farm Board for assisting the farmers through the Texas Cotton Co-operative Association, a special mass meeting has been arranged to be held on Friday evening of this week at 8 p. m. in the district courtroom of the Haskell County courthouse.

At this meeting, a speaker well informed on the organization and its connection with the present and explain the program and answer any questions of concern to it. All farmers, merchants, bankers and others desiring to learn more of the undertaking are invited to attend the meeting.

The Texas Co-operative Association is the only organization in Texas through which the farmers can receive the benefits of the agricultural marketing act which became a law on June 15, 1929. That association absorbed the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association and its membership contract has been contractually changed in order to meet the requirements of the Federal Farm Board.

Under the old farm bureau contract, a member was required to deliver every bale of his cotton to the co-op. The Texas Cotton Co-operative Association membership agreement calls for the delivery of every other bale of cotton that is produced by the farmer up to 20 bales. In other words if a cotton producer produces 20 bales he must ship five bales and if his production reaches 100 bales he is required to deliver only ten bales, may deliver all or any part of total crop.

Business men and bankers over the state and especially in West Texas, are manifesting much interest in the co-operative program under government direction, which is being operated with government money and they are urging their farm friends to affiliate with the organization.

In communities where the program has already been explained the farmers are in many cases signing membership agreements in large numbers. Already over 50 per cent of the total cotton acreage in Scurry county has been signed up for marketing this year through the co-op. Sign-up campaigns in Fisher, Shell, Coleman, Jones and several other West Texas counties are well under way and meeting satisfactory responses, workers are giving reports.

A professional paid membership drive and organizers are being employed in the co-op campaign in this part of West Texas. The work is being done by farmers, merchants, bankers and others who are enough interested to voluntarily give their aid to the program.

The mass meeting announced will be held simply to supply information on the co-operative plan to the people in this territory who are wanting to learn of its details. No efforts will be made to "high pressure" any farmer or other person to endorse this idea against his better judgment.

SMALL AUDIENCE HEARS MAYFIELD SPEAKER FRIDAY

J. F. Cunningham of Abilene, well-known West Texas lawyer, addressed a crowd of about 100 people on the courthouse lawn last Friday afternoon in the interest of the candidacy of Earle B. Mayfield for Governor.

The speaking had been advertised for Friday night, but upon his arrival here in the afternoon, Mr. Cunningham decided to speak at that time instead. Mr. Cunningham in a forceful way, discussed the issues in the race, denouncing the chain stores and the Wall Street stock exchange, pointing out the need of legislative control against these institutions as advocated by Mayfield.

SPEAKS IN BEHALF STERLING CANDIDACY WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Rev. A. E. Ewell of Ft. Worth, West Texas manager of the R. S. Sterling campaign for Governor, addressed a crowd of approximately 200 people on the courthouse lawn Wednesday night in the interest of Sterling's candidacy.

The speaker discussed the issues of the present campaign and mentioned the platforms of the various aspirants for the office, conceding Mrs. Ferguson would be in the runoff and admonishing his hearers that Sterling was the only candidate who could defeat her. He explained the \$350,000,000 highway bond issue advocated by Sterling, denying statements made by several other candidates relative to this issue. In closing, he urged that every voter go to the polls Saturday and vote his convictions, regardless of whom he was supporting.

ADMISSION CHARGES WILL BE REDUCED FOR COUNTY FAIR

Number of New Features to Mark This Year's Exposition.

The plans that have been launched for the Haskell County Fair which will be held on October 16, 17 and 18th, assures the coming exhibition one of the best ever held in this section. It will be one of the most diversified and interesting attractions ever offered in this section and the admission charges will be cut to almost one-half of the usual charges, in the belief that it will be instrumental in attracting larger crowds during the entire three days of the show.

The program as outlined by Manager Turner E. Campe before the directors at a meeting held the first of the week will be the most diversified ever attempted in the history of the association. Among the many attractions that are being considered will be stock car races, Burro Polo, Blind Mule Race, Horse Racing, or Rodeo. A pageant will be given probably the first night, portaying the history of Haskell County. A style show open to all the merchants of Haskell County will probably be the main attraction on the second night. All the merchants in Haskell County will be invited to enter without charge and assist in making it one of the most attractive style shows ever attempted in West Texas. On the last night of the Fair will be staged a sham-battle of the world war in addition to the fireworks display.

In spite of the dry weather at the present time, the directors believe that the live stock and agricultural exhibits will be as good as those shown at previous fairs, as more interest is being taken in the success of the coming event than ever before.

Judge A. H. King of Throckmorton, former Representative of this district, and now a candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture, was a visitor in Haskell Tuesday, having just returned from several weeks campaigning in South and East Texas. Judge King stated that he met with much encouragement in those sections of the state, and that his candidacy is meeting with favorable support in all places he has visited.

From his long service as Representative, he is well and favorably known throughout West Texas, and is the only West Texas aspirant for the office of Commissioner of Agriculture, and indications are that he will receive an overwhelming vote in this section of the State which will easily put him in the run off primary for nomination.

Judge King spent several hours in Haskell, meeting old friends and discussing his campaign.

HEALTH OFFICER SAYS TYPHOID EPIDEMIC RUMORS ARE FALSE

In last week's issue of the Rule Review it was stated that there were 12 cases of typhoid fever in Haskell. The Free Press has made a close investigation of the situation and finds that this report is untrue. Only three cases exist in Haskell and all three were contracted elsewhere according to Dr. W. A. Kimbrough, City Health Officer. Mrs. John Oates and Mrs. Henry Alexander both became ill soon after their return from a vacation and fishing trip into old Mexico. Elmer Irwin, Jr. returned to Haskell with fever from Amarillo and Wichita Falls. All three victims are reported to be getting along nicely.

Interest in county and state politics, which has been manifestly light is growing this week, with the Primary Saturday only a few days away, and those interested in the political fortunes of the various candidates are evidencing more and more interest in the political outlook.

Although any prediction as to the outcome of state races in this locality is merely a conjecture, those who have heretofore been able to forecast the outcome in an impartial and fairly accurate way are at a loss to do so with the large number of candidates now in the field.

However, the consensus of opinion concerning the Governor's race in this county seem to give Clint C. Small the lead in the county, Mrs. Ferguson second place and R. S. Sterling third, with possibly Love, Mayfield, Young and Miller trailing in the order named, with possibly 50 votes for the other four candidates scattered over the county.

In the Attorney General's race, James V. Allred of Wichita Falls is predicted to carry the county, with Cecil Storey second and Robert Lee Bobbitt a poor third. In the race for Commissioner of Agriculture, King of Throckmorton will easily carry the county over all his opponents. In the race for U. S. Senator, a substantial majority is conceded Morris Sheppard over both his opponents, with Marvin Jones, candidate for Congressman, assured an overwhelming majority over his opponent.

In district offices, interest is confined to the race for District Judge, in which Judge Bruce W. Bryant is opposed for re-election by Tom Davis, local attorney and former District Attorney, and in the race for Representative in which Dennis P. Ratliff, Haskell and T. R. Odell of Throckmorton are aspirants.

Only two county offices are being contested, W. T. Sarrels is being opposed for his second term as Sheriff by G. W. Piland. Mike B. Watson, candidate for re-election as Tax Assessor, is opposed by Elgin Carothers of Rule.

In Precinct offices, the Commissioner's race in Precinct 4 is the only one in which more than two candidates are entered, L. C. Phillips, W. T. Morgan, O. L. Darden and M. L. Jones being aspirants for the office. For Commissioner in Precinct 1, Geo. B. Tanner, present incumbent, is opposed by J. S. Abernath. In Precinct No. 2, R. B. Guess is opposed for reelection by Tom Mapes, while in Precinct 3, J. F. Simmons, candidate for his second term, is opposed by Monroe Howard.

For Constable in Precinct No. 1, R. E. Delbard candidate for his second term, is being opposed by J. H. Ivey, completing the list of candidates with the exception of the candidates for the various precinct offices of Cotton Weigher and Constable over the county.

With poll tax payments in the county totalling 3,909, a vote of around 3,200 is expected. In the 39th Judicial District, votes aggregating 7,000 are predicted, with a poll of 5,500 votes predicted in the 113th District which embraces the race for Representative.

A STATEMENT

By Tom Davis, Candidate for District Judge

Haskell, Texas, July 21, 1930

I am making this final appeal for your support in my race for District Judge. I have lived continuously in Haskell County for fifteen years. During that time I have served the people of Haskell County as County Attorney, and the people of the 39th Judicial District as District Attorney. My record in these offices is an open book and I have heard no criticism of that record. As an official I have done my best to enforce the laws of Texas, and both in official and private life I have obeyed these same laws.

I am a candidate for this office, because I want it, because of its honor, and because I believe I can be of service to the people of this district. If elected I will give every man a fair trial to the end that the laws be enforced and civil rights protected. I will conduct the business of the District Court with dispatch and with the greatest degree of economy of time and of money.

I resigned as County Attorney and entered the last war, for this I deserve no credit because it was my DUTY to do so. I resigned during my second term as District Attorney because the health of my family made it my DUTY to do so.

S. J. R. No. 19

Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

The Legislature shall meet every two years as such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular Session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of each session and after that not exceeding \$5.00 per day for the remainder of the session.

In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1930.

Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

The Legislature shall meet every two years as such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of each session and after that not exceeding \$5.00 per day for the remainder of the session. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established;

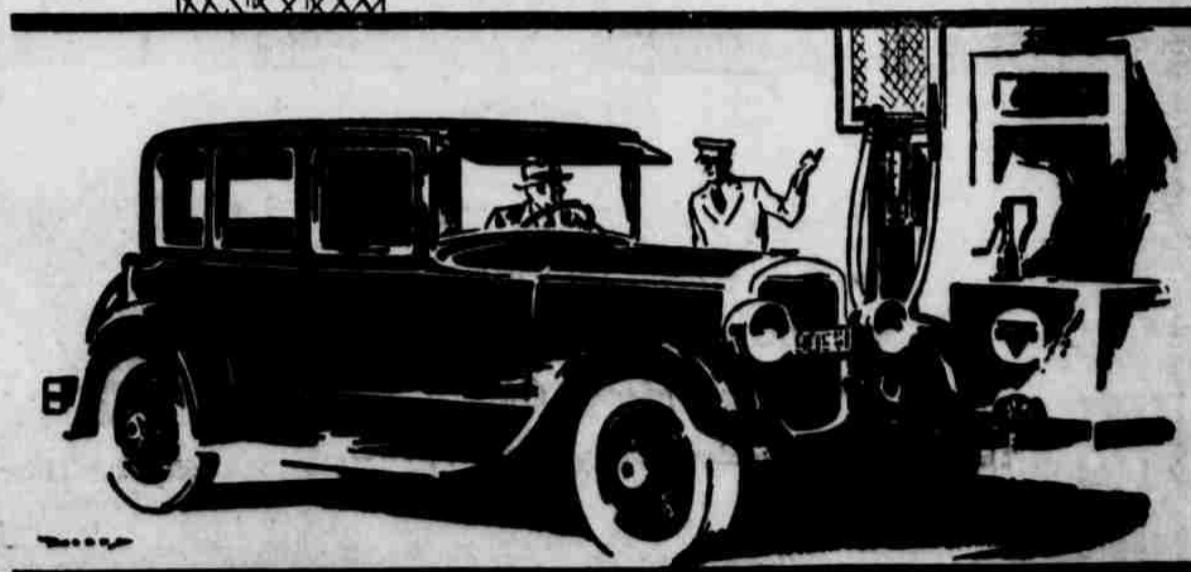
