# Editorial.

THE NEWSPAPER AND PUBLIC MORALS.

In a few issues back we had occasion to chide the daily newspaper for its failure to throw the weight of its influence in favor of public morals in the community and the State. We thought that the people had a right to expect this much at the hand of the daily press, as one of the educators of public sentiment; but the Greenville Daily Herald last week proceeded to disabuse our minds of this innocent idea in the following statement: "The daily papers complained of are published by corporations, organized for the purpose of making dividends for their stockholders, by publishing such news and following such policy as will yield the greatest revenue." This is a refreshing confession, and, were it not for the fact that the Herald belongs to the family of "daily papers" and is competent to speak with authority upon this subject, we would be disposed to question the full meaning of its statement. Therefore, the logic of the situation as sized up by the Herald is, that if the daily paper finds more "revenue" in shielding law-breakers, in encouraging officers to neglect their duty, in quietly squinting at open gambling dens, an l in withholding information from the people touching these offenses against public morals, then the daily paper will throw public morals to the wind! This is a fearful statement of the case, but the Herald is responsible for it. Public morals, social decency, the rights of home, the protection of marical sanctity, the fidelity to duty of the officers of the law, an i the maintenance of the peace and order of society amount to nothing, only as they are placed over and against so many dollars in the pockets of the corporation controlling the daily paper. If the Herald is correct, the daily paper is run for revenue, pure and simple, and if the support of virtue, or the countenance of vice will produce it, then attitude toward their fellow-men, but the the daily lines up accordingly. This, therefore, is the reason given as why the dail; never criticises a dereliet officer, never publishes the defiance of law by open gambling to suppress free speech by a bar-keeper at Turner Hall, never points out deviltry of mit responsible citizens to discuss these offenses in its columns. If we are to take the confession of the Daily Herald as the true index to the situation, then the daily paper has no settled moral conviction and no fixed purpose to advocate right and discountenance mendacity and crime. It is a sort of shuttlecock, bidding for the popular breeze, and ready to put vice above virtue, lawlessness above order, perjury above truth, money above manhood, gambling dens above the statutes of the State, the negligence of officers above their sworn duty, or vice versa, according to the side that will yield the largest revenue. Now we are to understand that when we read the great daily we can depend

upon it that the matter published for our

benefit is not published for the benefit of the

public per se, but for the money it will bring to the corporation; and therefore, if the people want the great daily to take the side of virtue against vice, of right against wrong, of law against disorder, of honor against corruption, then they can only accomplish this end by making virtue and honor and law and purity pay the stockholders of the daily a larger dividend than will vice, disorder, gambling dens, impurity and the degradation of manhood and womanhood. In other words, the great daily has no interest in any of these questions, only in so far as the money feature is involved. We had been laboring under the impression, though somewhat dubious, that the daily paper posed as an educator of the people and as the promoter of decency in the community and the State; but if the Herald is correct, this impression is an iridescent dream. We still hope that the Herald is mistaken, and if so, the great daily needs to comto its own defense against the revelations of one of its craft.

## UNSPOTTED FROM THE WORLD.

This is a New Testament phrase, and one very expressive of a duty we owe to our own characters and to the Church of which we are members. There must be a well-drawn line of distinction between the people who profess to be the followers of Christ and those who belong to the world and are worldly in thought, practice and character. If religious profession and experience do not differentiate us from this class, then our religion is an empty shadow and fails to ac complish the ends of Christian life. Such was the peculiar mark that distinguished the early apostles of Christ from the rest of mankind, that wherever they came under observation, men took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus. They did not make themselves foolish or idiotic in their conduct, neither did they assume a bolier-to-au-thou did live soberly and righteensly before the world. If we go to such places and practice the othics of those who are the patrons of them, then we take on the spots of the world, and Christ becomes humiliated in us, and we become degraded and sodden with the habits of worldy people On the contrary, we must let our light so shine that men will see our good works and glorify our Father in heaven.



## THIS CAPS THE CLIMAX.

The other day I got a paper out of the postoffice with the words, "sample copy," stamped on the wrapper. When I tore off the wranner I found it to be an ordinary country weekly from a neighboring State with these words, "marked copy," stamped on the top of the front page. As I did not know the editor and had never heard of the town where the paper is pub-lished. I wondered how a marked copy came to be sent to me. But when turned to the second page I found at the top in the left-hand corner the following headlines running across two columns and marked with blue pencil: "Some Extracts From Reports of Revivals Conducted by Rev. Joshua Barnabas Alexander, of Saline Springs, Arcadia." (The proper names are fictitious.) A perusal of the short editorial write-up (which itself reads more like the work of a preacher than of a country editor) and of the fifteen extracts from reports of meetings held (most of which are taken from country weeklies) led me, much against my will, to the conclusion that the whole whom it thus advertises, and is a deliberate scheme on his part to advertise his merits as an evangelist and get himself invited to hold meetings. I venture to say that most Texas preachers, or at least most of those in stations, have received the same paper. I feel equally certain that the considerable expense of printing, stamping. marking and mailing these extra papers was not borne by a country editor. ## THE SALOON AND THE ARMY.

Much discussion has been had in reference to the return of the "canteen at army posts, which was abolished by Congress. The Secretary of War and several prominent generals have affirmed that its abolition has increased drunkenness, petty crimes, and de-sertions among our regular soldiers. Gen. Miles has strongly announced his conviction that the canteen was source of evil, and should not be rein-stated. Gen. Roberts, the Commanderin Chief of the English Army, ha lately written in favor of temperance. His words apply to the present discussion in this country. He says: "Mexperience tells me that nearly all of the crime in the British Army in India directly traceable to drinking to es cess. Out of 2908 courts-marshal it 1893, only 73 of those held for tria were members of the Army Temper ance Association. The per cent of abstainers admitted into hospital was 5.5 non-abstainers 10. These figures leave a reasonable presumption that half the sickness in the British Army in India traceable to drink.




