You say: "In Texas we have a German Mission Conference about ten years old." The German Mission Conference, M. E. Church, South, was organized in 1874. nearly thirty years ago. A Methodist German Mission was started by our Church in Galveston in 1846, measures taken to build a church, and in 1856 there was a German presiding elder's district. 8 pastoral charges, 11 itiner-ant and 3 local preachers, with 378 members. When the German Mission Conference was set apart in 1874 there were 2 presiding elder's districts in Texas alone, 15 pastoral charges, 19 itinerant and 3 local preachers, with 577 members.
