#### S. J. R. No. 19 ng a Constitutional Amend ment to be Voted on November 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

The Legislature shall meet every two years as such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular Session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature: provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided however. mine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

A new steel bay will be added to the substation at Shamrock, and an 11 ky automatic reclosing oil switch, 11 ky oil circuit breaker control and metering panel, and a 450 kva 6900 to 2300 volt transformer bank installed. The additions will improve service in Shamrock and surround-

ing territory. At Brady, the ice plant building will be improved through the construction of an awning to cover the ice dock, installation of awning ights, painting of sashes and doors and the stuccoing of the building
