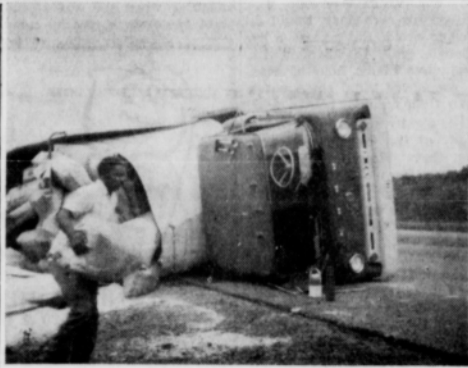

Dennis Savell Receives Medal

Pfc. Dennis R. Savell, who was previously stationed with Company B 1st Battalion 26th Infantry in Viet Nam, received the Army Commendation Medal for heroism in the Republic of Viet Nam on January 12, 1967.

On this date, Savell was serving as a rifleman on a platoon ambush patrol. He spotted several insurgents moving into the unit's kill zone, and quickly directed a barrage of fire at the enemy. The enemy retreated, leaving three casualties, then upon the enemy's second attempt on the American unit, Savell moved forward with his unit and sprayed the woodland with a barrage of automatic weapons fire. He also confiscated equipment and weapons left by the fleeing enemy. Pfc. Savell's actions were in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, the 1st Infantry Divisions and the United States Army.

Pfc. Savell is presently stationed at Fort Hood, recovering from wounds received in Viet Nam in March, 1967. He was returned to the States in April.

Savell is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Seelig of Baird.

New Voting Boxes Effective Jan. 1st

In connection with a recent enactment of the Texas Legislature, which require that all voting boxes with less than 50 registered voters in 1964 be abolished, the Commissioners Court approved the consolidation of Callahan County voting boxes, reducing the number from 11 to seven, in their regular meeting Monday.

Atwell and Cottonwood vot-

ing precincts were merged with Cross Plains.

The Rowden and Dudley voting precincts were combined with Oplin and Denton Valley, and re-formed. Polling places will be at Denton Valley and Oplin. Dividing line between the two, starts at the west boundary line of the county, along what is known as the Caldwell Road, one mile south of Dud-

ley; and goes along this road about two miles past FM Road 904, where it then turns south for about four miles, and then crosses the Coleman-Baird pavement (Highway 283) at the Pecan Bayou Bridge, and then preceded on east to the line of Commissioners Precincts 2 and 4. Persons living north of that dividing line will vote at Denton Valley, and resident to the south at Oplin.

The consolidations leave Putnam and Cross Plains the only voting places in their respective Commissioners Precincts, two and four.

Commissioners precinct one will continue to have Baird, Clyde, and Eula.

Commissioners Precinct two will have Denton Valley and Oplin as described by the new boundary line, which is necessary to leave Commissioners Precincts unchanged.

When new election officials are appointed, representation is expected to be given the boxes which were necessarily consolidated with larger polling precincts.

The new voting boxes will not become effective until Jan. 1, 1968. All voters will cast their ballots in the November 11, General Election, in their regular voting precincts.

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"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

MAN IN THE HOUR OF NEED

Mark 5:21-24 "And when Jesus was passed over again by ship unto the other side, much people gathered unto him: and he was nigh unto the sea. And, behold, there cometh one of the rulers of the synagogue, Jairus by name; and when he saw him, he fell at his feet. And besought him greatly, saying, My little daughter lieth at the point of death: I pray thee, come and lay thy hand on her, that she may be healed; and she shall live. And Jesus went with him; and much people followed him, and thronged him."

There are all the elements of tragedy here in this passage of scripture. It is always tragic when a child is ill.

Although the story is concerned with the sick child, it tells us a great deal about the man who was the Ruler of the Synagogue. He must have been a man of some considerable importance. The Ruler of the Synagogue was the administrative head of the Synagogue. He was the man responsible for the conduct of all the services of

the synagogue. He was one of the most respected and important men in the community. But something had happened to him when his daughter fell ill and when he thought of Jesus.

His prejudices were forgotten. There can be no doubt that he must have regarded Jesus as an outsider, as a dangerous heretic, as one to whom the synagogue doors were closed, one whom everyone who valued his orthodoxy would do well to avoid. But he was a big enough man to abandon his prejudices in his hour of need. A prejudiced mind shuts out a man from many a blessings.

His dignity was forgotten. He, Ruler of the Synagogue, came and threw himself at the feet of Jesus, the wandering teacher. Not a few time a man has had to forget his dignity to save his life and to save his soul. In the old story that is precisely what Naaman had to do (II Kings 5). It frequently happens that a man stands on his dignity and falls from the opportunity before him with Christ. His pride was forgotten. It

must have taken a conscious effort of humiliation for this Ruler of the Synagogue to come and ask help from Jesus of Nazareth. The very first step of the Christian life is to realize that we cannot be anything other than indebted to God.

Understanding the customs of the Jews, it would be safe to assume that his friends were forgotten. It is rather strange that he came himself and did not send a messenger. It seems unlikely that he would leave his daughter when she was at the point of death. Maybe he came

because no one else would go. It may well be that this ruler defied public opinion and home advice in order to call on Jesus. Here was a man who forgot everything except that he wanted the help of Jesus; and, just because he forgot, he would remember forever after that Jesus as a Savior.

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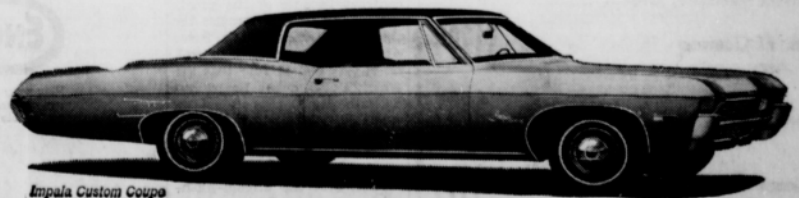

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AUSTIN — Constitutional Revision Commission is busy revising or rewriting the basic document which has governed Texas since 1876.

Before it could start, it rounded out its membership by naming five senators.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith refused to name the Senators. He says the Commission was not legally authorized. It was created by a simple House resolution and the Senate did not concur.

Senators chosen by the Commission itself were A. M. Aikin of Paris, Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, J. P. Word of Meridian, Don Kennard of Fort Worth and Henry Grover of Houston.

Gov. John Connally opened the Commission's meeting by urging its members "to make some very profound recommendations about the structure of Texas government without removing fundamental safeguards."

Connally said the commission should "eliminate those portions (of the Constitution) which are outmoded and no longer applicable."

Commission Chairman Robert Storey, a Dallas attorney, said the 25-member commission, which will report to the 61st Legislature in 1969, should try to write a brand new constitution.

Recommendations of the Commission must go first to the Legislature. If two-thirds of the lawmakers agree that the proposed revision is worth submitting to voters, a statewide election will be required before any changes can go into effect.

Larry Temple, executive assistant to Governor Connally, was designated secretary and chairman of the drafting committee. San Antonio Mayor W. W. McAllister was named vice-chairman.

Legal or not, the group will devote 14 months to the project. Eight committees were

named to study various parts of the Constitution -- executive, legislative, judicial, political subdivisions, bill of rights, education, revenue and taxation and drafting.

HURRICANE ACTION — All available federal aid will be sought by Governor Connally for Rio Grande Valley and Texas coastal areas ravaged by Hurricane Beulah.

Small Business Administration early declared SBA relief loans were available to firms in the hurricane-devastated sections.

State Insurance Board dispatched experts to the Valley to help interpret the fine print of policies. Insurance companies, which paid out \$120,000,000 in Hurricane Carla losses six years ago, moved to implement "catastrophe plans" for speeding claims handling.

Board officials advised that Texas insurance policies do not cover losses due solely to flood waters or wave damage, although some do provide coverage against wind-driven rains, as well as wind damage.

Source of controversy surrounding Carla policies mainly involved losses caused by both wind and water and assessment of that portion attributable to hurricane winds.

Railroad Commission delayed setting oil allowable for October pending a survey of how Hurricane Beulah affected Gulf Coast refining capacity.

GOOD WATER FOR BAD — A new federal government policy demanding commitment of water in order to control state stream pollution may leave Texas no water for its cities, industry and agriculture.

Governor Connally told a conference on regional planning and development that the U. S. Corps of Engineers wants the state to guarantee release of 1,400,000 acre feet of water per year into the Red River for the next century so as to upgrade quality.

A head-on clash between the state and federal government arose over a contract for the Cooper Dam and Reservoir in Northeast Texas. Corps of Engineers remanded that the state allocate 63,370 acre feet of water a year from Lake Texarkana to control Red River pollution.

At the time the contract was signed, Texas Water Development Board informed President Johnson that the state faces potential permanent loss of 1,500,000 acre feet from the Red River area below Lake Texoma and possible ultimate loss of 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 acre feet from all Texas waters to federal jurisdiction if the Corps policy stands. Board claimed the policy should invalidate any planned major redistribution of the state's surface water supply proposed in its \$3,600,000,000 water plan.

"If that policy stands," Connally said, "there will be no water left for cities, industries or agriculture. If the water quality controls that Texas is asked to guarantee are put into effect, all present and prospective dams on the San Antonio River would not meet these requirements, let alone needs of the San Antonio area."

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has been asked to rule on validity of the Cooper Reservoir contract because of the provision giving federal agencies the right to release Sulphur River water for water quality control. He is expected to rule that the Water Development Board has no authority to sign it. Nobody seems quite sure what will happen after that.

Executive Director of the WDB, Joe G. Moore Jr., says conflict over the stream-flushing requirement will have to be settled at top state-national levels.

MUNICIPAL RIGHTS DIVISION — Texas Water Rights Commission, in effect, reversed a district court decision when it approved 18 applications for Rio Grande Valley water rights.

In bypassing the decision of Judge J. H. Starley of Pecos

(in Edinburg's 93rd District Court), the Commission assured water supplies for most Rio Grande Valley cities for populations double those of 1965.

Starley had allocated water on the basis of acreage. Commission allocated it on the basis of population.

Even with the Board's decision, irrigation rights still are unsettled in the now famous Rio Grande Valley water dispute.

"Only when the suit is final," says Commission Executive Director Frank Booth, "will irrigation rights be established. Municipalities, however, always will get the water first, and irrigation will be subordinate to that."

WELFARE BENEFITS INCREASE — More than 240,000 needy Texans will get small raises in their welfare checks effective October 1. Burton G. Hackney, Commissioner of State Department of Public Welfare, says old age assistance recipients will receive \$4 a month more and those eligible for aid to the permanently and totally disabled \$5 more.

New maximum OAA grants will be \$104 a month and disability top grants, \$79 a month. Increases will benefit 228,267 on OAA rolls and 11,450 on disabled rolls.

Legislature this year made raises possible by increasing appropriations for OAA by \$6,500,000 and aid to the disabled by \$1,000,000.

The production is scheduled for December 7, 8 and 9 in McMurry's Old Main Auditorium, and will be directed by Ernest Sublett, assistant professor of speech.

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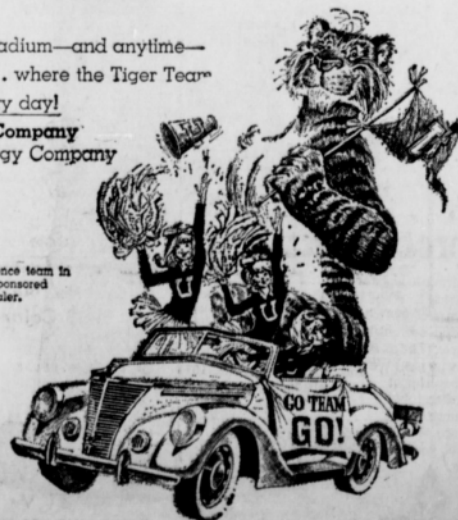

Old Age Assistance To Get Raise

State Representative Burke Musgrove today announced that Old Age Assistance grants and grants to the Permanently and Totally Disabled will be raised effective with the October payments.

Representative Musgrove explained that the increase in payments is a result of the increased appropriations for these two programs made by this last session of the Legislature. Musgrove pointed to the fact that two counties in this legislative district - Eastland and Callahan Counties - rank fifth and seventh in the state for the percentage of population over 60 years old. "Such an increase," he said, "will benefit a large number of people in this area."

The amount of increase in payments was revealed this week to Musgrove by Burton G. Hackney, Commissioner of the State Department of Welfare. Old Age Assistance grants will be raised \$4.00 per month above the amount currently recommended by the local worker, therefore making the maximum Old Age Assistance grant \$104.00 per month. Effective also in October, all Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled will be raised \$5.00 per month above the amount currently recommended by the local worker. The maximum Aid under the program will be increased to \$79.00 per month.

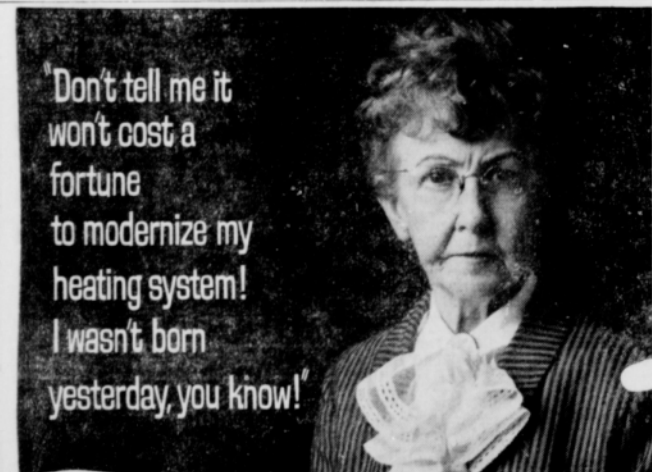

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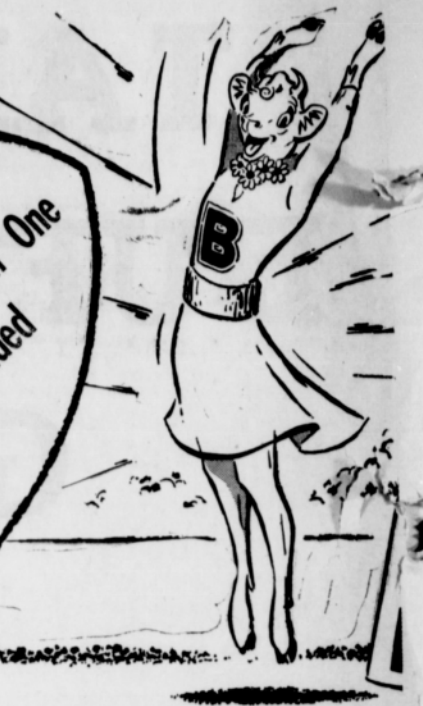
