The greatest enemy of the small town is not the nearby city; it is the small town citizes who hasn't learned that the only hundred-percent dollar is the dollar spent at home. Moreover, strange as it may seem, the worst offender frequently is the small-town merchant who neglects to practice what he preaches.

If home-town people would develop a sense of home-town loyalty, all this talk of the "small town losing out" would be the obpliest sort of prattle. There never was a time when so much opportunity for development and growth was offered enterprising communities. Texas' only glass factory is located in a relatively small town, as are her two great sugar refineries; in point of fact, high tension lines for the trans-mission of electric power have wiped out the small town's disadvantages and emphasized its attractions.-Editorials of the Month.

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

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

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
