FORTY-FOURTH YEAR

DAVIS-MITCHELL GIN DESTROYED BY FIRE TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Fire which originated in the condenser at the Davis-Mitchell gin late Tuesday afternoon completely destroyed the gin plant with the exception of the office building and seed house, causing a loss which is estimated at around \$15,000.

The fire was discovered about 4:30 and an alarm was immediately turned in, but the flames spread rapidly through the upper part of the plant, and efforts of the fire department were confined to saving the seed house and office, it being impossible to extinguish the fire in the main part of the plant, a sheet iron structure, due to the terrific heat. Firemen were kept busy for about two hours in combating the blaze, the biggest conflagration to occur in Haskell in several years.

Virgil Bailey, manager of the gin, which is owned by Stamford parties, states that some insurance was carried on the plant, but not enough to materially offset the loss, which will be heavy. No definite announcement as to whether the plant would be rebuilt could be made at this time, according to Mr. Bailey.

CONTEMPLATE DRIVE AGAINST PREDATORY ANIMALS IN COUNTY

RULE BLACKSMITH DIES SUDDENLY OF HEART DISEASE

W. B. Waller of Rule, age 50 years, and who had been a resident of that city for the past twenty-five years, was found dead Wednesday at noon in the Herren Tin Shop at Rule. At an inquest held Wednesday afternoon by Justice of the Peace Dotson of this city, and County Attorney F. M. Robertson, death was attributed to heart disease.

Mr. Waller, a blacksmith, had gone from his shop to the Tin Shop next door and lay down in the rear of the shop. He was thought to be sleeping by men at work in the shop until one of the men discovered that he was dead, and notified officers.

Rules of Burro Polo Games Made Public This Week

1. All mounts should be high-stepping, iron-jawed Mexican Burros.

2. All mounts should be ridden bare-back, without singlet or rope.

3. Either bridles or halters may be used but no reins shall be longer than six feet.

4. Contestant may dismount to strike ball, but not allowed to turn loose of bridle reins while so dismounted, and are not allowed to strike the ball or strike at the ball but one time while dismounted, but shall mount burro again before striking the next time.

5. Contestants shall not use whips, quirts, riding crops or bills heavier than five pounds nor longer than eleven inches.

6. Contestants may wear spurs, but rowels shall not be greater than six inches in diameter. Lineman's spikes are barred.

7. Regulation croquet mallets and balls will be used by all contestants and the teams colors represented by a bow of ribbon both on the left arm and each mallet.

8. All contestants of each team shall be uniformed alike and wearing proper team colors in order that the spectators may be able to differentiate between the contestant and the mount.

9. All abusive language shall be directed to opposing contestants and not be directed to mounts.

10. Each game shall consist of four chukkers of four minutes each with a two minute rest between periods.

11. Mounts will be furnished by Haskell County Fair Association and teams contesting each day will draw lots as to which mount they will ride.

The fire department trucks made a run to the fire, but were unable to be of any assistance, as there was no available water supply near.
