As we get the second semester underway we are once again reminded that good students are made, not born. Many students do less than their best in school because they do not know how to study. Solid study skills take time to develop; they do not magically float into a student's mind when needed.

As your child gets older and progresses through school, his teachers will give him increasingly more homework as well as more responsibility for studying on his own, outside the classroom. One of our goals for this year is to develop a homework policy so that teachers, parents and students at every level will know what type of homework will be expected of the student. We believe that an important part of education is preparing a student to be organized, to know how to gather information, and to be able to meet deadlines.

We emphasize the development of study skills because we know that if a student never learns how to study effectively and efficiently, he will waste a lot of time, learn less, and be more apt to be frusterated. His'

No matter how old your child is, it's never too early or too late to start guiding him to acquire good study habits. Ask him about homework assignments, projects, or upcoming tests. Of course, you should not do his homework for him, but you can look over his shoulder



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

Free Parenting Workshop Scheduled children stay out of trouble while Connie Kenmore, counselor at

DeShazo Elementary and Liz Tipps, nurse at Dillman Elementary spoke at the Lions Club meeting January 15 in the Bailey County Civic Center.

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They were introduced to the group by Superintendent of Schools, Bill Moore. Tipps and Kenmore spoke to the group on parenting skills and announced a workshop that begins January

Elementary school aged children are experiencing pressure to use alcohol and other drugs at increasingly earlier ages. Today's teenagers are most likely to start using alcohol, tobacco and marijuana before they are 15.

Preparing for the Drug (free) Years is for parents of children in grades 4-7, the grades when prevention has its highest impact before widespread experimentation occurs.

The program demonstrates how you can decrease the chances that your children will become involved with drugs. The skills you learn will help you build strong family

"My parents" is the #1 answer children give to explain why they refuse drug offers. This program will give you the information and skills you need to take an active role in prevention for your family. Session 1, titled "How to Prevent Drug Use in Your Family," discusses the times when children begin experimenting with drugs, the stages of drug use, factors that put children at risk for drug abuse and what families can do to reduce tnese risks.

Session 2, titled "Developing a Family Position on Drugs," discusses the importance of developing a clear family position on drugs. It shows how to clarify and set expectations about alcohol and drug use and communicate them to your family.

Session 3, titled "Avoiding Trouble: How to Say 'No' to Drugs" gives skills to help your

keeping their friends and having fun. Special techniques are taught for resisting peer pressure from individuals and groups.

Session 4, titled "Managing Family Conflict," will give the importance of managing family conflict constructively. Two anger management skills are taught: how to control anger and how to express) anger so it doesn't drive a wedge between family members.

Session 5, titled "Strengthening Family Bonds," will discuss how to increase children's contributions to the family in five areas and recognizing each family member's special qualities.

The workshop will be held on five consecutive Monday evenings beginning January 27 and continuing until February 24. Time is 7 p.m. and the place is DeShazo Elementary. additional child care information, call 272-7546.

The workshop will be held on five consecutive Monday evenings beginning January 27 and ending February 6. A sixth meeting can be held if the parents that have been there decide to do so. This would be a support group that can form. But, it's up to the parents.

The five sessions will teach two key lessons to parents. These are bonding and strong commitment to family life.

"Bonding with the very young kid is easy because they can be adorable at such an early age," Tipps notes. "However, maintaining bonding with the child as he gets older is a real challenge to the parent."

It has been shown that when parents and children have a strong commitment to the family, there is less of a chance of drug abuse later.

Communication between parents and children is another important element in prevention of drug use among young children.

One of the topics discussed early in the study will be that of setting

family guidelines. "Just saying 'don't smoke' to

children is not enough," Tipps says. "Children need to know the definite consequences.

"In the third week, the young people come with their parents. We teach them refusal skills, especially those that work with their peers. A child must learn to say no to drugs even if his best friend is suggesting it."

"We are teaching kids how to deal with anger because we realize that avoidance of all conflict in a family situation is not possible," Tipps says. "We will discuss how to express anger constructively in the fourth session as we investigate ways to manage conflict at home."

Sessions start at 7 p.m. and continue until 9. The last session will serve as a reinforcement to the whole process. Bonding strength, communicating, and thinking about the positives in home life will be emphasized in that session.

"Nancy Barrier and I have been taking special study in this area. We are not supermoms, but we are learning as we go," Tipps says.

In speaking of the underground water, Bivins stated that he will offer legislation returning control of groundwater to local districts.

Bivins also mentioned the intrastate trucking rates. "It costs twice as much to send a load of goods from West Texas to Texarkana than it does from West Texas to Texarkana, Ark. We need to reduce rates and open up the industry, Bivins continued.

Bivins has spent his entire life in West Texas, building his business and raising his family. He continues his family's four generation involvement in ranching as a businessman and cattleman. He is also active in oil and gas exploration and development. Upon finishing college and law school, Bivins and his brother formed Bivins Brothers Partnership which pastures and feeds cattle throughout the Panhandle.

Remember, there is always something your student can do as homework even if a specific assignment has not been made. Spelling words to practice, multiplication tables to learn, going over class notes, just reading a good book or magazine will reinforce the idea that time is set aside each day to study.

Tests are a good opportunity to sharpen organizational time 'management and study skills. When a test is announced, students should be sure to get all details (when is it? what will it cover? what type of test is it-essay, multiple choice) and sallow sufficient time to study. We hope that by the time a student graduates from high school, he has learned that cramming is a useless exercise.

Taking time to develop good study skills and establishing a study routine will pay handsome dividends to your child: better grades, improve self-esteem, a feeling of control and displine, and-most importantily-getting those skills. With the help and encouragement of parents, our students should leave school ready to tackle any projects they must face. We look forward to a great spring semester, and hope you will let us know if we can be of assistance.
