John H. Shrader Sr., Former Baird Principal, Rites Held At Scranton

Funeral service for a former Baird Elementary School Principal John H. Shrader Sr., 77, were held at 10 a. m. Saturday, May 25, in Scranton Methodist Church. Officiating were the Rev. Bill Crawford of Crawford, Texas, and the Rev. Carroll Green, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Baird. Burial was in the Scranton Cemetery, under direction of Godfrey Funeral Home of Baird.

Mr. Shrader died at 3 p. m. Thursday, May 23, in Callahan County Hospital, after an illness of one year. He had been a resident of the Golden Holiday Nursing Home for several months before entering the hospital.

Born July 29, 1890 in Dexter, he had been a resident of Callahan County for 60 years. He had lived at his farm home in the Scranton community for several years. His teaching career began at the Cedar Creek School in Stephens County. He later taught at Cedar Grove in Callahan County, Scranton Academy, Eagle Cove, Clyde, Plainview, Cottonwood, Scranton and Atwell.

In 1944 he resigned as Superintendent at Scranton and became Principal at Baird Elementary School, and remained in this position for 11 years, resigning due to the retirement rule.

In 1953, forty-five years after becoming a teacher, he graduated from McMurry College in Abilene.

On January 24, 1914, he married Ila Frances Ray in Scranton. He was a member of the Scranton Methodist Church, Baird Masonic Lodge No. 522, and Woodmen of the World.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, John H. Jr. of Scranton, and Hugh Edgar of Notrees; two daughters, Mrs. B. M. (Charlotte) Freeland of Baird, and Mrs. Roy (Mary Ruth) Armstrong of Iran; three sisters, Miss Haley Shrader and Mrs. John Langston, both of Dallas and Mrs.

Sen. Yarborough Puts Okay on Don

U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, making public a declaration of his preference for Don Yarborough for governor by paying a personal visit to Yarborough's campaign headquarters Sunday morning, predicted D. Yarborough will win the runoff "going away."

The senior senator came down the stairs of D. Yarborough's Austin headquarters carrying a Yarborough campaign sign, with a V for Victory signal, to declare:

"We're on the verge of electing the first loyal Democratic governor since Jimmy Alred was governor 30 years ago. The people of Texas are entitled to elect a governor at least once every 30 years."

As the D. Yarborough staffers and supporters cheered, the senior senator continued:

"Folks, you don't know how wonderful it's going to be. You're going to think flowers

are blooming in January this year. I wouldn't be surprised to see strawberries ripening in January."

The senator said he had never led into a runoff in a gubernatorial race, and said in 1956 when he ran for governor he was 150,000 votes behind going in the runoff.

"In the runoff I was so close it took 'em two weeks to count me out of it," he recalled.

People Saturday night, Sen. Yarborough said, have been telling Don Yarborough that although they worked as county managers for Hill and Briscoe "we're putting our shoulders to the wheel Monday morning for Don Yarborough for governor."

The senator reasoned "all the shrewd campaigners are out of it now."

It appeared obvious the senator feels Yarborough will attract, among others, supporters of Hill and Briscoe.

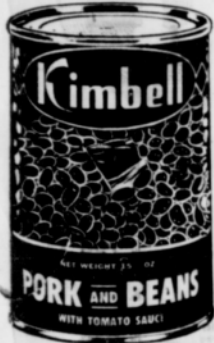
