April Savings Bonds Total \$57,668.00

U. S. Savings Bonds and Savings Notes - popularly known as Freedom Shares - are now paying higher rates of interest according to Howard E. Farmer, County Chairman for the Treasury's Savings Bonds Program.

Effective June 1, 1968, the interest rate on E and H Bonds was raised from 4.15 per cent to 4.25 per cent when held to maturity - the full legal limit permitted under present law. Outstanding E and H Bonds also carry a comparable rate increase to next maturity.

The interest rate on Freedom Shares was increased from 4.74 per cent to 5 per cent on issues dated June 1 and thereafter. There is no legal authority to improve the yield of Freedom Shares issued May 1, 1967 through May 31, 1968, since they come under a different law.

Mr. Farmer reports that the restriction that Freedom Shares may be purchased only by individuals enrolled in a regular purchase plan has been dropped. Effective June 1, Freedom Shares are available for single, over the counter purchase. In combination with an E Bond of the same or larger denomination.

In announcing the improvements in Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares, President Johnson said, "They offer an opportunity for the citizen to participate in America's goals and dreams. . . . The Savings Bonds Program offers a partnership in which we should all belong."

Sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares during the month of April totaled \$57,668 in Callahan County as reported by Mr. Farmer. 59 per cent of the County's 1968 goal of \$140,000 has been achieved.

Total purchases of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares in Texas during April were \$16,729,456 which is an increase of 21 per cent over sales during the same period of 1967. Year to date sales were \$62,708,055 - 11 per cent higher than a year ago.

Fort Griffin Fandangle Will Celebrate 30th Anniversary

The Fort Griffin Fandangle will celebrate its 30th Anniversary during the 1968 run of the production on June 20, 21, 22 - 27, 28, 29. Favorite acts of past shows have been revived and rejuvenated for the entertainment of the audiences at the Prairie Theatre in Albany. New songs and acts have also been added to fulfill the Fandangle tradition of utilizing the creative ability of the citizens of this small West Texas community.

The Fandangle is a show filled with the vibrant spirit and exciting action of frontier times. The ideas for Fandangle scenes have been gathered from old books and from the memories of descendants of the pioneers who settled in Shackelford County. The show musically portrays the character of the lawful and the lawless in a happy blend of poetry and pageantry which is never stilted or slow-moving.

The Fandangle is the story of a land and its people -- people who made their era bright with courage, determination, and daring with horse sense, earthiness and humor. And just as the pioneers were moulded by their prairie setting, so is the Fort Griffin Fandangle enhanced by the scenic vista of its Prairie Theatre. The show is played on an acre-sized stage with a background of hills and seating for 1600 people. It contains trees and wildflowers, a little river and trails over which a herd of Longhorn cattle may be driven into the spotlights. The Theatre was especially created for the Fandangle as a dramatic emphasis to complement the many facets of pioneer life portrayed by the show.
