The new rate schedule eliminates the 50c monthly service charge and is a substantial reduction in the cost of all gas in excess of 5,000 cubic feet used during any month. In addition to these attractive features the minimum monthly bill of \$2.00 is reduced to \$1.50.

It is the purpose of the above new rate schedule to eliminate the wide variations in the size of the
